In accordance with Paragraph 7 of IOTC Resolution 11/03 *On establishing a list of vessels presumed to have carried out illegal, unregulated and unreported fishing in the IOTC Area*, the list of vessels on the current IOTC IUU Vessels List and the list of vessels proposed for inclusion in the IOTC IUU Vessels List are provided in the following tables. The Provisional IUU Vessels List is provided for the consideration of the Compliance Committee at its 13<sup>th</sup> Session.

Information on the evidence for the new vessels to be included in the IOTC IUU Vessels List and the responses received from the concerned fleets are provided in Annex 1 to this document.

IOTC Circular 2015-107 (18/11/15): Concerning the nine Indian flagged vessels on the provisional IUU list: GREESHMA 1; BOSIN; BENAIAH; CARMAL MATHA; DIGNAMOL I; DIGNAMOL II; KING JESUS; ST MARYS I; ST MARYS II

In respect of the intersessional process for CPCs to decide whether or not to support the above vessels being included on the IOTC IUU Vessels List the IOTC Circular 2015-107 indicated that due the lack of a quorum in response to its Circular 2015-091, the vessels should remain on the IOTC Provisional IUU Vessels List.

UK(OT) responded to IOTC Circular 2015-091 on 23 October 2015 (appended for ease of reference). This letter provides additional information, namely a Note Verbale from India dated 21 October 2015 committing to provide inspection reports on these vessels.

Paragraph 10 (Resolution 11/03) describes the information that the flag State must provide and paragraph 11 indicates that where no evidence has been provided by the flag State, the recommendation to the Commission is that the vessel be included on the IUU vessel list.

UK(OT) is pleased to see improving bilateral cooperation by the Indian Authorities at national level to address and manage this IUU threat, and we look forward to this continuing, driving heightened engagement by India in respect of these cases within the IOTC process and Conservation Management Measures.

At the time of writing, while we note our support for the continued practical work undertaken by the Indian authorities at national level to tackle the IUU problem, in the absence of specific evidence from the flag State demonstrating that it has yet taken effective action or imposed sanctions of adequate severity [11/03, para 10(b)] on the vessels or vessel owners in question, we maintain our recommendation that all nine vessels are included on the IOTC IUU Vessels list.

I would be grateful if you could circulate this material for the information of the Compliance Committee.

IOTC Circular 2015-091 (28/09/15): Concerning the nine Indian flagged vessels on the provisional IUU list: GREESHMA 1; BOSIN; BENAIAH; CARMAL MATHA; DIGNAMOL I; DIGNAMOL II; KING JESUS; ST MARYS I; ST MARYS II

The Commission AGREED that the above vessels shall be kept on the IOTC Provisional IUU Vessels list for CPCs to decide inter-sessionally whether or not to support them being included on the IOTC IUU Vessels List on the basis of additional information provided by the CPCs concerned (Resolution 11/03 Para 14). Paragraph 10 (Resolution 11/03) describes the information that the flag State must provide and paragraph 11 indicates that where no evidence has been provided by the flag State, the recommendation to the Commission is that the vessel be included on the IUU vessel list.

UK(OT) supports all nine vessels being included on the IOTC IUU Vessels list as detailed below.

#### Vessels Greeshma 1 and Bosin:

Both these vessels were found guilty by the BIOT Court of "Fishing without a licence" i.e. illegal fishing in BIOT waters. The fines have not been paid in respect of either vessel (see IOTC-2015-CoC12-07[E], dated 13 April; IOTC-2015-CoC12-07 Add 2[E]; and IOTC Circular 2015-091).

We have seen no additional information provided by the flag state to IOTC within the 150 days exceptionally allowed (para 63, S19) (IOTC Circular 2015-091) and it is a matter of regret that it is not possible for UK (OT) to therefore reasonably say that India has taken effective action in response to these cases of IUU fishing, or to have imposed sanctions of adequate severity (Resolution 11/03 para 10b).

UK(OT) sees no reasonable alternative but to support these two vessels being included on the IOTC IUU list.

#### Vessels Benaiah; Carmal Matha; Dignamol I; Dignamol II; King Jesus; St Marys I; St Marys II

In respect of these seven vessels the Compliance Committee accepted the evidence for IUU fishing in BIOT waters presented by UK(OT) (see IOTC-2015-CoC12-07[E], dated 13 April; IOTC-2015-CoC12-07 Add\_2[E]), placing them on the Provisional IUU list. Additional information was submitted in IOTC Circular 2015-091.

These seven vessels failed to return to Diego Garcia and therefore to make themselves available for inspection and investigation, and fled BIOT waters. The flag State, India, did not, in those instances, cooperate in the most timely or adequate manner with the BIOT Administration and did not respond to our requests for information prior to the Compliance Committee meeting in 2015. India responded to our diplomatic correspondence of 21 May 2015 on 5 October 2015 (appended, below), which, though welcome did not provide all the information sought, and was received after the 150 days deadline exceptionally granted by IOTC (28 September 2015).





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We regret that the flag State has not provided any additional information to IOTC within the 150 days exceptionally allowed (para 63, S 19) (IOTC Circular 2015-091) and has been unable to therefore demonstrate that these vessels did not take part in any IUU activities (Resolution 11/03 para 10a); or to present evidence that it has taken effective action in response to the IUU fishing by these vessels, or that it has imposed sanctions of adequate severity (Resolution 11/03 para 10b).

UK(OT) therefore sees no alternative but to support these seven vessels being included on the IOTC IUU list.

UK(OT) is keen to see improved bilateral cooperation by the Indian Authorities to address and manage this IUU threat, and heightened engagement by India in respect of these cases within the IOTC process and Conservation Management Measures.

The Ministry of External Affairs, Republic of India, presents its compliments to the British High Commission in New Delhi and has the honour of referring to Its Note Verbale CH/376/15 dated 21 May 2015 and this Ministry's Note Verbale No. WI(A)/415/07/2015 dated 05 October 2015 attaching therewith the ownership details and technical information of the 12 fishing vessels received from the Government of Tamil Nadu, India.

In this connection, it is informed that there is no operational fishing harbor facility in Kanyakumari District and due to this most of the mechanized fishing boats of Kanyakumari District are operating from fishing bases in Kerala and other States. The fishing vessels reportedly go out for fishing from some fishing base in Kerala or other States when they are sighted and apprehended by British Indian Ocean Territory (BIOT) authorities. The mechanized fishing vessels on which the British Foreign and Commonwealth (FCO) had requested for inspection reports, have not yet reported to the authorized officer of the Government of Tamil Nadu. The concerned authorized officer of Tamil Nadu Government have issued summons to the owners of those fishing vessels to appear before them and subject their vessels to inspection. This process would take about a minimum of 4 months time to complete and furnish the inspection report.

The Ministry of External Affairs of the Republic of India avails of this opportunity to renew to the esteemed British High Commission the assurances of its highest consideration.

Resolution 11/03 On establishing a list of vessels presumed to have carried out IUU fishing in the IOTC Area of Competence: Sri Lankan Flagged Vessels Dulari and Jane.

The Commission at its 19 <sup>th</sup> Session in May 2015 considered the cases for the Sri Lankan flagged vessels Dulari and Jane (IOTC-2015- COC12-07) and agreed to defer them to the next Compliance Committee (IOTC-2015-S19-RE, para 64).

**Dulari (IMUL-A-713-KLT):** This case was heard in the BIOT Court on 7 Jul y 2015. The owner of the vessel was not found guilty of illegal fishing but guilty of possession of prohibited fishing gear contrary to Section 6 (2) of the BIOT Fisheries (Conservati on and Management) Ordinance 2007. The vessel owner was fined and has started making pa yments in instalments. This offence does not qualify for IUU listing under Resolution 11/03. The BIOT Administration is satisfied that the Administrative actions taken by Sri Lanka, included in its monthly report for December 2015 (IOTC Circular 201 5-117) were adequate. The vessel is not presented again for IUU listing in 2016

**Jane (IMUL-A-0524KLT):** The owner of this vessel was found guilt y by the BIOT Co urt on Diego Garcia of possession of prohibited fishing gear contrary to Section 6 (2) of the BIOT Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2007. The vessel owner was fined and the fine has been paid in full. This offence does not qualify for IUU listing under Resolution 11/03. The vessel is not presented again for IUU listing in 2016.

However, we would like to highlight for the attention of the Compliance Committee the following: We note that Sri Lanka's monthly report for December 2015 (IOTC Circular 2015-1 17) indicates that this vessel has been fitted with VMS and is restricted to fishing only within Sri Lanka's EEZ. It is therefor e with concern that we also note that the same vessel, bearing the same ID number (IMUL-A-0524KLT, No IOTC Number), subsequently renamed the Chuti Ku mari, re-entered our waters on 17 January 2016 where it was again arrested on suspicion of illegal fishing. We are pleased that Sri Lankan authorities have now indicated they have begun prosecution of the owner of this vessel, and it is a measure of our cooperation that we were able to discontinue our own prosecution of the owner as a result. We hope to see bett er management of VMS on such vessels in future, and eagerly await the outcome of the prosecution, after which point we may wish to present a case for IUU listing to the Committee again.

IOTC Circular 2015-107 (18/11/15): Concerning the six Sri Lankan flagged vessels on the IOTC Provisional IUU vessel list (SULARA 2, IMASHA 2, NIRODA PUTHA, THIWANKA 5, OTTO 2, KAVIDYA DUWA)

In respect of the intersessional process for CPCs to decide whether or not to support the above vessels being included on the IOTC IUU Vessels List the IOTC Circular 2015-107 indicated that due the lack of a quorum in response to its Circular 2015-076, the vessels should remain on the IOTC Provisional IU U Vessels List.

UK(OT) responded to IOTC Circular 2015-076 on 11 August 2015 which was circulated by the Secretariat on 26 August 2015 (IOTC Circular 2015-080). At the time of writing, the most recent monthly report by Sri Lanka on vessels identified as having carried out IUU fishing activities in the IOTC area of competence is that for December 2015 (IOTC Circular 2015-117), which is also relevant.

Correspondence between the BIOT Principal Legal Advisor and the Sri Lankan Authori ties dated 22 December 2015 and 13 Januar y 2016, in respect of four of the vessels listed (SULARA 2, IMASHA 2, NIRODA PUTHA, THIWANKA 5) confirms (as referred to in the monthly report IOTC 2015-117) that Sri Lanka will hold trials in respect of these cases on 5 February 2016. For OTTO 2 and KAVIDYA DUW A Sri Lanka indicates in it s monthly report IOTC 2015-11 7 that cases have been filed in the Magistrat es Court under the provisions of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources Act No 35 of Sri Lanka.

At the time of writing, The BIOT Administration can confirm:

- That the owner of Thiwanka 5 paid a single instal ment towards their fine on 4 January 2016 (1 of 18, monthly). No payment was received in February and none to date in March.
- That no fines have been received in respect of any of the remaining five vessels.
- That we have received no further update on the outcome of court cases held in Sri Lanka in respect of any of these six vessels.

In light of the failure of the vessel ow ners to pay their fines it has been nec essary to re-evaluate our position contained in our submission circulated on 26 August 2015 (IOTC Circular 2015-080). We remain confident that the Sri Lankan Authorities have taken effective control of the vessels, which are anchored in Beruwala Harbour, but in respect of their owners we urge the Sri Lankan Authorities to provide details on the outcome of each court case to be evaluated against the requirements of Resolution 11/03 Para 10b. Our decision on whether to IUU list these vessels will be made in the light of that evidence during review at the





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next Compliance Committee Meeting in May 2016.

We also take the opportunity to note the continuing effective bilateral arrangement between the Sri Lankan Authorities and the British Indian Ocean Territory Administration working together to resolve the outstanding issues in respect of the above referenced vessels.

## 1. Status of six Sri Lankan vessels SULARA 2, IMASHA 2, NRODHA PUTHA, THIWANKA 5. OTTO 2 and

KAVINDYA DUWA, listed from No. 16 to 21 of the draft IUU vessels list of 2016

BIOT authorities proposed to list above Sri Lankan vessels in the IUU vessels list under the provisions of Resolution 11/03 on establishing a list of vessels presumed to have carries out illegal, unregulated and unreported fishing in the IOTC area at the 12<sup>th</sup> Compliance Committee meeting.

These vessels were found guilty on Fishing in BIOT waters without valid license and possessing prohibited gears on board after trial conducted by the Courts of Diego Garcia. The BIOT authorities have apprehended these vessels in year 2014 and after conducting an investigation the crew and the vessel have been released on pending trials in the BIOT Courts. The trial has been conducted in absentia of the vessel owners and a fine has been imposed to the vessel owners once convicted.

Department of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources (DFAR) of Sri Lanka corporate with BIOT Authorities to act against the IUU fishing activities by vessels of Sri Lanka through bilateral communications in a view to prevent IUU fishing in the region. Further DFAR suspend the vessel registration and the fishing operation license of the above vessels and anchored in the Beruwala harbor under the custody of Coast Guards Department from the date of the arrival of to Sri Lanka. The vessels are still anchored in the Beruwala harbor and up to date it is more than one years' period. Since the legal proceedings ahead these six vessels were listed in the provisional list of IUU during the 12<sup>th</sup> Compliance Committee meeting in 2015.

DFAR tried every effort to urge the, vessel owners to pay the fine, the vessel owners repeatedly expressed their financial incapability to settle the fines, imposed by fined by the Courts of Diego Garcia. Although the fined by the Courts of Diego Garcia made arrangements to pay the fine in monthly installments on the request of the vessel owners except for two others do not comply to that. In the meantime BIOT Authorities insisted to make arrangements to settle the fines.

In Sri Lanka administration there is no legal basis to compel the vessel owners to pay the fine imposed by foreign courts. As such the only means of charging the fine is that prosecute the offenders under Sri Lanka law and if convicted, the verdict shall in a way that able to settle the fine (confiscate/auction of the vessel). The principal legal advisor of BIOT also contacted DFAR of Sri Lanka on this regard and the communication is attached hereto. (Annex-i)

DFAR filed cases against these vessels under the provisions of the Fisheries and Aquatic Resources Act No.35 of 2013, Initially to the four vessels SULARA 2, IMASHA 2, NRODHA PUTHA, THIWANKA 5 at the Magistrate courts of Kalutara and the OTTO 2 AND KAVINDYA DUWA was followed.

Certified copies of the investigation reports and the case records has not received from the BIOT authorities as requested by Sri Lanka. However the legal proceedings initiated with the guidance of Attorney Generals Department of Sri Lanka on 5<sup>th</sup> May 2015 and three trials conducted. It was ordered to call witness from BIOT authorities. As such it was decided to summon the Senior Fisheries Protection Officer who involved in the investigations as witness and the trial date fixed to 5<sup>th</sup> February 2016. However it was further ordered by the Courts to amend the witnesses list by including the interpreters attended at the investigation conducted by BIOT authorities.

Due to this amendments, the summon order for the Senior Fisheries Protection Officer has not send to BIOT Authorities as reported in the last monthly report submitted to IOTC which was circulated in January 2016. Hence the next trial date fixed to 29<sup>th</sup> April 2016.

In the meantime, Principal Legal Adviser for British Indian Ocean Territories informed her visit to Sri Lanka in the third week of March to discuss with Officials of DFAR, AG's Dept and other stakeholders in a view to arrive to an agreed solutions to ensure effective conclusion over the prevailing IUU issues. However the dates postponed and Sri Lanka proposed the dates at end of April and hope to resolve outstanding issues and report to the 13<sup>th</sup> Compliance meeting of IOTC.

## 2. Status of the vessel Yasiru Putha No.01 (IMUL-A- 0648KLT) listed under No. 22 of the draft IUU vessels list of 2016

This vessel found guilty on Fishing in BIOT waters without valid license and keep in possession of prohibited gears on board in 29<sup>th</sup> May 2015. The owner has been fined by the Courts of Diego Garcia and the vessel owner has paid the fine. The vessel has been anchored until settle the fine. The vessel is included to the monthly reporting to IOTC. The owner agreed to the conditions imposed by the DFAR and granted permission to fish only within the EEZ of Sri Lanka after installation of VMS on board.

Sri Lanka at present well equipped with legal framework to combat IUU fishing and all high seas operating vessels are fixed with operational VMS onboard. Strict boat inspections are being conducted at departure and arrival points by the officials of DFAR, Coast guard and NAVY. As such in 2015 only one Sri Lankan vessels reported on illegal entering to BIOT waters (Yasiru Putha 01) and this was bilaterally resolved. The management of VMS is further strengthen by Issuing circular by including inspection of operational status of the VMS at departure point.

By providing above information Sri Lanka do not agree with inclusion of the six vessels SULARA 2, IMASHA 2, NRODHA PUTHA, THIWANKA 5. OTTO 2 and KAVINDYA DUWA to the IUU list, Since actions of adequate severity are being taken (ongoing) and Hence, requested to be remained in the provisional list of IUU until the legal actions completed.

With regard to the vessel Yasiru Putha 01, Sri Lanka disagree with inclusion of this vessel in IUU list since the owner has respected the law of Diego Garcia and agreed with the conditions imposed by DFAR Sri Lanka and already included to the monthly reporting of IOTC.

### Re: Sri Lankan Criminal Prosecutions in respect of the following vessels:

#### Imasha 02, Thiwanka 05, Nirodha Putha, Sulara 02

This is reference to your letter dated 22<sup>nd</sup> December send to this Department on the above.

I would like to bring to your kind notice that ten (10) Sri Lanka vessels have been apprehended by the BIOT Authorities for being engaged in Illegal Unreported Unregulated (IUU) fishing activities in the Marine protected area of BIOT waters and prosecuted by BIOT Courts, in year 2014.

Department of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources (DFAR) of Sri Lanka assisted BIOT authorities through bilateral communications for the investigations by confirming the ownership of the vessels those arrested, in a view to combat IUU fishing activities in the region. Further DFAR Sri Lanka suspended the Vessel Registration and the operation license and kept the vessels in the Custody of Coast Guard Department until settle down the case by paying the fines imposed by the courts of BIOT.

Out of the 10 vessel owners, two vessel owners (Vessels Seawish and Jane) have paid the fine imposed by the Magistrate of BIOT. The 8 remaining boats are still being anchored at Beruwala fishery harbor in Sri Lanka. The Department of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources tried every effort to urge the vessel owners to pay the fines, the vessel owners repeatedly expressed their financial incapability to pay the fine imposed by Magistrate Courts of BIOT.

Although the BIOT Courts made arrangements to pay the fine in monthly installments on the request of the vessel owners, except for one vessel owner (Vessel Dulari) others do not respect for it. In the meantime BIOT Authorities insisted DFAR to make arrangements to settle the fine.

In Sri Lankan administration there is no legal basis to compel the vessel owners, to pay the fine imposed by foreign courts. In the meantime Sri Lanka is not taking administrative measures against violations of High Seas fishing after the enactment of the Fisheries and Aquatic Resources Act No 35 of 2013.

As such the only means of charging the fine is that prosecute the offenders under Sri Lanka law and if convicted, the verdict shall in a way that (confiscate the vessel and auction) able to settle the fine. Based on this platform DFAR filed cases against the vessel owners of Imasha 02, Thiwanka 05, Nirodha Putha, Sulara 02 those that BIOT authorities has provided the investigation and the case records as per the instructions of the Attorney General Sri Lanka. Therefore it is required the officers and the interpreters who carry out the investigations of the suspected vessels to be appeared in the Courts as the witness during the Trial.

Further I would like to inform you that DFAR initiated to file cases against the remaining three vessel owners (Otto2, Kavinda Duwa, Stef and Ania Duwa) those who have not paid the fine and the same procedure will apply to the said three vessel owners also. The owner of the vessel "Dulari" who agreed to pay the fine in monthly installments has already paid the first installment in January 2015.

Under the above circumstances we are not in a position to take administrative measures as you proposed against the vessel owners found guilty on IUU fishing. However, I appreciate your assistance towards Sri Lanka on this regard.

In conclusion I would like to reaffirm our commitment to cooperate the IOTC and the relevant Coastal States to deter and elimination of IUU fishing in the region.

## Resolution 11/03 On establishing a list of vessels presumed to have carried out IUU fishing in the IOTC Area of Competence: Indian Flagged Vessel Beo Hingis

As required in paragraph 2 of Resolution 11/03 please find attached a completed IOTC Reporting form for Illegal Activity and accompanying evidence supporting the presumption of IUU fishing activity for the Indian flagged vessel Beo Hingis. The vessel is not on the IOTC Record of Authorised Vessels as defined under Resolution 15/04.

The attached evidence shows

- That the vessel, equipped with gill nets and longlines, had tuna and tuna like species on board (see photos and Statement of Evidence kawakawa and dogtooth);
- Was found guilty by the BIOT Court on Diego Garcia of illegal fishing and was fined;
- That the fine has not been paid (and at the time of writing this remains the case);
- That the BIOT Administration has kept the Indian Authorities fully informed of the progress on each case;
- That the Indian Authorities have provided details of vessel ownership and in October 2015 committed to provide an inspection report on the vessel – at the time of writing none has been received.

At the time of writing, while we note our support for the continued practical work undertaken by the Indian authorities at national level to tackle the IUU problem, in light of the above facts and in the absence of any evidence from the flag State demonstrating that it has taken effective action or imposed sanctions of adequate severity [11/03, para 10(b)] in respect of this specific case, we recommend that the vessel is included on the IOTC IUU list.

I would be grateful if you could circulate this material for the information of the Compliance Committee.

#### 1. Introduction

On the 19<sup>th</sup> of April, 2015, The BIOT patrol vessel "Pacific Marlin" (BPV) was on an Offshore Island Sovereignty Patrol (OISP). Following the reported sighting of a possible fishing vessel in or near Salomon Islands by recreational yacht crew on 17/04, and the sighting and photographing of two probable Indian fishing vessels apparently anchored near Blenheim Reef by a surveillance flight on 18/04, the BPV, was on patrol in the vicinity of these sightings in inner sector 1.

During this patrol, the BPV detected, intercepted and boarded the Indian flagged multipurpose fishing vessel, *Beo Hingis*. The vessel was subsequently detained for having fished without a license in BIOT waters and possession of prohibited fishing gear.

**19/04/2015:** At 13:45, the SFPO sighted two possible targets on radar. After consulting with Captain Sandes and the OOW Emerson Santos, it was decided to alter course and investigate.

The details of the targets were as follows:

#### Target 1:

Position: 05° 08.4′; 072° 39.6′E.

Course: 048° Speed: 1.2 knots. Range: 8.92 nm. Bearing: 068°.

#### Target 2:

Position: 05° 07.5′; 072° 40.6′E.

Course: 103° Speed: 1.5 knots. Range: 9.7 nm. Bearing: 066°.

The speed and course of the vessels were consistent with fishing vessels hanging onto their gear. Their location, some 14nm NWW of Blenheim Reef was in deep water, suggesting if the vessels were fishing there, they were targeting either flying fish or other pelagic fish such as tuna.

At 14:05, both targets were sighted visually with the aid of binoculars and were of similar appearance to that sighted by the surveillance aircraft on 18/04/15 and were of similar description to the vessel seen by visiting yacht crew in Salomon Islands on the evening of 17/04/15. Both vessels appeared to be Indian type gill net / drift net fishing vessels.

At 14:20, the SFPO asked that the fisheries patrol pennant be raised.

At 14:30, as it appeared these boats were fishing vessels acting suspiciously in BIOT waters (not underway, and also having been sighted on Blenheim Reef and possibly around Salomon Islands), the SFPO asked the signals "Sierra Quebec Three", which signify "heave to, I intend to board you" be raised.

At 14:40 Contact with the vessels of VHF CH16 was attempted by the SFPO. No response was given.

At 14:48 the PAC (Pacific 24) was launched with SFPO Franklin, FPO Ashok, ROPO Hart, Sergeant Lucas, LCpl Brockhurst onboard and Mne Femson as Coxswain. The civilian passenger, Mr Luchmun remained onboard the BPV on standby as a potential translator.

At 14:52, the PAC circled target 1, allowing the SFPO to identify and photograph it. The vessel had the name *Thank You Jesus* on its bow and stern, and lettering on the bow, which although appeared to be in the format of an Indian fishing vessel registration number, could not be discerned due to its poor condition. In addition the vessel had the Indian flag flying from its bridge head and painted on its bow. The fishing vessel did not appear to be actively fishing, and was hanging off a sea anchor attached to its bowsprit. The SFPO recalled that a vessel with the name *Thank You Jesus* had been observed on the SE corner of Blenheim Reef by the surveillance flight at 1230 LT on 18/04/15.

During this time the BPV had radioed the PAC to inform it that the 2<sup>nd</sup> target had suddenly increased speed and was running in a NW direction at 6 to 7 knots. Subsequently, the SFPO asked that the PAC pursue this vessel, and that the BPV monitor the *Thank You Jesus*.

At 15:00 the PAC approached target 1, again circling the vessel to allow the SFPO to identify and photograph it. The vessel had the name *Beo Hingis* on the bow, with no name on the stern. The vessel also had an Indian flag flying from a forward mast. In addition the lettering KL-31788, IND-KL-04-MM-1617 and TN2/FV/01637/12 visible on the bridge bulkhead. The SFPO recalled that a vessel with the name *Beo Hingis* had been observed on the SE corner of Blenheim Reef by the surveillance flight at 1225 LT on 18/04/15. The SFPO gestured to the crew of the *Beo Hingis* to slow down.

#### 2. Boarding Details

At 15:05, once the *Beo Hingis* had slowed down and appeared to be cooperating with the inspection party, the PAC came alongside the portside of the fishing vessel, and the inspection party, including SFPO Franklin, FPO Ashok, ROPO Hart and LCpl Brockhurst, boarded the fishing vessel.

Upon boarding the SFPO asked for the Captain. A man at the wheel in the bridge, gestured to the SFPO that he was the Captain. The SFPO asked if he or any crew could speak English, to which the response was "Hindi". The SFPO then introduced himself by presenting his identification, pointing to his uniforms BIOT and United Kingdom badges, saying the words "BIOT" and "Fisheries Patrol", and stating he wished to inspect the fishing vessel. Upon heading to the bridge, the SFPO noted several hooks and lines were lying about the deck, some of which were baited and appeared ready to use,

and a monofilament gill net and drift net which were both stowed on the forward deck and did not appear to have been recently used.

The SFPO entered the Bridge with ROPO Hart in attendance while the rest of the inspection party stayed outside alongside the remainder of the crew. The SFPO, with the Captain, confirmed the FV's current position as 05° 05.6'S; 072° 41.9'E and the time of boarding as 15:05.

The SFPO asked to see the vessel and crew's paperwork. While the Captain did not speak much English, it was evident he had a basic understanding, and communication was achieved through sign language and use of basic terms. The Captain presented the SFPO with a copy of the *Certificate of Registry of a Fishing Boat*, issued by the Government of India (Kerala State) and a copy of the *Certificate of Registration for Fishing Vessels*, issued by the Marine Products Export Development Authority. The Certificate of Registry of Fishing Boat for the *Beo Hingis* included the following details:

The SFPO then asked to see the Captain's identification. This was presented as a duplicate copy of the Government of Tamilnadu Fishermen ID. The details included were:

And was signed by the Authorised Officer, asst. Director of Fisheries, Extension and Training Colachel. There were a total of 12 crew, including the Captain, all of Indian nationality.

The SFPO asked the Captain what sort of fishing he was doing. Initially the Captain did not understand, but after mentioning various types the captain said "no net, line". Initially the SFPO understood this to be longline, and asked how long the longline was, and the Captain responded "not longline, deep line". The SFPO understood this to mean handlines for bottom fishing which was consistent with observations of baited handlines lying on the deck.

The SFPO then then asked the Captain where he had last been fishing. The Captain showed the SFPO and ROPO Hart the coordinates 05°00′S; and 072° 00′E on the FV's GPS. The SFPO knew this to be inside BIOT and located between Speakers Bank, Peros Banhos and Salomon Islands.

The SFPO subsequently asked what fish was on board and how much, showing the Captain various identification sheets, but the Captain did not understand, or chose not to respond.

At 15:25 the SFPO cautioned the Captain in the presence of ROPO Hart, and asked the Captain again to confirm where he had been fishing, using a map. The Captain, indicated the area, and countersigned the map showing the position of the boarding and the approximate location of his fishing activity. The SFPO then asked the Captain if he is aware he is in BIOT waters, pointing to the British and BIOT flag on his uniform, to which the Captain responded that "I am Indian this is Indian Ocean". The SFPO asked again for the Captain to confirm he had been fishing in BIOT, by pointing at the map and asking "fishing?". The Captain said yes, again saying "Indian Ocean for Indians". The SFPO then asked if the other boat "Thank You Jesus" had also been fishing in the same area, to which the response was yes.

At 15:28 The SFPO entered the fish hold with the Captain. Within the fish hold, approximately 250 kg of various fish was observed in separate compartments under ice. This included a box of flying fish, various snappers groupers, emperors, 3 grey reef tip sharks, one dogtooth tuna, several barracuda, kawakawa and rainbow runners. Fish was fresh and appeared to have been caught within the last few days. Furthermore, all fish are commonly associated on or around shallow water reefs, and in the SFPO's opinion, could only have been caught in BIOT given the distance to the next nearest shallow water reefs. This corroborated the Captain's statement. The SFPO asked how these fish had been caught, and the Captain responded only line. The SFPO then asked how the Captain had caught flying fish, and the Captain responded with gillnet, but the flying fish is only used for bait. The SFPO asked if the flying fish was also "caught here", and the Captain responded yes.

The SFPO then exited the fish hold and photographed the fishing gear. As previously noted there was a monofilament gillnet and drift net separately stowed on the forward deck, while several monofilament lines, buoys (unmarked) and hooks, some of which were baited, were lying about the deck. There was also some hooks on wire trace in the bridge.

At 15:35 the SFPO told the Captain the FV would be required to follow the BPV to Diego Garcia where it would be arrested for fishing without a license in BIOT waters and possession of prohibited fishing gear, namely wire trace. The SFPO asked if the Captain had understood to which the Captain gave no response. The SFPO then called the BPV on CH16 and asked that Mr Luchmun explain to the Captain that the fishing vessel is being ordered to follow the BPV to Diego Garcia. Mr. Luchmun then communicated to the SFPO that the Captain had understood. The SFPO then asked the Captain to call the *Thank You Jesus* and tell them to prepare to be boarded.

#### 3. Recovery

At 15:40 the inspection team then disembarked the FV and proceeded to the *Thank You Jesus*. At 16:00 the inspection of the *Thank You Jesus* was completed and the inspection team was recovered to the BPV at 16:02.

Both vessels initially appeared non-cooperative and were taking a NW course. The BPV then circled around behind them and then both FVs eventually started following the BPV towards Diego Garcia.

#### 4. Subsequent actions

At 22:15, while escorting the FVs to Diego Garcia, and in force 6-7 seas and squally conditions, the two FVs suddenly split away from each other with the *Beo Hingis* increasing speed to 6 knots, albeit maintaining its course, while the *Thank You Jesus* maintained its course and speed at 2-3 knots. Radio contact with the *Beo Hingis* was attempted with Mr Luchmun translating but with no response. The *Thank You Jesus* was then contacted with Mr Luchmun translating and responded that it was also unable to contact the *Beo Hingis*. The *Thank You Jesus* was asked to increase its speed but responded it was unable to due to the weather.

The BPV then went to chase down the *Beo Hingis* which was now 1.5 nm distant after ordering the *Thank You Jesus* to maintain its course and speed. The Captain was told that any significant changes or attempted escapes would be considered as obstruction of a Fisheries Officer and he would be charged as such. The Captain of the *Thank You Jesus* responded that he understood and he would maintain his course and speed.

Upon approaching the *Beo Hingis*, the FV was hailed using loud hailer. Radio contact was then reestablished using CH12. The *Beo Hingis* stated that it was unable to maintain such a slow course and had to speed up. At this time, the *Thank You Jesus* suddenly changed course and increased speed, also not responding to radio communications. As chasing down both vessels, which were now 3nm distant from each other, risked losing both, particularly in the current sea state and low visibility, it was decided to maintain the escort of the *Beo Hingis* to Diego Garcia. The *Thank You Jesus* was last seen in the area of 05° 24′S; 072° 20′E, steaming NW at 6.5 knots. It is the SFPO's opinion that this was a coordinated action in order to allow one or both of the FVs to escape.

## **RECORD OF PROCEEDINGS 27<sup>th</sup> July 2015**

The following two charges which had been laid against you were heard by the British Indian Ocean Territory (BIOT) Magistrates Court on the **Twenty Seventh day of July 2015**.

**1.** Fishing without a licence in BIOT waters contrary to Sections 7(1) and 7(2)(i) of the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2007.

#### Which specifically alleged:

That you, Mr. P Nasians S/O Peter, being the Owner of fishing boat Beo Hingis did, between the 9th April 2015 and the 19th April 2015, fish within the fishing waters of the British Indian Ocean Territory without a licence. Contrary to Section 7(1) and Section 7(2)(i) of the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2007.

2. Possession of prohibited fishing gear in BIOT Waters contrary to Section 6(2) and 6(3)(i) Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2007.

#### Which specifically alleged:

That you, Mr. P Nasians S/O Peter, being the Owner of fishing boat Beo Hingis on which there was found within the fishing waters of the British Indian Ocean Territory on the between the 9th April 2015 and the 19th April 2015 found in possession of prohibited fishing gear, namely wire trace line. Contrary to Section 6(2) & 6(3)(i) of the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2007.

Following your recent correspondence with the Clerk of the Magistrates' Court, the court recorded pleas of **GUILTY** on your behalf, in respect of each of the charges alleged against you. The evidence concerning the particulars of your case was then read out by the prosecution. Having heard all of that evidence the

#### Report on the investigation of the Indian vessel Beo Hingis in British Indian Ocean Territory (BIOT) Waters

The Indian flagged vessel Beo Hingis was detained on suspicion of being involved in illegal activities, namely illegal fishing, pending a criminal investigation into the same.

The owner of the vessel, Mr P Naisans S/O Peter (of St Thomas Nager, Thhothor-629176, Kanyakumari Dist. Tamil Nadu, India) entered guilty pleas to the following offences: (see attached Court Proceedings):.

- Fishing without a licence in BIOT waters contrary to Sections 7(1) & 7(2)(i) of the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2007.
- Possession of Prohibited fishing gear contrary to Section 6 (2) of the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2007.

# Bilateral Communication on the investigation of the Indian vessel Beo Hingis in British Indian Ocean Territory (BIOT) Waters

As previously notified to you on 28<sup>th</sup> July 2015 the Indian flagged vessel Beo Hingis was detained on suspicion of being involved in illegal activities, namely illegal fishing, pending a criminal investigation into the same.

The owner of the vessel, Mr P Naisans S/O Peter (of St Thomas Nager, Thhothor-629176, Kanyakumari Dist. Tamil Nadu, India) entered guilty pleas to the following offences: (see attached Court Proceedings):

- Fishing without a licence in BIOT waters contrary to Sections 7(1) & 7(2)(i) of the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2007.
- Possession of Prohibited fishing gear contrary to Section 6 (2) of the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2007.

On  $27^{th}$  July 2015 the vessel owner was fined £10,000 for the first offence and £2,000 for the second offence (plus £90 costs) with fishing gear to be forfeited to the crown for disposal.

The BIOT Administration can confirm that the fine has **not** been paid by the due date of (27<sup>th</sup> August 2015).

We would request that India as flag State of the vessel provides to the BIOT Administration within 30 days (i.e.26<sup>th</sup> September 2015) details of any actions taken in respect of the vessel, owner or master, including supporting evidence as per IOTC Resolution 10/11 (para.17.5). We shall report the details to the IOTC Secretariat, including our recommendation with respect to IUU listing, after reviewing that the flag State actions indicated in your feedback are of adequate severity as required in Resolution 11/03 paragraph 10b, nominally after 26<sup>th</sup> September.

The Ministry of External Affairs, Republic of India, presents its compliments to the British High Commission in New Delhi and has the honour of referring to its Note Verbale CH/376/15 dated 21 May 2015 and this Ministry's Note Verbale No. WI(A)/415/07/2015 dated 05 October 2015 attaching therewith the ownership details and technical information of the 12 fishing vessels received from the Government of Tarnil Nadu, India.

In this connection, it is informed that there is no operational fishing harbor facility in Kanyakumari District and due to this most of the mechanized fishing boats of Kanyakumari District are operating from fishing bases in Kerala and other States. The fishing vessels reportedly go out for fishing from some fishing base in Kerala or other States when they are sighted and apprehended by British Indian Ocean Territory (BIOT) authorities. The mechanized fishing vessels on which the British Foreign and Commonwealth (FCO) had requested for inspection reports, have not yet reported to the authorized officer of the Government of Tamil Nadu. The concerned authorized officer of Tamil Nadu Government have issued summons to the owners of those fishing vessels to appear before them and subject their vessels to inspection. This process would take about a minimum of 4 months time to complete and furnish the inspection report.

The Ministry of External Affairs of the Republic of India avails of this opportunity to renew to the esteemed British High Commission the assurances of its highest consideration.

# Resolution 11/03 On establishing a list of vessels presumed to have carried out IUU fishing in the IOTC Area of Competence: Indian Flagged Vessel Joshva

As required in paragraph 2 of Resolution 11/03 please find attached a completed IOTC Reporting form for Illegal Activity and accompanying evidence supporting the presumption of IUU fishing activity for the Indian flagged vessel Joshva. The vessel is not on the IOTC Record of Authorised Vessels as defined under Resolution 15/04.

The attached evidence shows

- That the vessel, equipped with gill nets and longlines, had tuna and tuna like species on board (see Appendix IX - kawakawa and dogtooth tuna);
- Was found guilty by the BIOT Court on Diego Garcia of illegal fishing and was fined;
- That the fine has not been paid (and at the time of writing this remains the case);
- That the BIOT Administration has kept the Indian Authorities fully informed of the progress on each case;
- That the Indian Authorities have provided details of vessel ownership and in October 2015 committed to provide an inspection report on the vessel – at the time of writing none has been received.

At the time of writing, while we note our support for the continued practical work undertaken by the Indian authorities at national level to tackle the IUU problem, in light of the above facts and in the absence of any evidence from the flag State demonstrating that it has taken effective action or imposed sanctions of adequate severity [11/03, para 10(b)] in respect of this specific case, we recommend that the vessel is included on the IOTC IUU list.

I would be grateful if you could circulate this material for the information of the Compliance Committee.

#### 1. Introduction

At 19:00 hours on the 10<sup>th</sup> May 2015 the BPV (Pacific Marlin) was on a routine BIOT patrol. SFPO David Hughes called to bridge to confirm to radar contacts showing two vessels operating at low speed in a manner consistent with vessels conducting fishing operations. The SFPO asked that the fisheries patrol pennant be raised and Sierra Quebec Three.

The targets are as follows.

#### Target 1/2

Position: Both boats in position 04°52.1S 072°13.1E

# 2. Situation

19.47 hours workboat launched and intercepted the two fishing vessels (FV) the SFPO was able to identify the vessels names as Joshva and Joshva No1. Both vessels were photographed by the SFPO. The SFPO was able to identify visually that the two vessels intercepted were the two FV that had failed to comply with previous boarding instructions on the 3<sup>rd</sup> May 2015.

20.15 hours The SFPO accompanied by the FPO, s boarded the Joshva. On boarding fresh fish were seen on deck and photographed by the SFPO, some still alive.

The SFPO took the person purporting to be the captain to the bridge and with the aide of the FPO was able to agree with the captain of the FV his current position on the FV GPS unit. The captain was the shown a chart from the boarding forms and signed to show that he was aware of his current position.

The SFPO then cautioned the captain and informed him he was to follow our course to DG. The SFPO and FPO were then recovered by the workboat at 20.40 hours and proceeded to the other FV, Joshva No1.

During hours of darkness the FV Joshva kept taking evasive manoeuvres with the BPV, the SFPO monitored the situation threw the night and at 08.00 hours on the 11<sup>th</sup> May 2015 the workboat was

launched again to intercept and board FV Joshva. The boat was re-photographed in daylight to confirm its identity and subsequently boarded.

The SFPO instructed the captain to maintain a course set by the BPV and maintain a speed of 5 knots. SFPO recovered by work boat 08.06 hours.

The SFPO and workboat maintained a position to the sterns of both fishing vessels to make sure the boats followed the course set and returned to BPV at 09.22 hours.

The Indian flagged vessel Joshva was reported as being ordered back to Diego Garcia for inspection on the 3<sup>rd</sup> May 2015 on suspicion of being involved in illegal activities, namely illegal fishing. This notification was made via the Note Verbale CH/376/15 from the British High Commission to the Ministry of External Affairs.

The vessel Joshva was detained again by the BIOT Authorities on the 10th May 2015 on suspicion of being involved in illegal activities, namely illegal fishing, pending a criminal investigation into the same. It was released on the 22<sup>nd</sup> May 2015 pending the outcome of that investigation and a decision with regard to what further action is to be taken.

The Master was instructed to leave BIOT waters directly and to return the FV to port. In respect of our commitment under IOTC to combat illegal fishing we would kindly request the assistance of the relevant Indian Federal and State Authorities, and request notification of any actions taken by any organisations in conducting a regulatory investigation into the activities of the vessel. Previous actions carried out by other flag States in order to meet the requirements of IOTC Resolution 10/11 on Port State Measures (para 17.4) have included the following:

- Recall the vessel to port immediately;
- Notify the relevant port authorities to detain the vessel on arrival:
- Suspension of the licence of the vessel and other relevant flag State actions;
- Notification of the owner / master to comply with any FPN or court order that may arise from the BIOT authorities; and,
- Pending further action by the BIOT and Indian authorities we would request that the vessel is detained in port.

The Ministry of External Affairs, Republic of India, presents its compliments to the British High Commission in New Delhi and has the honour of referring to its Note Verbale CH/376/15 dated 21 May 2015 and this Ministry's Note Verbale No. WI(A)/415/07/2015 dated 05 October 2015 attaching therewith the ownership details and technical information of the 12 fishing vessels received from the Government of Tarnil Nadu, India.

In this connection, it is informed that there is no operational fishing harbor facility in Kanyakumari District and due to this most of the mechanized fishing boats of Kanyakumari District are operating from fishing bases in Kerala and other States. The fishing vessels reportedly go out for fishing from some fishing base in Kerala or other States when they are sighted and apprehended by British Indian Ocean Territory (BIOT) authorities. The mechanized fishing vessels on which the British Foreign and Commonwealth (FCO) had requested for inspection reports, have not yet reported to the authorized officer of the Government of Tamil Nadu. The concerned authorized officer of Tamil Nadu Government have issued summons to the owners of those fishing vessels to appear before them and subject their vessels to inspection. This process would take about a minimum of 4 months time to complete and furnish the inspection report.

The Ministry of External Affairs of the Republic of India avails of this opportunity to renew to the esteemed British High Commission the assurances of its highest consideration.

# Resolution 11/03 On establishing a list of vessels presumed to have carried out IUU fishing in the IOTC Area of Competence: Indian Flagged Vessel Joshva No. 1

As required in paragraph 2 of Resolution 11/03 please find attached a completed IOTC Reporting form for Illegal Activity and accompanying evidence supporting the presumption of IUU fishing activity for the Indian flagged vessel Joshva No. 1. The vessel is not on the IOTC Record of Authorised Vessels as defined under Resolution 15/04.

The attached evidence shows

- That the vessel, equipped with gill nets and longlines, had tuna and tuna like species on board (see photos);
- Was found guilty by the BIOT Court on Diego Garcia of illegal fishing and was fined;
- That the fine has not been paid (and at the time of writing this remains the case);
- That the BIOT Administration has kept the Indian Authorities fully informed of the progress on each case;
- That the Indian Authorities have provided details of vessel ownership and in October 2015 committed to provide an inspection report on the vessel – at the time of writing none has been received.

At the time of writing, while we note our support for the continued practical work undertaken by the Indian authorities at national level to tackle the IUU problem, in light of the above facts and in the absence of any evidence from the flag State demonstrating that it has taken effective action or imposed sanctions of adequate severity [11/03, para 10(b)] in respect of this specific case, we recommend that the vessel is included on the IOTC IUU list.

#### 1. Introduction

At 19:00 hours on the 10<sup>th</sup> May 2015 the BPV (Pacific Marlin) was on a routine BIOT patrol. SFPO David Hughes called to bridge to confirm to radar contacts showing two vessels operating at low speed in a manner consistent with vessels conducting fishing operations. The SFPO asked that the fisheries patrol pennant be raised and Sierra Quebec Three.

# 2. Situation

19.47 hours workboat launched and intercepted the two fishing vessels the SFPO was able to identify the vessels names as Joshva and Joshva No1. Both vessels were photographed by the SFPO. The SFPO was able to identify visually that the two vessels intercepted were the two FV that had failed to comply with previous boarding instructions on the 3<sup>rd</sup> May 2015.

20.45 hours The SFPO accompanied by the FPO, s boarded the Joshva. On boarding fresh fish were seen on deck and photographed by the SFPO, some still alive.

The SFPO took the person purporting to be the captain to the bridge and with the aide of the FPO was able to agree with the captain of the FV his current position on the FV GPS unit. The captain was the shown a chart from the boarding forms and signed to show that he was aware of his current position.

The SFPO then cautioned the captain and informed him he was to follow our course to DG. The SFPO and FPO were then recovered by the workboat and returned to the BPV.

During hours of darkness the FV Joshva No1 kept taking evasive manoeuvres with the BPV, the SFPO monitored the situation threw the night and at 08.00 hours on the 11<sup>th</sup> May 2015 the workboat was

launched again to intercept and board FV Joshva No1. The boat was re-photographed in daylight to confirm its identity and subsequently boarded.

The SFPO instructed the captain to maintain a course set by the BPV and maintain a speed of 5 knots. SFPO recovered by work boat 08.20 hours.

The SFPO and workboat maintained a position to the sterns of both fishing vessels to make sure the boats followed the course set and returned to BPV at 09.22 hours.

The Indian flagged vessel Joshva No.1 was reported as being ordered back to Diego Garcia for inspection on the 3<sup>rd</sup> May 2015 on suspicion of being involved in illegal activities, namely illegal fishing. This notification was made via the Note Verbale CH/376/15 from the British High Commission to the Ministry of External Affairs.

The vessel Joshva No.1 was detained again by the BIOT Authorities on the 10<sup>th</sup> May 2015 on suspicion of being involved in illegal activities, namely illegal fishing, pending a criminal investigation into the same. It was released on the 22<sup>nd</sup> May 2015 pending the outcome of that investigation and a decision with regard to what further action is to be taken.

The Master was instructed to leave BIOT waters directly and to return the FV to port. In respect of our commitment under IOTC to combat illegal fishing we would kindly request the assistance of the relevant Indian Federal and State Authorities, and request notification of any actions taken by any organisations in conducting a regulatory investigation into the activities of the vessel. Previous actions carried out by other flag States in order to meet the requirements of IOTC Resolution 10/11 on Port State Measures (para 17.4) have included the following:

- · Recall the vessel to port immediately;
- Notify the relevant port authorities to detain the vessel on arrival;
- Suspension of the licence of the vessel and other relevant flag State actions;

**2.** Possession of prohibited fishing gear in BIOT Waters contrary to Section 6(2) and 6(3)(i) Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2007.

#### Which specifically alleged:

In this connection, it is informed that there is no operational fishing harbor facility in Kanyakumari District and due to this most of the mechanized fishing boats of Kanyakumari District are operating from fishing bases in Kerala and other States. The fishing vessels reportedly go out for fishing from some fishing base in Kerala or other States when they are sighted and apprehended by British Indian Ocean Territory (BIOT) authorities. The mechanized fishing vessels on which the British Foreign and Commonwealth (FCO) had requested for inspection reports, have not yet reported to the authorized officer of the Government of Tamil Nadu. The concerned authorized officer of Tamil Nadu Government have issued summons to the owners of those fishing vessels to appear before them and subject their vessels to inspection. This process would take about a minimum of 4 months time to complete and furnish the inspection report.

The Ministry of External Affairs of the Republic of India avails of this opportunity to renew to the esteemed British High Commission the assurances of its highest consideration.

## Resolution 11/03 On establishing a list of vessels presumed to have carried out IUU fishing in the IOTC Area of Competence: Indian Flagged Vessel Sacred Heart

As required in paragraph 2 of Resolution 11/03 please find attached a completed IOTC Reporting form for Illegal Activity and accompanying evidence supporting the presumption of IUU fishing activity for the Indian flagged vessel Sacred Heart. The vessel is not on the IOTC Record of Authorised Vessels as defined under Resolution 15/04.

The attached evidence shows

- That the vessel, equipped with gill nets and longlines, had tuna and tuna like species on board (see photos and Statement of Evidence);
- Was found guilty by the BIOT Court on Diego Garcia of illegal fishing and was fined;
- That the fine has not been paid (and at the time of writing this remains the case);
- That the BIOT Administration has kept the Indian Authorities at State and National level fully informed of the progress on each case.

At the time of writing, while we note our support for the continued practical work undertaken by the Indian authorities at national level to tackle the IUU problem, in light of the above facts and in the absence of any evidence from the flag State demonstrating that it has taken effective action or imposed sanctions of adequate severity [11/03, para 10(b)] in respect of this specific case, we recommend that the vessel is included on the IOTC IUU list.

The Indian flagged vessel SACRED HEART (IND-TN-15-MM-4874), a multipurpose fishing vessel, approximately 50ft in length was detained on the 6<sup>th</sup> October 2015 in the BIOT Marine Protected Area (MPA) on suspicion of illegal fishing.

## Report on the investigation of the Indian vessel Sacred Heart in British Indian Ocean Territory (BIOT) Waters

The Indian flagged vessel Sacred Heart (IND-TN-15-MM-4874) was detained on suspicion of being involved in illegal activities, namely illegal fishing, pending a criminal investigation into the same.

The Master of the vessel, Mr P Newton S/O Paniadimai (of 2-46 Anbiyam 36, Eravi Puthen Thurai, Vilavan code – TK, Kanya Kumari District, Tamil Nadu, India) entered a guilty plea to the following offence: (see attached Court Proceedings):.

• Fishing without a licence in BIOT waters contrary to Sections 7(1) & 7(2)(i) of the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2007.

On 30<sup>th</sup> October 2015 the vessel Master was fined £6,700 for the offence (plus £120 costs). The Master of the vessel has 90 days to pay the fines.

The vessel was released on 5<sup>th</sup> November. The Master was instructed to leave BIOT waters directly and to return the FV to port. The vessel is now on its way back to India and should arrive in the next few days. In respect of our commitment under IOTC to combat illegal fishing we would kindly request the assistance of the relevant Indian Federal and State Authorities, and request notification of any actions taken by any organisations in conducting a regulatory investigation into the activities of the vessel. Previous actions carried out by other flag States in order to meet the requirements of IOTC Resolution 10/11 on Port State Measures (para 17.4) have included the following:

- Recall the vessel to port immediately;
- Notify the relevant port authorities to detain the vessel on arrival;
- Suspension of the licence of the vessel and other relevant flag State actions;
- Notification of the owner / master to pay the fine as set by the BIOT authorities; and,
- Detain the vessel in port pending payment of the fine and any further action by the BIOT and Indian authorities.

#### Resolution 11/03 On establishing a list of vessels presumed to have carried out IUU fishing in the IOTC Area of Competence: Indian Flagged Vessel Vachanam

As required in paragraph 2 of Resolution 11/03 please find attached a completed IOTC Reporting form for Illegal Activity and accompanying evidence supporting the presumption of IUU fishing activity for the Indian flagged vessel Vachanam. The vessel is not on the IOTC Record of Authorised Vessels as defined under Resolution 15/04.

The attached evidence shows

- That the vessel, equipped with gill nets and longlines, had tuna and tuna like species on board (see Statement of Evidence, tuna and marlin);
- Was found guilty by the BIOT Court on Diego Garcia of illegal fishing and was fined;
- That the fine has not been paid (and at the time of writing this remains the case);
- That the BIOT Administration has kept the Indian Authorities fully informed of the progress on each case;
- That the Indian Authorities have provided details of vessel ownership and in October 2015 committed to provide an inspection report on the vessel – at the time of writing none has been received.

At the time of writing, while we note our support for the continued practical work undertaken by the Indian authorities at national level to tackle the IUU problem, in light of the above facts and in the absence of any evidence from the flag State demonstrating that it has taken effective action or imposed sanctions of adequate severity [11/03, para 10(b)] in respect of this specific case, we recommend that the vessel is included on the IOTC IUU list.

#### Introduction

On the 3<sup>rd</sup> may 2015, The BIOT patrol vessel "Pacific Marlin" (BPV) was on a BIOTA Patrol, visiting the Peros Banhos Islands, when it encountered, intercepted and boarded three Indian flagged fishing vessels, including the Vachanam, which was subsequently detained and ordered to sail to Diego Garcia for fishing without a license and possession of prohibited fishing gear.

**03/05/2015:** At 09.35 hours SFPO David Hughes was called to bridge by FPO Thomas Franklin as possible fishing boat targets had been sighted.

When the SFPO arrived to the bridge, three distanct radar traces were flagged and later visually identified as probable Indian fishing vessels.

After consulting with Captain Sandes and the OOW Emerson Santos, it was decided to alter course and investigate.

The details of the targets were as follows:

#### Target 1:

Position: 05° 16.7S'; 071.44.1'E.

Course: 006° Speed: 5 knots. Range: 4.5 nm. Bearing: 249°.

#### Target 2:

Position: 05.15s'; 71.44.2'E.

Course: 30° Speed: 5.6knots. Range: 3.5 nm. Bearing: 255°.

#### Target3:

Position: 05.15S'; 071.43.8'E.

Course: 32°

Speed: 5.7knots. Range: 3.1 nm. Bearing: 262°

At 9.40, all targets were sighted visually with the aid of binoculars and confirmed as being Indian style fishing vessels.

At 10.10 hours the SFPO asked for the for fisheries patrol pennants to be raised. At 10.12 hours, attempts were made by VHF to establish contact with the fishing vessel, there was no response to our radio request.

At 10.38 hours the workboat was launched with SFPO David Hughes, FPO Thomas Franklin, FPO Vic Andrino and Coxswain Jesus Gano.

On approaching the vessel the SFPO photographed all external markings on bow stern and port and starboard side, as well photographed baited hooks hanging over the side of the vessel.

#### **Boarding Details**

At 11.28 hours the workboat came alongside the vessel Vachanam. The boarding party included SFPO David Hughes, FPO Thomas Franklin and FPO Vic Andres. On boarding indicated to all crew weather any English was spoken a negative response but was able to ascertain who appeared to be the captain

On boarding the vessel, there was clear evidence of recent fishing activity. Baited handline hooks were on the deck as well as cut up bait ready for use. The SFPO, communicated with the crew to establish the identity of the captain. The SFPO then signaled to the Captain to show him to the bridge. Once on the bridge, the SFPO asked to see the vessel's documents by repeating "license" and miming writing. The Captain handed me the following:

2. two ID cards showing ID as J Robinson and Simen Raj

The SFPO proceeded to process the paperwork and fill in the inspection report form while FPO Franklin inspected the fish hold and fishing gear.

At FPO Franklin returned to the bridge stating that there was approximately 2,200kg of fish in the hold including reef fish, sharks, tuna and a marlin.

The SFPO then proceeded to caution the captain in the presence of FPO Franklin and Andrino. The SFPO indicated to the GPS unit to show the vessels present position and to show on the inspection report chart, the vessel's current position 5.12.4S 71.41.9e as well. The fishing vessels captain appeared not to understand English but nodded that he was aware of the vessels position and was in BIOT waters.

The SFPO then asked to see the Captain's identification. This was presented as a duplicate copy of the Government of Tamilnadu Fishermen ID. The details included were:

And was signed by the Authorised Officer, asst. Director of Fisheries, Extension and Training Colachel. There were a total of 12 crew, including the Captain, all of Indian nationality.

The SFPO then then asked the Captain to show me his current position using sign language. The Captain showed the SFPO as 05.12.4S 71.41.9E on the gps plotter and indicated the position on the chart boarding form and signed the chart to that effect. The captain was then given the coordinates for Diego Garcia as 07.14.5S 072.23.2 E and using appropriate sign language was told to proceed to this way point for his vessel to be inspected in port.

SFPO David Hughes then indicated to the workboat to recover the boarding party. At 11.15 the boarding party disembarked the FV and proceeded to inspect the final vessels.

#### Recovery

The workboat and boarding team was recovered at 11:52 hours. The BPV then continued its BIOTA tasking, monitoring the FVs by radar. All three vessels appeared dead in the water, showing no indication of complying with the SFPO's instruction to head to Diego Garcia.

## Bilateral Communication on the investigation of the Indian vessel Vachanam in British Indian Ocean Territory (BIOT) Waters

As previously notified to you on 28th July 2015 the Indian flagged vessel Vachanam was detained on suspicion of being involved in illegal activities, namely illegal fishing, pending a criminal investigation into the same.

The owner of the vessel, Mr Satrin T. having not corresponded with the court had pleas of **NOT GUILTY** to the following offences entered: (see attached Court Proceedings):

- Fishing without a licence in BIOT waters contrary to Sections 7(1) & 7(2)(i) of the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2007.
- Possession of Prohibited fishing gear contrary to Section 6 (2) of the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2007.

On 27th July 2015 the vessel owner was found guilty of both offences and fined £30,000 for the first offence and £4,000 for the second offence (plus £120 costs) with fishing gear to be forfeited to the crown for disposal.

The BIOT Administration can confirm that the fine has **not** been paid by the due date of (27<sup>th</sup> August 2015).

We would request that India as flag State of the vessel provides to the BIOT Administration within 30 days (i.e.26<sup>th</sup> September 2015) details of any actions taken in respect of the vessel, owner or master, including supporting evidence as per IOTC Resolution 10/11 (para.17.5). We shall report the details to the IOTC Secretariat, including our recommendation with respect to IUU listing, after reviewing that the flag State actions indicated in your feedback are of adequate severity as required in Resolution 11/03 paragraph 10b, nominally after 26<sup>th</sup> September.

In this connection, it is informed that there is no operational fishing harbor facility in Kanyakumari District and due to this most of the mechanized fishing boats of Kanyakumari District are operating from fishing bases in Kerala and other States. The fishing vessels reportedly go out for fishing from some fishing base in Kerala or other States when they are sighted and apprehended by British Indian Ocean Territory (BIOT) authorities. The mechanized fishing vessels on which the British Foreign and Commonwealth (FCO) had requested for inspection reports, have not yet reported to the authorized officer of the Government of Tamil Nadu. The concerned authorized officer of Tamil Nadu Government have issued summons to the owners of those fishing vessels to appear before them and subject their vessels to inspection. This process would take about a minimum of 4 months time to complete and furnish the inspection report.

The Ministry of External Affairs of the Republic of India avails of this opportunity to renew to the esteemed British High Commission the assurances of its highest consideration.

As required in paragraph 2 of Resolution 11/03 please find attached a completed IOTC Reporting form for Illegal Activity and accompanying evidence supporting the presumption of IUU fishing activity for the Indian flagged vessel Wisdom. The vessel is not on the IOTC Record of Authorised Vessels as defined under Resolution 15/04.

The attached evidence shows

- That the vessel, equipped with gill nets and longlines, had tuna and tuna like species on board (see Statement of Evidence- Kawakawa);
- Was found guilty by the BIOT Court on Diego Garcia of illegal fishing and was fined;
- That the fine has not been paid (and at the time of writing this remains the case);
- That the BIOT Administration has kept the Indian Authorities at State and National level fully informed of the progress on each case.

At the time of writing, while we note our support for the continued practical work undertaken by the Indian authorities at national level to tackle the IUU problem, in light of the above facts and in the absence of any evidence from the flag State demonstrating that it has taken effective action or imposed sanctions of adequate severity [11/03, para 10(b)] in respect of this specific case, we recommend that the vessel is included on the IOTC IUU list.

On 30<sup>th</sup> October 2015 the vessel Owner was fined £14,000 for both offences (plus £120 costs). The Owner of the vessel has 90 days to pay the fines.

The vessel was released on 5<sup>th</sup> November. The Master was instructed to leave BIOT waters directly and to return the FV to port. The vessel is now on its way back to India and should arrive in the next few days. In respect of our commitment under IOTC to combat illegal fishing we would kindly request the assistance of the relevant Indian Federal and State Authorities, and request notification of any actions taken by any organisations in conducting a regulatory investigation into the activities of the vessel. Previous actions carried out by other flag States in order to meet the requirements of IOTC Resolution 10/11 on Port State Measures (para 17.4) have included the following:

- Recall the vessel to port immediately;
- Notify the relevant port authorities to detain the vessel on arrival;
- Suspension of the licence of the vessel and other relevant flag State actions;
- Notification of the owner / master to pay the fine as set by the BIOT authorities; and,
- Detain the vessel in port pending payment of the fine and any further action by the BIOT and Indian

authorities.

On the **28**<sup>th</sup> day of October **2015** you admitted having committed the following criminal offences before the British Indian Ocean Territory (BIOT) Magistrates Court.

#### **CHARGES**

 That you, Lawrence s/o Vincent, being the Owner of the Indian Registered Vessel Wisdom IND- TN-15-MM-395 were between the 4th October 2015 and the 7th October 2015 found fishing in the waters of the British Indian Ocean Territory without a licence.

Contrary to Sections 7(1) and 7(2)(i) of the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2007.

## THE PARTICULARS OF THAT OFFENCE BEING THAT

On Tuesday the 6th October 2015 the Indian Registered Fishing Vessel the Wisdom IND- TN-15-MM-395 of which you are the registered owner was intercepted by the British Patrol Vessel the Marlin at the coral atoll known as Speakers Bank within the Marine Protected Area of the British Indian Ocean Territory having been engaged in fishing activity there without having a licence issued by the Administration of the British Indian Ocean Territory to do the same.

#### You also admitted that:

 You are also charged that you, Lawrence s/o Vincent, being the Owner of the Indian Registered Vessel Wisdom IND- TN-15-MM-395 were between the 4th October 2015 and the 7th October 2015 found having used prohibited fishing gear, namely wire trace lines, within the fishing waters of the British Indian Ocean Territory.

Contrary to 6(1)(b) & 6(3)(i) of the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2007.

#### THE PARTICULARS OF THAT OFFENCE BEING THAT

On Tuesday the 6th October 2015 on the Indian Registered Fishing Vessel the Wisdom IND- TN-15-MM-395 of which you are the registered owner was found an amount of fishing gear which it is not legal to possess in the British Indian Ocean Territory, namely wire trace.

On the **30th day October 2015** you again appeared before the BIOT Magistrates Court where you were sentenced as follows:

#### Sentence passed by the Court (30th October 2015)

In respect of the charge of fishing without a licence you were ordered to pay a fine of **20,000 GBP**.

In respect of the charge of being in possession of prohibited fishing gear in BIOT waters, namely wire trace, you were ordered to pay a fine **1,000 GBP**.

The Magistrate reduced the totality of the sum that you were fined to **14,000GBP** to take into account your mitigation. You were also ordered to pay Court costs of **120 GBP**.

Payment was ordered to be made within 90 days.

This sentence required that your vessel remain in Diego Garcia until such time as the fine was paid in full.

However, after that hearing new material facts relating to the specific circumstances of your case became known. In light of this new information the prosecution applied on your behalf for the court to reconsider your sentence, taking into account those facts.

On the 4<sup>th</sup> day of November 2015, the prosecution were successful in their application to the court to have your case re-opened and your sentence was reconsidered and varied as follows:

You are still required to pay the total fine of 14,000GBP and costs in the sum of 120 GBP but the court no longer requires the detention of your vessel in Diego Garcia pending the receipt of those monies and accordingly you shall be permitted to leave the territory under escort with your crew in your vessel on the 5<sup>th</sup> day of November 2015.

If you wish to appeal the sentence and or conviction you must do so within the next 30 days. The deadline for any such notification of an appeal is therefore 30<sup>th</sup> day of November 2015.

#### 1 introduction

The BIOT patrol vessel "Pacific Marlin" (BPV) was on routine fisheries patrol. During this patrol, the BPV detected, intercepted and boarded the Sri Lankan flagged multipurpose fishing vessel, Yasiru Putha No1. The vessel was subsequently detained for suspicion of having fished illegally in BIOT waters.

**30/05/2015 03.44**: SFPO David Hughes was called to the bridge by the OOW confirming a visual and radar fix of a vessel operating at very low speed within BIOT waters at a distance of 7.18 nautical miles. It was also observed to have flashing maker lights nearby, indicating that it may have fishing gear in the water.

#### 2 Situation.

**05.12:** The workboat was launched with the SFPO and 3 crew on board including FPO Ashok J Adikari to act as translator.

#### 2. Boarding Details

**05.29**: The workboat circled the FV taking photos to for identification purposes and to record the fact it was engaged in fishing operations, this was evident as a net was being hauled on board when the SFPO boarded the vessel.

Once boarded, the SFPO with the aid of the FPO acting as translator, was able to ascertain who the master was and was shown into the wheelhouse. The FV captain identified himself by showing his ID as well as providing the ID of two other crew members and other documents related to the vessel.

The FV captain was shown his position on the BIOT territory chart from his GPS unit and witnessed the document to that effect.

The SFPO then photographed the fresh fish on deck and the instructed the captain to haul the rest of his gear on board. The first part of the gear retrieved consisted of drift nets followed by longlines all having wire trace attached. During hauling of the longline shark and marlin species were landed. These were photographed along with the wire trace used. The last part of the longline was taken on board at 09.30 hours position 04°43.2S 074°56.9E.

The SFPO then examined the vessel's fishing holds the middle hold contained fish species and was photographed.

At the end of the interview, the SFPO told the Captain that he would return to the BPV and consult with the BIOT prosecutor and chief of police (ROPO1) as to whether, in light of the facts, the vessel would be detained. The SFPO told the Captain, that it was his view that the FV had been fishing illegally in BIOT in contravention to section 7 of the BIOT 2007 Fisheries Ordinance, at least for a part of his voyage. The SFPO also told the Captain that being in possession of wire trace, even if not being used, is illegal in BIOT under section 6 of the BIOT 2007 Fisheries Ordinance.

The SFPO told the Captain he would confiscate navigational equipment and the SSB radio handset to ensure the FV does not attempt to escape while the SFPO is onboard the BPV. The SFPO assured the Captain that this would be returned on release of the FV.

The SFPO then read the FV master his rights and ordered the FV captain to set course to Diego Garcia following the Pacific Marlin at a distance of 500 metres and to maintain a speed of 5 knots.

Harbour Managers, have been informed to prevent departing of the accused skippers Smarathunga Mudianselage Muhandi Ramuge Don Victor Mark Antony (Skipper of Yaşiru Pulha-01), K.D. Naudana (Skipper of Lakshi Duwa fill) on other heats for high seas fishing.

The Assistant Director/Kalutara has been instructed to display notices on the harbours and fisheries offices warning vessel owners to prevent from employing these skippers on their fishing vessels for high seas fishing

Finally, I would like to inform you that DFAR has recognized the importance of climination of ILU activities for better conservation and management of the resources in the region. Sri Lanka is in the process of installation of VMS for the high seas operating vessels to be completed towards the end of September 2015 while implementing the High Seas Regulations as well.

Your cooperation on this matter would be highly appreciated.

## RECORD OF PROCEEDINGS 27<sup>th</sup> July 2015

The following two charges which had been laid against you were heard by the British Indian Ocean Territory (BIOT) Magistrates Court on the **Twenty Seventh day of July 2015.** 

1. Fishing without a licence in BIOT waters contrary to Sections 7(1) and 7(2)(i) of the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2007.

#### Which specifically alleged:

That you, Mr Sandaradura Athula Jayamal Silva, being the owner of the Sri Lankan Registered Vessel Yasiru Putha 1 IMUL-A-0648-KLT were between the 29th May 2015 and the 1st June 2015 fishing in the waters of the British Indian Ocean Territory without a licence.

2. Possession of prohibited fishing gear in BIOT Waters contrary to Section 6(2) and 6(3)(i) Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2007.

#### Which specifically alleged:

That you, Mr Sandaradura Athula Jayamal Silva, being the owner of the Sri Lankan Registered Vessel Yasiru Putha 1 IMUL-A-0648-KLT were between the 29th May 2015 and the 1st June 2015 found having used prohibited fishing gear, namely wire trace lines, within the fishing waters of the British Indian Ocean Territory.

Following your recent correspondence with the Clerk of the Magistrates' Court, the court recorded pleas of **GUILTY** on your behalf, in respect of each of the charges alleged against you. The evidence concerning the particulars of your case was then read out by the prosecution. Having heard all of that evidence the Magistrate found that the charges against you proved and accordingly the following verdicts have been recorded:

Mr Sandaradura Athula Jayamal Silva was sentenced as follows:

- Pay a fine of 3,000 GBP for fishing without licence
- Pay a fine of 1,500 GBP for being in possession of prohibited fishing gear
- Fishing gear to be forfeited to the crown for disposal

The request you made in your Affidavit to pay any fine by instalments was considered and agreed to. Therefore the Magistrate has set the following payment conditions:

- An initial payment of 250 GBP is due to be paid by Wednesday 4<sup>th</sup> day of November 2015.
- Seventeen payments of 250 GBP will be due to be paid on the first Wednesday of each month thereafter until payment is complete.

If payment is not met, these fines and costs will be passed to local enforcement agents for them to collect. Furthermore Mr Sandaradura Athula Jayamal Silva may be re-summoned to explain to the court why payment has not been made by this date.

# Report on the investigation of the Sri Lankan vessel Yasiru Putha No. 1 in British Indian Ocean Territory (BIOT) Waters

The Sri Lankan flagged – Yasiru Putha No. 1 (IMUL-A-0648-KLT, IOTC No. IOTC0015343) was detained on suspicion of being involved in illegal activities, namely illegal fishing, pending a criminal investigation into the same.

The owner of the vessel, Mr Sandaradura Athula Jayamal Silva (of 97/6 Kalawilawaththa, Moragalla, Aluthgama, Sri Lanka) entered guilty pleas to the following offences

- Fishing without a licence in BIOT waters contrary to Sections 7(1) & 7(2)(i) of the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2007.
- Possession of Prohibited fishing gear contrary to Section 6 (2) of the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2007.

On  $27^{th}$  July 2015 the vessel owner was fined £3,000 for the first offence and £1,500 for the second offence with fishing gear to be forfeited to the crown for disposal. The owner of the vessel has been set the following payment conditions:

- An initial payment of £250 is due to be paid by Wednesday 4<sup>th</sup> November 2015.
- Thereafter seventeen payments of £250 due to be paid on the first Wednesday of each month until payment is complete.

1. Status of six Sri Lankan vessels SULARA 2, IMASHA 2, NRODHA PUTHA, THIWANKA 5. OTTO 2 and KAVINDYA DUWA, listed from No. 16 to 21 of the draft IUU vessels list of 2016

BIOT authorities proposed to list above Sri Lankan vessels in the IUU vessels list under the provisions of Resolution 11/03 on establishing a list of vessels presumed to have carries out illegal, unregulated and unreported fishing in the IOTC area at the 12th Compliance Committee meeting.

These vessels were found guilty on Fishing in BIOT waters without valid license and possessing prohibited gears on board after trial conducted by the Courts of Diego Garcia. The BIOT authorities have apprehended these vessels in year 2014 and after conducting an investigation the crew and the vessel have been released on pending trials in the BIOT Courts. The trial has been conducted in absentia of the vessel owners and a fine has been imposed to the vessel owners once convicted.

Department of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources (DFAR) of Sri Lanka corporate with BIOT Authorities to act against the IUU fishing activities by vessels of Sri Lanka through bilateral communications in a view to prevent IUU fishing in the region. Further DFAR suspend the vessel registration and the fishing operation license of the above vessels and anchored in the Beruwala harbor under the custody of Coast Guards Department from the date of the arrival of to Sri Lanka. The vessels are still anchored in the Beruwela harbor and up to date it is more than one years' period. Since the legal proceedings ahead these six vessels were listed in the provisional list of IUU during the 12th Compliance Committee meeting in 2015.

DFAR tried every effort to urge the, vessel owners to pay the fine, the vessel owners repeatedly expressed their financial incapability to settle the fines, imposed by fined by the Courts of Diego Garcia. Although the fined by the Courts of Diego Garcia made arrangements to pay the fine in monthly installments on the request of the vessel owners except for two others do not comply to that. In the meantime BIOT Authorities insisted to make arrangements to settle the fines.

In Sri Lanka administration there is no legal basis to compel the vessel owners to pay the fine imposed by foreign courts. As such the only means of charging the fine is that prosecute the offenders under Sri Lanka law and if convicted, the verdict shall in a way that able to settle the fine (confiscate/auction of the vessel). The principal legal advisor of BIOT also contacted DFAR of Sri Lanka on this regard and the communication is attached hereto. (Annex-i)

DFAR filed cases against these vessels under the provisions of the Fisheries and Aquatic Resources Act No.35 of 2013, Initially to the four vessels SULARA 2, IMASHA 2, NRODHA PUTHA, THIWANKA 5 at the Magistrate courts of Kalutara and the OTTO 2 AND KAVINDYA DUWA was followed.

Certified copies of the investigation reports and the case records has not received from the BIOT authorities as requested by Sri Lanka. However the legal proceedings initiated with the guidance of Attorney Generals Department of Sri Lanka on 5<sup>th</sup> May 2015 and three trials conducted. It was ordered to call witness from BIOT authorities. As such it was decided to summon the Senior Fisheries Protection Officer who involved in the investigations as witness and the trial date fixed to 5<sup>th</sup> February 2016. However it was further ordered by the Courts to amend the witnesses list by including the interpreters attended at the investigation conducted by BIOT authorities.

Due to this amendments, the summon order for the Senior Fisheries Protection Officer has not send to BIOT Authorities as reported in the last monthly report submitted to IOTC which was circulated in January 2016. Hence the next trial date fixed to 29<sup>th</sup> April 2016.

In the meantime, Principal Legal Adviser for British Indian Ocean Territories informed her visit to Sri Lanka in the third week of March to discuss with Officials of DFAR, AG's Dept and other stakeholders in a view to arrive to an agreed solutions to ensure effective conclusion over the prevailing IUU issues. However the dates postponed and Sri Lanka proposed the dates at end of April and hope to resolve outstanding issues and report to the 13<sup>th</sup> Compliance meeting of IOTC.

## 2. Status of the vessel Yasiru Putha No.01 (IMUL-A- 0648KLT) listed under No. 22 of the draft IUU vessels list of 2016

This vessel found guilty on Fishing in BIOT waters without valid license and keep in possession of prohibited gears on board in 29<sup>th</sup> May 2015. The owner has been fined by the Courts of Diego Garcia and the vessel owner has paid the fine. The vessel has been anchored until settle the fine. The vessel is included to the monthly reporting to IOTC. The owner agreed to the conditions imposed by the DFAR and granted permission to fish only within the EEZ of Sri Lanka after installation of VMS on board.

Sri Lanka at present well equipped with legal framework to combat IUU fishing and all high seas operating vessels are fixed with operational VMS onboard. Strict boat inspections are being conducted at departure and arrival points by the officials of DFAR, Coast guard and NAVY. As such in 2015 only one Sri Lankan vessels reported on illegal entering to BIOT waters (Yasiru Putha 01) and this was bilaterally resolved. The management of VMS is further strengthen by Issuing circular by including inspection of operational status of the VMS at departure point.

By providing above information Sri Lanka do not agree with inclusion of the six vessels SULARA 2, IMASHA 2, NRODHA PUTHA, THIWANKA 5. OTTO 2 and KAVINDYA DUWA to the IUU list, Since actions of adequate severity are being taken (ongoing) and Hence, requested to be remained in the provisional list of IUU until the legal actions completed.

With regard to the vessel Yasiru Putha 01, Sri Lanka disagree with inclusion of this vessel in IUU list since the owner has respected the law of Diego Garcia and agreed with the conditions imposed by DFAR Sri Lanka and already included to the monthly reporting of IOTC.

### Re: Sri Lankan Criminal Prosecutions in respect of the following vessels:

### Imasha 02, Thiwanka 05, Nirodha Putha, Sulara 02

This is reference to your letter dated 22<sup>nd</sup> December send to this Department on the above.

I would like to bring to your kind notice that ten (10) Sri Lanka vessels have been apprehended by the BIOT Authorities for being engaged in Illegal Unreported Unregulated (IUU) fishing activities in the Marine protected area of BIOT waters and prosecuted by BIOT Courts, in year 2014.

Department of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources (DFAR) of Sri Lanka assisted BIOT authorities through bilateral communications for the investigations by confirming the ownership of the vessels those arrested, in a view to combat IUU fishing activities in the region. Further DFAR Sri Lanka suspended the Vessel Registration and the operation license and kept the vessels in the Custody of Coast Guard Department until settle down the case by paying the fines imposed by the courts of BIOT.

Out of the 10 vessel owners, two vessel owners (Vessels Seawish and Jane) have paid the fine imposed by the Magistrate of BIOT. The 8 remaining boats are still being anchored at Beruwala fishery harbor in Sri Lanka. The Department of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources tried every effort to urge the vessel owners to pay the fines, the vessel owners repeatedly expressed their financial incapability to pay the fine imposed by Magistrate Courts of BIOT.

Although the BIOT Courts made arrangements to pay the fine in monthly installments on the request of the vessel owners, except for one vessel owner (Vessel Dulari) others do not respect for it. In the meantime BIOT Authorities insisted DFAR to make arrangements to settle the fine.

In Sri Lankan administration there is no legal basis to compel the vessel owners, to pay the fine imposed by foreign courts. In the meantime Sri Lanka is not taking administrative measures against violations of High Seas fishing after the enactment of the Fisheries and Aquatic Resources Act No 35 of 2013.

As such the only means of charging the fine is that prosecute the offenders under Sri Lanka law and if convicted, the verdict shall in a way that (confiscate the vessel and auction) able to settle the fine. Based on this platform DFAR filed cases against the vessel owners of Imasha 02, Thiwanka 05, Nirodha Putha, Sulara 02 those that BIOT authorities has provided the investigation and the case records as per the instructions of the Attorney General Sri Lanka. Therefore it is required the officers and the interpreters who carry out the investigations of the suspected vessels to be appeared in the Courts as the witness during the Trial.

Further I would like to inform you that DFAR initiated to file cases against the remaining three vessel owners (Otto2, Kavinda Duwa, Stef and Ania Duwa) those who have not paid the fine and the same procedure will apply to the said three vessel owners also. The owner of the vessel "Dulari" who agreed to pay the fine in monthly installments has already paid the first installment in January 2015.

Under the above circumstances we are not in a position to take administrative measures as you proposed against the vessel owners found guilty on IUU fishing. However, I appreciate your assistance towards Sri Lanka on this regard.

In conclusion I would like to reaffirm our commitment to cooperate the IOTC and the relevant Coastal States to deter and elimination of IUU fishing in the region.

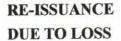

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5. CONCLUSIONS	

#### SYNOPSIS

The Office of the State Attorney of South Africa approached Triton Naval Architects to offer an expert opinion on the identity and comparison of various vessels, all purporting to be the Naham 4, Call Sign A4DK6.

Reference was taken from various sets of photo's taken on 5 different dates, coupled to a site visit to the vessel at M Berth in Cape Town Harbour on the 15 July 2013, at which time additional photo's were also taken.

These photographs will be included as applicable throughout the report, but the following table indicates the dates at which the sets of photo's were taken.

It will be illustrated through reference to identified features within the photographs and observations made onsite, that there various sets of photographs identify 4 different vessels.

Furthermore it will be shown that measurements taken onboard the vessel (15 July 2013) show disagreement in key dimensions from the registration papers presented by the Dept of Sea Fisheries. (of which extracts are included in this report).

This report was drawn up by Barry Kingwill, in his capacity as a Naval Architect and partner of Triton Naval Architects.

### <u>COMPARISON OF PHOTOGRAPHS AND OBSERVATIONS ON BOARD</u>

### 3.1 STERN VIEWS

We will assume the vessel inspected at M-Berth Cape Town on the 15<sup>th</sup> July 2013, as the reference vessel (whether the correct Naham 4, or not) and make comparisons between it and all the other vessels, of which there are three others, or four in total.

It will be shown that the vessel's photographed in 2013 are all the same vessel, leaving the vessel photographed in Oman in 2010 as a unique vessel, the one photographed on the syncrolift in Cape Town in July 2012 as a unique vessel, the one photographed at sea in April 2012 as yet another unique vessel.

This will be shown by reference to certain features to be the same as vessel as per the following photographs.

If one compares features such as the hand railing at the upper level and on main deck and where it adjoins a solid plate bulwark on the transom, the after deckhouse stern opening and shape, and then minor features such as the location of the two lights on the stbd side just ahead of the side doorways, and the small spotlight located on the handrailing on the  $1^{\rm st}$  deck (above main deck), are all identical between Figures 1, 2 and 3. The aft mast can also be seen to be identical in all these cases.

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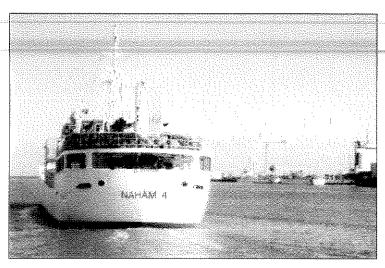


Figure 4 - Vessel photographed in Oman - 1st Aug 2010 (Denoted Vessel #1)

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If we then compare these stern images to the stern image of the Oman vessel (Figure 4) then significant differences can be noted.

In Figure 4 above, in contrast to Figures 1,2,3 the stern opening is divided into 3 openings, namely 1 wide opening in the centre with two narrow openings on either side. The transom also appears to be much rounder, and in fact, this image coupled to the profile image appears to indicate a significantly larger vessel.

However size aside, the stern has features mentioned above, also including the shape and location of freeing ports and rope fairleader openings which are different to Figures 1,2,3 above. The after and main mast is also completely different.

### 3.2 PROFILE AND BOW VIEWS

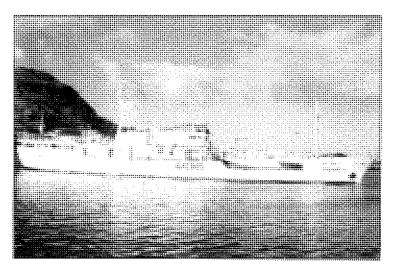


Figure 5 - Profile view of vessel photographed in Oman in 2010 (Denoted Vessel #1)

Features from this profile view, to take note of for comparative purposes, include the size and height

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of the fwd mast, the location and shape of the main mid mast, the shape of the bulkwark side opening, the shape and level of the bridge, and the extent of enclosure of the deckhouse. These and other features will be shown to be different by comparison to any of the other vessels. This vessel also appears to be larger than any of the other vessels, but that is a more subjective parameter.

In comparing the profile of vessels #1 and #2 (above),

- #1 has a main deck, upperdeck and bridge deck, whereas in #2 the bridge is located on the upperdeck, and only has 2 decks,
- the side cutout is a different shape
- the fwd mast is different
- the mid mast is located above the bridge in the case of #2 and much further aft in the case of #1
- the enclosure of the stbd side aft upper deck is different, with #1's partial enclosure extending further fwd and having a series of openings.
- The freeing ports on the bow are also different in location and size as is the anchor and anchor pocket.

If we then reference vessel #3 as photographed on the syncrolift 29 July 2012. other than the obvious marking of the name, the following differences can be noted, when comparing against #1, #2, or #4.

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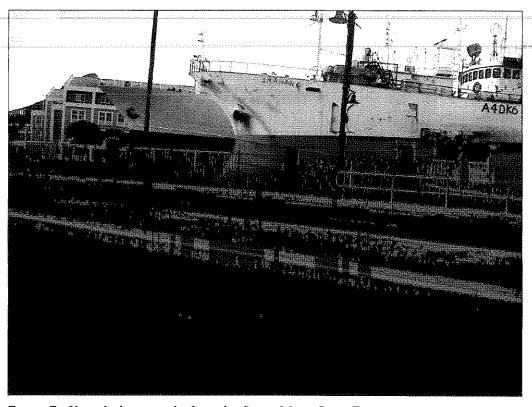


Figure 7 - Vessel photographed on the Syncrilift in Cape Town on the 29 July 2012 (denoted Vessel #3)

### Differences:

- The fwd mast is a single column mast which differs with #1 which is a larger and higher fwd mast, whereas #2 and #4 both have double pipe mast constructions. The main mast is also different to all of the other vessels.
- The bow rake of #3 is much more pronounced than #4. The bow does also not have the stem plate which is apparent in the photo's for #4a, #4b, #4c.
- The bridge and bridge windows differ with all of the other vessels, most markedly with #4
  where the bridge is extended to the ship's side, with an overhang over the walkway below
  on upperdeck,
- The anchor pocket differs with #2 and #4.
- This vesse! #3, has a deck house fwd of the bridge which none of the other vessels have.
- The freeing ports on the bow are different, but as all the other vessel's profile views are taken from the other side, this is not seen as one of the conclusive variances.
- The #3 bridge is also located on the upperdeck, as per #2, whereas for #1 and #4 the bridge is located 1 deck higher.
- When closely observing the bridge windows for #2 and #3, it is apparent that there is a significant overhanging deckhead over the bridge windows on #2, which is not the case in #3.

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Figure 8 - Vessel #4a (photographed 22 March 2013)

In figure 8 above, the overhanging bridge is very apparent, which is not the case on any of the other vessels.

Incidentally the dented structure under the overhanging bridge is one of the features that is used as agreement points between vessels #4b and #4c.

The dent in the portside bow, is also apparent in the photo's for #4b and #4c, with the latter cases showing the vessel in a repainted state.

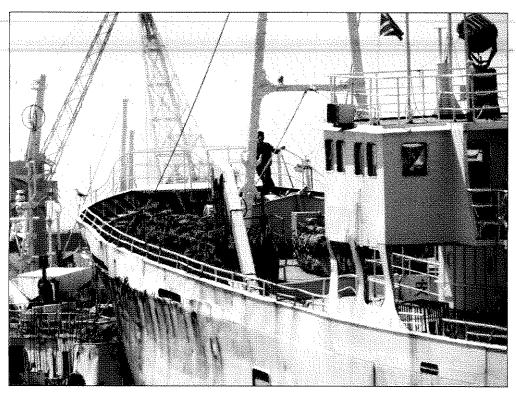


Figure 9 - Closer view on #4a, Portside indentations

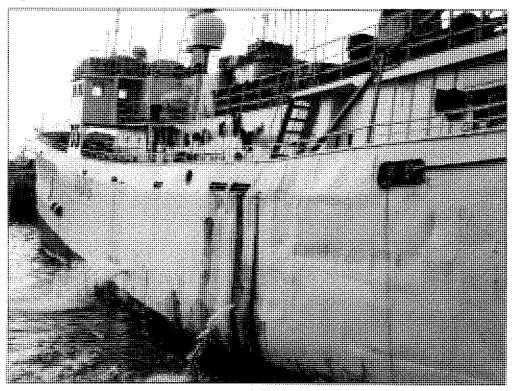


Figure 10 - Vessel #4c, photographed by Triton on the 15 July 2013, showing the same (albeit painted) indentations

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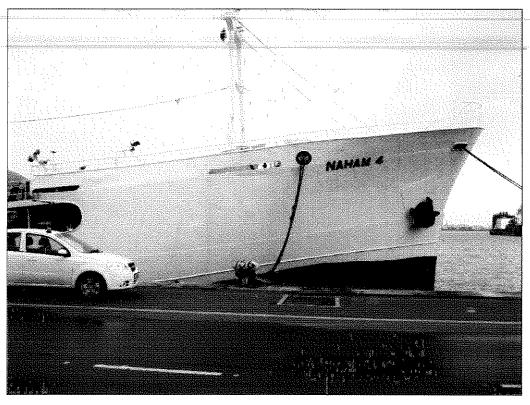


Figure 11 - Vessel #4c - Photographed by Triton 15 July 2013

The stem profile curvature (bow shape flare) is significantly less pronounced on the #4 vessels (same vessel), as compared to #1, #2 or #3.

Amongst features used to conclude that vessels #4a, #4b and #4c are the same vessel also include:

- Anchor and doubler plate in way of anchor pocket. (in close inspection the exact same plug weld patterns can be observed to be the same).
- The handrailing on the foredeck and the manner in which it increases in height and goes from 2 strands to three strands is identical with the other #4 vessels.
- The freeing port and rope fairleader opening is the same, and on closer inspection the weld seam in relation to these features can be identified to be identical between #4a and #4c (#4b does not have any stbd side views).
- The fwd mast is the same on the #4 vessels, and although also a 2 pipe construction as per #2, there is 1 cross bar on #2's fwd mast and 2 cross bars on the #4 fwd masts.
- The dents in the stem (of the bow) of #2 are not apparent on #4, inspite of #4 being well dented elsewhere, hence no attempt at hull repair has been attempted.

### 3.3 VESSEL PHOTOGRAPHED 23 OCT 2012 - ONLY MARKINGS PHOTOGRAPHED

A further "vessel" was photographed in Cape Town 23 Oct 2012, but as the photo's only included the call sign and name markings it was not included as a case of its own.

However there are two features which identify this vessel with that of #4, in spite of it also having the wrong call sign, namely A4DK5 (as is the case of vessel #2).

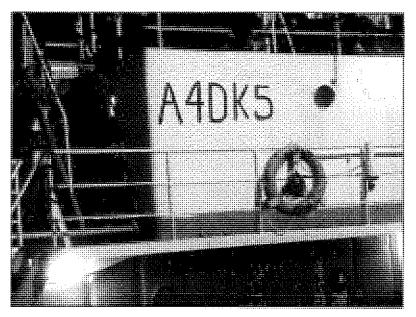


Figure 12 - Vessel #4d - Photographed 23 Oct 2012 in Cape Town

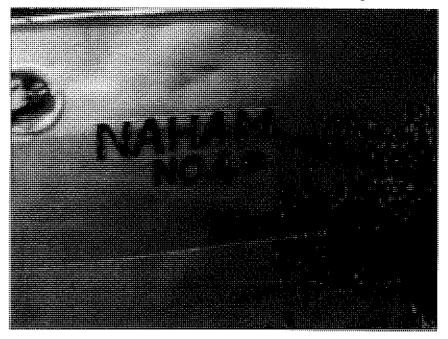


Figure 13 - Vessel #4d - Photographed 23 Oct 2012 in Cape Town

In comparing #4d above and #4a, its is apparent the writing of the name is identical, in that they

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are both marked with the top of the letters on the weld seam and the first letter starts the same distance from the fairleader opening. The text of the name is also identical.

The small dent above the name (although not apparent from photo's of #4a, was witnessed on site inspection (#4c) and can be made out in Figure 11, but not as clear as it was to the naked eye. This feature also links the Oct 2012 sighting to be the same vessel as all of the 2013 sightings.

When looking closely at Figure 12 which shows the incorrect call sign, one can make out that the hull has been repainted in that area.

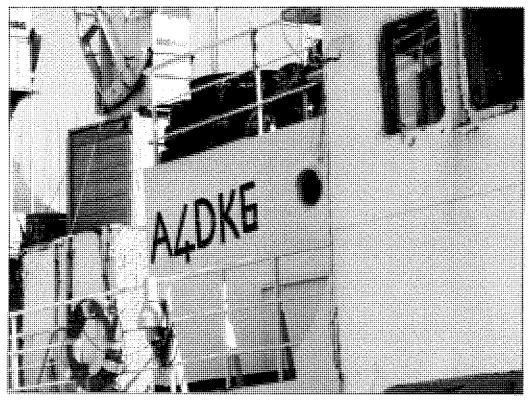


Figure 14 - #4a, Photograph taken 22 March 2013, showing correct call sign. (same side of the vessel as Figure 11, Oct 2013)

The same view of the ship #4a, taken in 22 March 2013 shows the correct call sign (albeit before the vessel was repainted) See Figure 14 below.

### TONNAGE CERTIFICATE DIMENSIONS, VS MEASUREMENTS TAKEN 15 JULY 2013

The length depicted in the certificates (samples shown in this section) indicate "Registered Length" whereas only the Overall Length could be measured, given the vessel was afloat.

However the beam in the certificates could be compared with the measured beam, and a discrepancy was noted here, indicating that the registered vessel was significantly smaller than the measured vessel.

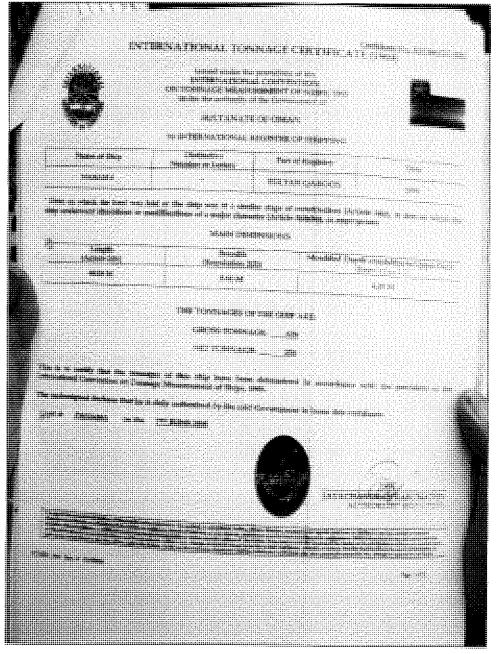


Figure 15 - Tonnage Certificate issued by PANAMA on behalf of OMAN 7th June 2010

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The certificate photographed in Figure 15 indicates a registered length of 48,00m and a Beam of 8.6m.

The beam was measured on site on the vessel at M berth Cape Town on the 15 July 2013 as 9.7m measured across the main deck to the inside of the bulwark plates, hence "moulded breadth" and any rub rails would still extend beyond that. This indicates that the vessel inspected is significantly larger than that registered with a beam of 8.6m.

The overall length of the vessel was also measured onboard and found to be 56.6m.

### 5. **CONCLUSIONS**

In summary, 4 different vessels have been identified, as denoted in the report as

Vessel #1 – photographed in Oman in Aug 2010

Vessel #2 - photographed at sea 11 April 2012

Vessel #3 – photographed on the Syncrolift 29 July 2012

Vessel #4a,4b,4c,4d – photographed between Oct 2012 and July 2013

It could have been a reasonable expectation that the vessel photographed in OMAN in Aug 2010 was the correct Naham 4, however that vessel appears (albeit a subjective opinion) to be significantly larger than any of the other vessels considered in this report, yet the Tonnage Certificate is for a vessel even smaller than vessel #4.

This leaves it inconclusive which, if any of the vessels considered, is the real Naham 4, but conclusive that 4 different vessels have been identified bearing the name Naham 4, and in most cases also the call sign A4DK6.
