Report of Implementation for the year 2014

Part A. Describe the actions taken, under national legislation, in the previous year to implement conservation and management measures adopted by the Commission at its sixteenth Session.

- Resolution 14/01 On the removal of obsolete Conservation and Management Measures
 All obsolete Conservation and Management measures removed in line with Resolution 14/01 and changes effected in 2015 Permit Conditions for the Large Pelagis Sector.
- 2. Resolution 14/02 For the conservation and management of tropical tunas stocks in the IOTC area of competence
 - South Africa does not have an artisanal tuna fisheries but an Offshore Recreational Angling that catches and lands tuna and tuna-like species. The recreational fishing sector has a bag limit of 10 tunas per person per day as stipulated in the Regulations in terms of the Marine Living Resources Act (1998) and the sector is managed through licenses and permits. There is an annual limit of number of permits and licenses issued. The minimum size limits as stipulated by the Regulations in terms of the Marine Living Resources Act (1998) also applies to the recreational sector. No statistical system is in place to quantify catches made by the recreational fishery. Recreational fishes are not permitted to sell their catch.
- 3. Resolution 14/03 On enhancing the dialogue between fisheries scientists and managers South Africa is keen to participate in intercessional Science and Management Dialogue Workshops established with the objective of enhancing communication and to foster mutual understanding between fisheries managers, scientist and stakeholders. South Africa has already identified two Fisheries Managers in this regard.
- 4. Resolution 14/04 Concerning the IOTC record of vessels authorised to operate in the IOTC area of competence ^a
 - Request for listing of Authorised vessel has been ammended for 2015 to include additional vessel information on the technical specifications as well as owner ifnormation.
- Resolution 14/05 Concerning a record of licensed foreign vessels fishing for IOTC species in the IOTC area of competence and access agreement information ^a
 - South Africa has entered in to an access agreement with Japan.





IOTC Secretariat has been notified and allcopies of liscences and agreements forwarded to the Secretariat.

- 6. Resolution 14/06 On establishing a programme for transhipment by large-scale fishing vessels ^a South Africa does not allow at-sea transhipments but only in-port transhipment after a permit has been applied for and issued. All in-port transhipment are monitored. Transshipment can only be authorised to vessels that comply with relevant RFMOs (CCAMLR, ICCAT, IOTC, CCSBT, and SEAFO) and in to carrier vessels that appear on the respective authorized list of carrier vessels. The following information shall be furnished to the Department 48 Hours before the transhipment:
- a.) Manifest of fish onboard,
- b.) Place/position of transshipment,
- c.) Date and time of transshipment,
- d.) Estimated time to compleate the transshipment,

South Africa has adopted and published the National Plan of Action for the Management of Sharks.

• Recommendation 05/07 Concerning a management standard for the tuna fishing vessels

The CPC flag states which issues licenses to their AFVs should report annually to the Commission all measures taken to meet the minimum management standards when they issue fishing licenses to their "authorised fishing vessels".

• Resolution 10/06 On Reducing the Incidental Bycatch of Seabirds in Longline Fisheries

CPCs shall provide to the Commission, as part of their annual reports, information on how they are implementing this measure and all available information on interactions with seabirds, including bycatch by fishing vessels carrying their flag or authorised to fish by them. This is to include details of species where available to enable the Scientific Committee to annually estimate seabird mortality in all fisheries within the IOTC Area of Competence.

South Africa fleet has been implementing a number of seabird mitigation measure listed in Table one of Resolution 10/06. Our Permit Conditions clearly dictate that setting of lines should be conducted at night only. During setting of each line, bird scarring lines (Tori-lines) should be deployed. Specification for construction and deployment of tori-lines are clearly outlined in the permit conditions. All vessels are also required to complete the "Seabird mitigation checklist for tuna vessels" prior to sailing. All requirements should be met prior to vessels leaving port. Each vessel participating in the fishery is limited to a number of birds which the can catch as by-catch per season. Once the limit is reached, additional mitigation measures will be imposed upon the vessel and if the situation does not improve, the vessel will be required to cease fishing operation. Since the launch of the National Plan of Action





for Reducing Incidental Catch of Seabirds in Longline Fisheries, the seabird mortality has reduced tenfold to almost level of 0.05 birds for 1 000 hooks.

Resolution 10/10 Concerning market related measures

For CPCs that import tuna and tuna-like fish products, or in whose ports those products are landed or transhipped, should report, a range of information (e.g. information on vessels / owners, product data (species, weight), point of export) annually. [A template report exists].

CPCs shall report to the Commission, in accordance with Article X of the IOTC Agreement, their progress of implementation of the FAO Guidelines and this Resolution.
