Resolution 18/03 On establishing a list of vessels presumed to have carried out IUU fishing in the IOTC Area of Competence: Sri Lankan Flagged Vessel IMULA 0293 KLT

As required in paragraphs 5 and 6 of Resolution 18/03 please find attached a completed IOTC Reporting form for Illegal Activity and accompanying evidence supporting IUU fishing activity for the Sri Lankan flagged vessel IMULA 0293 KLT. Under the bilateral arrangement established between UKOT and Sri Lanka in order to combat IUU, this vessel was reported to the Sri Lankan Authorities who have taken action against the owner/master under the provisions of national fisheries legislation (FARA 1996/2016).

The attached evidence shows that

- At the time of the incident, the vessel was on the IOTC Record of Authorised Vessels, IOTC011091
- The vessel had no stern markings
- VMS was switched off or not working and had no tamper-proof seal
- The vessel was equipped with gill nets and longlines; There were no gear markings
- The vessel had tuna and tuna like species on board Swordfish; blue shark.
- The vessel was fishing within the waters of the British Indian Ocean Territory without a license;
- Sri Lanka has not provided sufficient information to enable the conclusion that sanctions of adequate severity have yet or shall be taken in respect of the owner of this vessel.
- The actions taken in respect of the skipper are inadequate but we note that such administrative powers that are currently available to deal with the skippers of IUU vessels have been applied.

We submit this vessel to IOTC Compliance Committee with recommendation c) 'Recommended for inclusion on IOTC IUU list'. We will review this recommendation before the meeting in light of any additional information provided by Sri Lanka pursuant to paragraphs 10 and 12 of Resolution 18/03.

The vessel has a VMS unit onboard, but this has been reported to be switched off. If possible, please could you supply any VMS records for the recent trip that could provide information in relation to the vessel's movements.

The vessel, being escorted by the BIOT Patrol vessel, is currently estimated to arrive into Diego Garcia on the 22nd October. We would be grateful for an early indication of whether you plan to request that Sri Lankan authorities deal with the vessel if it is confirmed that it is in violation of the fisheries regulations of Sri Lanka.

Request for Confirmation of Ownership of the Sri Lanka Fishing Vessel IMUL-A 0293KLT

This is reference to your letter dated 22.10. 2018 on the above and to the confirmation of the ownership of the Sri Lanka Fishing Vessel IMUL-A 0293KLT by the Director Operation of this Department by e-mail dated 25.10.2018.

As per our investigations this vessel has VMS onboard and authorized to operate in High seas. However the boat operator has violated the high seas fishing conditions of the fishing license by power-off the VMS on board.

I would like to inform you that the DFAR will take legal actions against the vessel owner/s as per the FARA Act no 2 of 1996 amended 2016 by receiving confirmed evidence of violation of the fisheries regulations of Sri Lanka by this vessel. For this purpose please send the reports of investigations to this Department with statements they produced at the investigation conducted by BIOT authorities.

The officials of investigation unit of DFAR will question based on those reports and if they accept guilty legal actions will take as per the section 52 (B) 0f FARA Act No. 2 as amended in 2016 for the first offense. However if they not accepted guilty a case will be filed against the vessel owner and during the trials the prosecuting officer will directly request evidence from your authority.

I would oblige you to release the vessel allowing this Department to take legal actions once this vessel arrived to Sri Lanka. We will take actions to apprehend the vessel on arrival to Sri Lanka in the Port of call to legal actions to be conducted.

Your cooperation on this regard is highly appreciated.

Release of the Sri Lankan vessel (IMUL-A-0293-KLT)

Thank you for your letter dated 30 October 2018 confirming the proposed actions you intend to take against the Sri Lankan flagged vessel identified as IMUL-A-0293-KLT.

This vessel was boarded and inspected, in accordance with BIOT laws, by the BIOT Fisheries Protection Officer on the 22nd October 2018.

It was suspected of being involved in illegal fishing activities in BIOT waters. Fresh fish, including shark species were seen and photographed on the vessel as was an amount of longline and gillnet gear that had been set and was seen being hauled in. The vessel had a VMS on board it was not switched on. Please find attached the Fishery Protection Officers Inspection report which fully details the boarding and inspection of the vessel.

On Saturday the 24th October 2018 a Criminal Prosecution, for fishing without a licence and possession of illegal fishing gear, was commenced against the Master. Having heard from both the Prosecution and Master of the vessel the Magistrate Ordered the destruction of the catch that had been seized form the vessel.

On 31st October 2018 the criminal prosecution was stopped and the Master and crew were served with removal orders, issued by the Principal Immigration Officer in accordance with BIOT Immigration law.

The Master was instructed to leave BIOT waters directly and return to his home port in Sri Lanka. The vessel was released at approximately 18:25 hours on 31st October 2018.

We would like to request that as well as taking action against the owner of this vessel, DFAR take such action as they can against the Master of the vessel so as to discourage him and others Masters from entering BIOT waters and engaging in illegal fishing activity.

In respect of our bilateral cooperation to combat illegal fishing BIOT waters we would kindly request the assistance of DFAR, and request notification of any actions taken by DFAR in conducting a regulatory investigation into the activities of the vessel. Previous actions carried out by DFAR in order to meet the requirements of IOTC Resolution 10/11 on Port State Measures (para 17.4) have included the following:

- · Recall the vessel to port immediately;
- · Notify the relevant port authorities to detain the vessel on arrival;
- Suspension of the licence of the vessel and other relevant flag State actions;
- · Notification of the owner / master to comply with any FPN or court order that may arise from the BIOT

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authorities; and,

• Pending further action by Sri Lankan authorities we would request that the vessel is detained in port.

As the vessel was presumed IUU and fishing in BIOT waters the BIOT Administration will submit an IOTC IUU Reporting Form to the Compliance Committee in 2019 in respect of this vessel.

We would like to thank Sri Lanka as flag State for the continued bilateral assistance in combatting the threat of IUU fishing in the Indian Ocean.

Reporting presumed IUU vessels to the IOTC Compliance Committee (CoC)

I refer to an email of 20/01/2019 from Kalyani Hewapathirana to Denise Bradshaw, BIOT Principal Legal Advisor, with attached table: 'Update on the actions taken in respect of Sri Lankan vessels reported on IUU in BIOT waters during 2017 and 2018', copied to me. As you know it is necessary to inform IOTC of presumed IUU by a deadline of 70 days before the Compliance Committee. Ahead of submitting any reports, we have a number of questions on the historic cases previously submitted to IOTC and the new vessels that we will report this year.

We note the actions taken against a number of vessels boarded and inspected in BIOT (in your table, those numbered 1, 2, 3, 5, 7, 8, 9, 10, and 12). We will continue to provide similar inspection reports as you have requested. These vessels will not be separately reported to IOTC although they will be included in any information paper we may produce as in previous years '*Reporting of vessels in transit through BIOT waters for potential breach of IOTC Conservation and Management Measures*'. We further note your letter dated 20/07/2018 on '*Implementation of VMS to the multiday fishing vessels operate within the EEZ of Sri Lanka*'. We welcome the extension of the VMS programme to include all multi day vessels, not just those authorised to fish on the high seas, and note the delays in implementing this. We would be grateful if you can keep us informed of progress.

The remainder of this letter relates to vessels where the inspection by the BIOT Senior Fisheries Protection Officer indicated fishing activity in BIOT waters and presumed IUU, and so may be reported to IOTC. As you are aware Paragraph 14d of IOTC Resolution 17/03 requires the flag State to provide information that demonstrates that:

(1) effective action has been taken in response to the IUU fishing activities in question, including prosecution and imposition of sanctions of adequate severity to be effective in securing compliance and deterring further infringements. And,

(2) Every CPC shall report any actions and measures that it has taken in accordance with Resolution 07/01, in order to promote compliance with IOTC Conservation and Management Measures by vessels that fly its flag.' (i.e. to investigate the engagement of natural or legal persons engaged in IUU)

We note that the table of actions you have provided largely covers the first element (i.e. prosecution and sanctions imposed; other flag State actions such as detention of the vessel, installation of VMS, revised licensing conditions etc.). We further note that these actions largely relate to the vessel owner. However, there is limited information provided that relates to the second element of 14d, the actions taken against those engaged in IUU. Here we particularly refer to the Master (or Skipper) of the vessel rather than the crew,



although for the latter we would be interested if any action was taken e.g. to better educate them about IUU.

<u>As soon as possible, and no later than 21st March</u> (noting BIOT will be making its submission to IOTC on 28th March) we would be grateful to receive additional information, including supporting evidence, from you as set out below.

A. Vessels previously reported to IOTC

At the time of submission to CoC, BIOTs recommendation for the following vessels was: '(b) Notification of illegal activity to IOTC Secretariat. Recommend notification of activity to flag State'. This recommendation is subject to the submission of evidence of the actions taken by Sri Lanka to the Compliance Committee, and we reserve the option of changing our recommendation to '(c) Recommended for inclusion on IOTC IUU list' should this not be forthcoming.' Hence these vessels were not included in the draft IUU vessel list and were for information only.

We would like to close these cases as far as IOTC reporting is concerned, and so would appreciate your response to the following which, we trust, should enable us to do so.

(4) Superfresh 02 - IMUL-A-0128 GLE (presented to IOTC in 2017)

This vessel was prosecuted and fined in the BIOT Court on Diego Garcia, but has not paid the fine. We note the actions taken by Sri Lanka against the <u>owner</u> of the vessel, indicated in the table the provided, and that the vessel is currently anchored in Beruwala harbour and cannot fish due to non-payment of fines.

With respect to the <u>Master/Skipper</u> your letter DFAR/FM/K/IUU/2017 dated 01/03/2017 indicates that the skipper and crew were detained. Your letter with the same reference dated 03/05/2017 to the IOTC Executive Secretary provided an update on the case relating to this vessel, but provided no further information on the actions taken against the Master. No details are provided of the actions taken against the Master/Skipper in the table provided on 20/01/2019.

Please provide details of the actions taken by Sri Lanka in respect of the vessel Master/Skipper

(6) Lakshi Duwa 06 - IMUL-A-0398-KLT (presented to IOTC in 2018)

We note the actions taken by Sri Lanka against the <u>owner</u> of the vessel, indicated in the table provided, and that the vessel is currently anchored in Beruwala harbour and cannot fish due to non-payment of fines.

With respect to the <u>Master/Skipper</u> your letter dated 26/04/2018 to Dr CC Mees includes an annexed letter dated 03/10/2017 to the Assistant Director, Kalutra District Fisheries Office, which gives instructions that an inquiry should be conducted before releasing the skipper and the crew, and that the fishing operation licence of the skipper should be suspended. No details are provided of the actions taken against the Master/Skipper in the table provided on 20/01/2019.

<u>Please provide details of the actions taken by Sri Lanka in respect of the vessel Master/Skipper confirming</u> whether these instructions and any other actions were carried out.

B. Vessels to be reported to IOTC in 2019

(11) Seneka 07 IMUL 0142 PTM

We note the actions taken against the owner, and that due to non-payment of fine the vessel is anchored in Beruwala harbour. We have no details of any actions intended, or taken in respect of the Master/Skipper.

Please provide details of the actions taken by Sri Lanka in respect of the vessel Master/Skipper



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(13) IMUL A 0030 GLE; (14) IMUL0207 GLE; and (15) IMUL 0293 KLT

All three vessels have recent or pending court cases 25 March; 20 February; and 5 February respectively (we assume 2019, the Table indicates 2018). The BIOT Director of Fisheries has asked for clarification of what approval from the Minister has been sought.

For all three vessels, <u>please provide details of the actions taken by Sri Lanka in respect of the vessel</u> <u>Master/Skipper</u>. Please provide details of the outcome of the court cases against the owners, and also any <u>settlements made by the owner</u>.

(16) IMUL 0728 KLT.

We note that no action has been taken against the owner of the vessel to date. It is not clear if the vessel has been released to continue fishing, or is still detained in port. We note that the Master's/Skipper's licence was cancelled for 12 months. This vessel was on the IOTC Authorised fishing vessel list and equipped with VMS. We refer to our letter dated 30 October 2018 in which we request VMS records for this vessel in order to provide information on its movements.

Please note that the BIOT Administration may provide you with additional information in respect of this vessel. In the meantime:

Please provide the VMS record for this vessel for the relevant time period.

Please clarify if the vessel is still detained?

Please clarify whether the owner of the vessel will be prosecuted?

Please indicate if any further action was taken in respect of the skipper?

Reporting presumed IUU vessels to the IOTC Compliance Committee

This is reference to your letter dated 04th March 2019 on the above. Please find the following clarifications on your queries.

Para (ii) - Implementation of VMS to the multiday fishing vessels operating within EEZ of Sri Lanka.

As you are aware Ministry of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources Development Sri Lanka is not in a position to call another tender for purchasing of VMS for the vessels operating within EEZ until the Fundamental Right case filed by one of the bided Company is finalized. However as the chief Administrative body responsible on Monitoring of fishing vessels of Sri Lanka, Dept. Fisheries and Aquatic Resources (DFAR) highlighted the fact that the importance of installing of Vessel Monitoring Devices (VMDs) on board of all multiday fishing vessels, as Sri Lanka bound by international resolutions on prevent deter and elimination of IUU fishing in the region.

Further recent past incidents of deploying of fishing vessels for non- fishing activities such as human trafficking and drug trafficking by organized groups of people is another menace which further aggravated the requirement of VMDs on board of fishing vessels.

As such DFAR sought legal advice from Attorney General Dept. to find the possibility of settling the court case by conducting several meetings with the participation of relevant parties. The party who files the FR case agreed to withdraw the court case if they have been offered the tender. As a result the Senior State Counselor appearing for the case has instructed DFAR by a letter dated to award the tender to the party who filed the FR case by put forwarding a Cabinet Paper to the Cabinet of Ministers of the Parliament. However due to the prevailed political uncertainty in the country caused a delayed in the process and the MFARD is currently proceed on this matter. As such we see a green light of installation of VMDs within EEZ vessels very soon.

Sri Lanka Vessels inspected by BIOT SFPO

Para (iv) -Sri Lanka still find lack in legal provisions to take legal actions against the vessel operator (skipper) those who engaged in IUU fishing. As such preliminary arrangements have made to bring amendment to the current Fisheries Act to incorporate provisions to take actions against the vessel operator (Skipper).

However, there is a special arrangement in the investigation division to send the skippers those violate High seas regulations, for a compulsory two-day consultation on the obligations of High Seas fishing. Such skippers are not allowed to operate a fishing vessel if they do not attend these sessions. This is an administrative measure implemented until the period of new legal provisions come in to enforce. In addition, the training unit conducts the regular awareness programs in all Districts in a rotation manner.

With regard to your inquiries for vessels previously reported to the IOTC,

- (4) Super Fresh 02 IMUL-A-0128 GLE (2017)
- (5) Lakshiduwa -IMUL-A- 0398 KLT (2018)
- (11) Senaka 07 IMUL 0142 PTM (2019)
- (13) IMUL-A- 0030GLE, IMUL-A- 0207GLE, IMUL-A- 0297KLT As per the provision in the DFAR Act No. 02 of 1996 section 52(1) for the compounding (1st time convicted and admit guilty) approval of the Minister of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources Development is required. As such the file has been forwarded to the Minister.

Due to non-availability of legal provisions to take actions against the skipper, the skippers of the vessels given in above four bullet points were released by making them compulsory to attend the two day consultation on the obligations of High Seas fishing. (16) IMUL- A- 0728 KLT

I draw your attention to your letter dated 15th November 2018. With respect to investigation findings you have reported in the paragraph 3 the skipper of the vessel IMUL- A- 0728 KLT has

been obstructed to the duties of SFPO of BIOT. We take this matter into our serious consideration and decided to cancel the skipper license for one year.

I would say that in the FARA Act No 35 of Sri Lanka also has provisions to take legal actions for obstructing to the authorized officers.

However the wordings in the paragraph (v) of the letter dated 15th November 2018 has misled the investigation officers of Sri Lanka that the entering of this vessel in to BIOT waters is due to an engine failure, which it was tally with the statements given by them after arrival to Sri Lanka.

In the Inspection Report – ARW01, under IOTC CMM violations we noted that the fishing gears are not marked, No VMS, VMS not tampered, No State issued log book and no state issued license is marked. However DFAR can confirm that the vessel had Log book and the Operation licence and operating VMS on board during the departure from the home port. The departure form of the vessel is attached for your information. We noted that the gear marking has not been checked by the harbor officials during the departure.

- The Vessel Monitoring Device showed that it was in good working order during the departure. However re-configuration of VMS transponders is going on under new International Maritime Satellite (INMARSAT) C service due to the change of the previous INMARSAT C service provider. Therefore DFAR is experiencing failure of Vessel monitoring system in some of the vessels the above vessel also one of such and therefore VMS record is not available.
- The vessel is permitted for H.S. Fishing
- The owner has not persecuted.
- With the information provided by you on 15th of March there is a potential DFAR to take further action in respect of the skipper. We hope to execute the legal provisions available in the prevailing Act with the assistance of the evidence provided by BIOT in future.

I would say that DFAR is hardly managing to take some legal actions against the fishers due to some economic and social hardships faced by them. However we are not retrograde to take legal actions against the IUU fishing activities keeping our commitment to prevent IUU fishing in the region.

Your understanding on this matter is highly appreciated.

Reporting presumed IUU vessels to the IOTC Compliance Committee (CoC)

Thank you for your letter dated 21 March 2019 which has helpfully answered some of the questions raised in our earlier correspondence of 4 March and 15 March 2019.

1. VMS on multiday fishing vessels operating within the EEZ of Sri Lanka

We note the updated details regarding installation of VMS on multiday fishing vessels operating within the EEZ of Sri Lanka and are encouraged that this will occur 'very soon'. <u>We would be grateful for an update on the status of installation in due course</u>.

2. Action taken against fishing skippers

We note and support the plans to amend the Fisheries Act in order to enable legal action to be taken against the vessel operator (skipper) and nationals engaged in IUU Fishing which will enable Sri Lanka to apply the provisions of IOTC Resolution 07/01. <u>We would be grateful for an update on the timeline for change in due course.</u>

We appreciate that you have used such administrative powers that you have available to deal with the skippers of these vessels.

The skipper of IMUL 0728 KLT had his licence cancelled for one year, whereas the skippers of IMUL-A-0128 GLE; IMUL-A-0398-KLT; IMUL 0142 PTM; IMUL A 0030 GLE; IMUL0207 GLE; and IMUL 0293 KLT each attended a 2 day consultation <u>It would be useful to understand if there is any further information</u> that BIOTA or the Principal Legal Advisor can provide which would allow you to suspend the licences of skippers suspected of IUU fishing ahead of the proposed changes to legislation?

3. IOTC IUU vessel listing

A. Vessels previously reported to IOTC

Superfresh 02 – IMUL-A-0128 GLE (presented to IOTC in 2017) and Lakshi Duwa 06 – IMUL-A-0398-KLT (presented to IOTC in 2018)

We are satisfied that sanctions of adequate severity have been taken in respect of the owners of these vessels. We consider the actions taken in respect of the skippers to be inadequate but note the current limitations of the

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Fisheries Act and that this will be updated. We will therefore not be re-notifying these vessels to IOTC Compliance Committee in 2019.

B. Vessels to be reported to IOTC in 2019

Seneka 07 IMUL 0142 PTM

We are satisfied that sanctions of adequate severity have been taken in respect of the owner of this vessel. We consider the actions taken in respect of the skipper to be inadequate but note the current limitations of the Fisheries Act and that this will be updated. We will notify this vessel to IOTC Compliance Committee in 2019 with recommendation b) 'Notification of illegal activity to IOTC Secretariat. Recommend notification of activity to flag State'.

IMUL A 0030 GLE; IMUL0207 GLE; and IMUL 0293 KLT

Thank you for indicating that these cases have been referred to the Minister. It is still not clear to us why this is the case. <u>Could you please provide a more detailed explanation of what that means?</u> We also note that the dates for court cases for these vessels have passed (25 March; 20 February; and 5 February respectively). <u>Is</u> <u>DFAR intending that any of the owners of these vessels is to be prosecuted?</u>

At the time of writing, we are NOT satisfied that sanctions of adequate severity have been taken in respect of the owners of these vessels. We consider the actions taken in respect of the skippers to be inadequate but note the current limitations of the Fisheries Act and that this will be updated.

As we are unable to conclude on the information currently provided that actions of adequate severity have or shall be taken, we have concluded that the only correct course of action for us to take is to notify these vessels to IOTC Compliance Committee in 2019 with recommendation c) 'Recommended for inclusion on IOTC IUU list'. We note that Sri Lanka has until 15 days before the Compliance Committee Meeting to provide additional information which we will review at that time before deciding whether to pursue IUU listing during the meeting.

IMUL 0728 KLT.

This vessel is on the IOTC Authorised fishing vessel list. We understand that no action has been taken against the owner of the vessel nor is intended. The vessels has now been released. We note that the Master's/Skipper's licence was cancelled for 12 months. Whilst the VMS was working when the vessel left port reconfiguration of VMS transponders means there are no vessel tracks for the period in question, which we consider to be inadequate. It would be helpful to us when deciding how to request this vessel is to be dealt with by the IOTC if we could understand why this owner has not been prosecuted. Is there a specific reason why this action could not take place in this case compared to others.

At the time of writing, we are NOT satisfied that sanctions of adequate severity have been taken in respect of the owner of this vessel. We consider the action taken in respect of the skipper to be adequate.

As we are unable to conclude on the information currently provided that actions of adequate severity have or shall be taken, we have concluded that the only correct course of action for us to take is to notify this vessel to IOTC Compliance Committee in 2019 with recommendation c) 'Recommended for inclusion on IOTC IUU list'. We note that Sri Lanka has until 15 days before the Compliance Committee Meeting to provide additional information which we will review at that time before deciding whether to pursue IUU listing during the meeting.

Under the bilateral arrangement established between UKOT and Sri Lanka in order to combat IUU, this vessel was reported to the Sri Lankan Authorities who have taken action against the owner/master under the provisions of national fisheries legislation (FARA 1996/2016).

The attached evidence shows that

- The vessel was not on the current IOTC Record of Authorised Vessels
- The vessel had no stern markings
- No VMS was installed
- The vessel was equipped with gill nets and longlines; There were no gear markings
- Wire trace (illegal in BIOT) was not stowed and fishing gear were set for fishing
- The vessel was presumed IUU fishing within the waters of the British Indian Ocean Territory without a license;
- Sri Lanka has not provided sufficient information to enable the conclusion that sanctions of adequate severity have yet or shall be taken in respect of the owner of this vessel.
- The actions taken in respect of the skipper are inadequate but we note that such administrative powers that are currently available to deal with the skippers of IUU vessels have been applied.

We submit this vessel to IOTC Compliance Committee with recommendation c) 'Recommended for inclusion on IOTC IUU list'. We will review this recommendation before the meeting in light of any additional information provided by Sri Lanka pursuant to paragraphs 10 and 12 of Resolution 18/03.

The Sri Lankan flagged vessels **IMUL-A-0728-KLT**, (IOTC16120 (current record expires 31/12/2018)) **IMUL-A-0207-GLE**, (IOTC11283 (most recent record expired 13/02/2014)) and **IMUL-A-0030-GLE**, (not on the IOTC Record of Authorised Vessels) are currently the subject of a criminal investigation into suspected illegal fishing activity including possession of illegal fishing gear (IMUL-A-0207-GLE and IMUL-A-0030-GLE) and obstruction of a Fisheries Protection Officer (IMUL-A-0728-KLT). The BIOT Administration needs to be clear as to the accurate details of the registered owners before a final decision on any course of action can be taken. At this stage our investigations into the possible activities of these vessels are preliminary, no finding has been made by the Administration of any such activities.

Release of the Sri Lankan vessels IMUL-A-0728-KLT, IMUL-A-0207-GLE and IMUL-A-0030-GLE.

Thank you for your letter dated 31 October 2018 confirming the ownership of each of the above referenced vessels and indicating that DFAR intend to take legal action against the owners of the vessels.

These vessels were boarded and inspected, in accordance with BIOT laws, by the BIOT Fisheries Protection Officer on the 29th October 2018. All three vessels were detained upon suspicion of being involved in illegal fishing activity and escorted to Diego Garcia for further investigation.

All three vessels were investigated for illegal fishing activity and additionally, IMUL-A-0207-GLE and IMUL-A-0030-GLE for possession of illegal fishing gear (wire trace), and IMUL-A-0728-KLT for obstruction of a Fisheries Protection Officer. Please find attached the Fishery Protection Officers Inspection report which details the boarding and inspection of the vessels.

On 31st October, following the letter from DFAR which confirmed the intention of the Sri Lankan authorities to take legal action against the owners of the vessels, the Director of Fisheries took the decision that the vessels should be returned to Sri Lanka. In light of this decision, no criminal proceedings were commenced in BIOT. A preliminary police investigation was commenced and concluded.

Unfortunately, two of the vessels had engine problems and so all three were kept in Diego Garcia until the vessels could be made sea-worthy.

During this period, the ice in the hold of IMUL-A-0207-GLE had started to melt. Following removal of this ice in efforts to make the vessels sea-worthy a total of 34 sharks were discovered, including 1 Scalloped Hammer Head, 7 Silver tips, 13 silky sharks, 12 Blacktip shark and 1 Short-finned Mako. 21 skipjack tuna and 2 dorado were also found.

In accordance with BIOT legislation, an application was made to the Magistrate to destroy the catch. Having heard from the BIOT Police and Master of the vessel, the Magistrate ordered the destruction of the catch.

On 9th November 2018 the Master and crew were served with removal orders, issued by the Principal Immigration Officer in accordance with BIOT Immigration law.

The three vessels were released at approximately 17:00 hours on 9 November 2018 and instructed to leave BIOT waters directly and return to their home ports in Sri Lanka. The estimated date of arrival in Sri Lanka is 19 November.



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We would like to request that as well as taking action against the owners of these vessels, DFAR take such action as they can against the Masters of the vessels so as to discourage them and other Masters from entering BIOT waters and engaging in illegal fishing activity.

We would like to thank Sri Lanka as flag State for the continued bilateral assistance in combatting the threat of IUU fishing in the Indian Ocean and would kindly request notification of any actions taken by DFAR in conducting a regulatory investigation into the activities of these vessels.

Reporting presumed IUU vessels to the IOTC Compliance Committee (CoC)

I refer to an email of 20/01/2019 from Kalyani Hewapathirana to Denise Bradshaw, BIOT Principal Legal Advisor, with attached table: 'Update on the actions taken in respect of Sri Lankan vessels reported on IUU in BIOT waters during 2017 and 2018', copied to me. As you know it is necessary to inform IOTC of presumed IUU by a deadline of 70 days before the Compliance Committee. Ahead of submitting any reports, we have a number of questions on the historic cases previously submitted to IOTC and the new vessels that we will report this year.

We note the actions taken against a number of vessels boarded and inspected in BIOT (in your table, those numbered 1, 2, 3, 5, 7, 8, 9, 10, and 12). We will continue to provide similar inspection reports as you have requested. These vessels will not be separately reported to IOTC although they will be included in any information paper we may produce as in previous years '*Reporting of vessels in transit through BIOT waters for potential breach of IOTC Conservation and Management Measures*'. We further note your letter dated 20/07/2018 on '*Implementation of VMS to the multiday fishing vessels operate within the EEZ of Sri Lanka*'. We welcome the extension of the VMS programme to include all multi day vessels, not just those authorised to fish on the high seas, and note the delays in implementing this. We would be grateful if you can keep us informed of progress.

The remainder of this letter relates to vessels where the inspection by the BIOT Senior Fisheries Protection Officer indicated fishing activity in BIOT waters and presumed IUU, and so may be reported to IOTC. As you are aware Paragraph 14d of IOTC Resolution 17/03 requires the flag State to provide information that demonstrates that:

(1) effective action has been taken in response to the IUU fishing activities in question, including prosecution and imposition of sanctions of adequate severity to be effective in securing compliance and deterring further infringements. And,

(2) Every CPC shall report any actions and measures that it has taken in accordance with Resolution 07/01, in order to promote compliance with IOTC Conservation and Management Measures by vessels that fly its flag.' (i.e. to investigate the engagement of natural or legal persons engaged in IUU)

We note that the table of actions you have provided largely covers the first element (i.e. prosecution and sanctions imposed; other flag State actions such as detention of the vessel, installation of VMS, revised licensing conditions etc.). We further note that these actions largely relate to the vessel owner. However, there is limited information provided that relates to the second element of 14d, the actions taken against those engaged in IUU. Here we particularly refer to the Master (or Skipper) of the vessel rather than the crew,



although for the latter we would be interested if any action was taken e.g. to better educate them about IUU.

<u>As soon as possible, and no later than 21st March</u> (noting BIOT will be making its submission to IOTC on 28th March) we would be grateful to receive additional information, including supporting evidence, from you as set out below.

A. Vessels previously reported to IOTC

At the time of submission to CoC, BIOTs recommendation for the following vessels was: '(b) Notification of illegal activity to IOTC Secretariat. Recommend notification of activity to flag State'. This recommendation is subject to the submission of evidence of the actions taken by Sri Lanka to the Compliance Committee, and we reserve the option of changing our recommendation to '(c) Recommended for inclusion on IOTC IUU list' should this not be forthcoming.' Hence these vessels were not included in the draft IUU vessel list and were for information only.

We would like to close these cases as far as IOTC reporting is concerned, and so would appreciate your response to the following which, we trust, should enable us to do so.

(4) Superfresh 02 - IMUL-A-0128 GLE (presented to IOTC in 2017)

This vessel was prosecuted and fined in the BIOT Court on Diego Garcia, but has not paid the fine. We note the actions taken by Sri Lanka against the <u>owner</u> of the vessel, indicated in the table the provided, and that the vessel is currently anchored in Beruwala harbour and cannot fish due to non-payment of fines.

With respect to the <u>Master/Skipper</u> your letter DFAR/FM/K/IUU/2017 dated 01/03/2017 indicates that the skipper and crew were detained. Your letter with the same reference dated 03/05/2017 to the IOTC Executive Secretary provided an update on the case relating to this vessel, but provided no further information on the actions taken against the Master. No details are provided of the actions taken against the Master/Skipper in the table provided on 20/01/2019.

Please provide details of the actions taken by Sri Lanka in respect of the vessel Master/Skipper

(6) Lakshi Duwa 06 - IMUL-A-0398-KLT (presented to IOTC in 2018)

We note the actions taken by Sri Lanka against the <u>owner</u> of the vessel, indicated in the table provided, and that the vessel is currently anchored in Beruwala harbour and cannot fish due to non-payment of fines.

With respect to the <u>Master/Skipper</u> your letter dated 26/04/2018 to Dr CC Mees includes an annexed letter dated 03/10/2017 to the Assistant Director, Kalutra District Fisheries Office, which gives instructions that an inquiry should be conducted before releasing the skipper and the crew, and that the fishing operation licence of the skipper should be suspended. No details are provided of the actions taken against the Master/Skipper in the table provided on 20/01/2019.

<u>Please provide details of the actions taken by Sri Lanka in respect of the vessel Master/Skipper confirming</u> whether these instructions and any other actions were carried out.

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Reporting presumed IUU vessels to the IOTC Compliance Committee

This is reference to your letter dated 04th March 2019 on the above. Please find the following clarifications on your queries.

Para (ii) - Implementation of VMS to the multiday fishing vessels operating within EEZ of Sri Lanka.

As you are aware Ministry of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources Development Sri Lanka is not in a position to call another tender for purchasing of VMS for the vessels operating within EEZ until the Fundamental Right case filed by one of the bided Company is finalized. However as the chief Administrative body responsible on Monitoring of fishing vessels of Sri Lanka, Dept. Fisheries and Aquatic Resources (DFAR) highlighted the fact that the importance of installing of Vessel Monitoring Devices (VMDs) on board of all multiday fishing vessels, as Sri Lanka bound by international resolutions on prevent deter and elimination of IUU fishing in the region.

Further recent past incidents of deploying of fishing vessels for non- fishing activities such as human trafficking and drug trafficking by organized groups of people is another menace which further aggravated the requirement of VMDs on board of fishing vessels.

As such DFAR sought legal advice from Attorney General Dept. to find the possibility of settling the court case by conducting several meetings with the participation of relevant parties. The party who files the FR case agreed to withdraw the court case if they have been offered the tender. As a result the Senior State Counselor appearing for the case has instructed DFAR by a letter dated to award the tender to the party who filed the FR case by put forwarding a Cabinet Paper to the Cabinet of Ministers of the Parliament. However due to the prevailed political uncertainty in the country caused a delayed in the process and the MFARD is currently proceed on this matter. As such we see a green light of installation of VMDs within EEZ vessels very soon.

Sri Lanka Vessels inspected by BIOT SFPO

Para (iv) -Sri Lanka still find lack in legal provisions to take legal actions against the vessel operator (skipper) those who engaged in IUU fishing. As such preliminary arrangements have made to bring amendment to the current Fisheries Act to incorporate provisions to take actions against the vessel operator (Skipper).

However, there is a special arrangement in the investigation division to send the skippers those violate High seas regulations, for a compulsory two-day consultation on the obligations of High Seas fishing. Such skippers are not allowed to operate a fishing vessel if they do not attend these sessions. This is an administrative measure implemented until the period of new legal provisions come in to enforce. In addition, the training unit conducts the regular awareness programs in all Districts in a rotation manner.

With regard to your inquiries for vessels previously reported to the IOTC,

- (13) IMUL-A- 0030GLE, IMUL-A- 0207GLE, IMUL-A- 0297KLT As per the provision in the DFAR Act No. 02 of 1996 section 52(1) for the compounding (1st time convicted and admit guilty) approval of the Minister of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources Development is required. As such the file has been forwarded to the Minister.

Due to non-availability of legal provisions to take actions against the skipper, the skippers of the vessels given in above four bullet points were released by making them compulsory to attend the two day consultation on the obligations of High Seas fishing. (16) IMUL- A- 0728 KLT

I draw your attention to your letter dated 15th November 2018. With respect to investigation findings you have reported in the paragraph 3 the skipper of the vessel IMUL- A- 0728 KLT has

been obstructed to the duties of SFPO of BIOT. We take this matter into our serious consideration and decided to cancel the skipper license for one year.

I would say that in the FARA Act No 35 of Sri Lanka also has provisions to take legal actions for obstructing to the authorized officers.

However the wordings in the paragraph (v) of the letter dated 15th November 2018 has misled the investigation officers of Sri Lanka that the entering of this vessel in to BIOT waters is due to an engine failure, which it was tally with the statements given by them after arrival to Sri Lanka.

In the Inspection Report – ARW01, under IOTC CMM violations we noted that the fishing gears are not marked, No VMS, VMS not tampered, No State issued log book and no state issued license is marked. However DFAR can confirm that the vessel had Log book and the Operation licence and operating VMS on board during the departure from the home port. The departure form of the vessel is attached for your information. We noted that the gear marking has not been checked by the harbor officials during the departure.

- The Vessel Monitoring Device showed that it was in good working order during the departure. However re-configuration of VMS transponders is going on under new International Maritime Satellite (INMARSAT) C service due to the change of the previous INMARSAT C service provider. Therefore DFAR is experiencing failure of Vessel monitoring system in some of the vessels the above vessel also one of such and therefore VMS record is not available.
- The vessel is permitted for H.S. Fishing
- The owner has not persecuted.
- With the information provided by you on 15th of March there is a potential DFAR to take further action in respect of the skipper. We hope to execute the legal provisions available in the prevailing Act with the assistance of the evidence provided by BIOT in future.

I would say that DFAR is hardly managing to take some legal actions against the fishers due to some economic and social hardships faced by them. However we are not retrograde to take legal actions against the IUU fishing activities keeping our commitment to prevent IUU fishing in the region.

Your understanding on this matter is highly appreciated.

Reporting presumed IUU vessels to the IOTC Compliance Committee (CoC)

Thank you for your letter dated 21 March 2019 which has helpfully answered some of the questions raised in our earlier correspondence of 4 March and 15 March 2019.

1. VMS on multiday fishing vessels operating within the EEZ of Sri Lanka

We note the updated details regarding installation of VMS on multiday fishing vessels operating within the EEZ of Sri Lanka and are encouraged that this will occur 'very soon'. <u>We would be grateful for an update on the status of installation in due course</u>.

2. Action taken against fishing skippers

We note and support the plans to amend the Fisheries Act in order to enable legal action to be taken against the vessel operator (skipper) and nationals engaged in IUU Fishing which will enable Sri Lanka to apply the provisions of IOTC Resolution 07/01. <u>We would be grateful for an update on the timeline for change in due course</u>.

We appreciate that you have used such administrative powers that you have available to deal with the skippers of these vessels.

The skipper of IMUL 0728 KLT had his licence cancelled for one year, whereas the skippers of IMUL-A-0128 GLE; IMUL-A-0398-KLT; IMUL 0142 PTM; IMUL A 0030 GLE; IMUL0207 GLE; and IMUL 0293 KLT each attended a 2 day consultation <u>It would be useful to understand if there is any further information</u> that BIOTA or the Principal Legal Advisor can provide which would allow you to suspend the licences of skippers suspected of IUU fishing ahead of the proposed changes to legislation?

3. IOTC IUU vessel listing

A. Vessels previously reported to IOTC

Superfresh 02 – IMUL-A-0128 GLE (presented to IOTC in 2017) and Lakshi Duwa 06 – IMUL-A-0398-KLT (presented to IOTC in 2018)

We are satisfied that sanctions of adequate severity have been taken in respect of the owners of these vessels. We consider the actions taken in respect of the skippers to be inadequate but note the current limitations of the

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Fisheries Act and that this will be updated. We will therefore not be re-notifying these vessels to IOTC Compliance Committee in 2019.

B. Vessels to be reported to IOTC in 2019

Seneka 07 IMUL 0142 PTM

We are satisfied that sanctions of adequate severity have been taken in respect of the owner of this vessel. We consider the actions taken in respect of the skipper to be inadequate but note the current limitations of the Fisheries Act and that this will be updated. We will notify this vessel to IOTC Compliance Committee in 2019 with recommendation b) 'Notification of illegal activity to IOTC Secretariat. Recommend notification of activity to flag State'.

IMUL A 0030 GLE; IMUL0207 GLE; and IMUL 0293 KLT

Thank you for indicating that these cases have been referred to the Minister. It is still not clear to us why this is the case. <u>Could you please provide a more detailed explanation of what that means?</u> We also note that the dates for court cases for these vessels have passed (25 March; 20 February; and 5 February respectively). <u>Is</u> <u>DFAR intending that any of the owners of these vessels is to be prosecuted?</u>

At the time of writing, we are NOT satisfied that sanctions of adequate severity have been taken in respect of the owners of these vessels. We consider the actions taken in respect of the skippers to be inadequate but note the current limitations of the Fisheries Act and that this will be updated.

As we are unable to conclude on the information currently provided that actions of adequate severity have or shall be taken, we have concluded that the only correct course of action for us to take is to notify these vessels to IOTC Compliance Committee in 2019 with recommendation c) 'Recommended for inclusion on IOTC IUU list'. We note that Sri Lanka has until 15 days before the Compliance Committee Meeting to provide additional information which we will review at that time before deciding whether to pursue IUU listing during the meeting.

IMUL 0728 KLT.

This vessel is on the IOTC Authorised fishing vessel list. We understand that no action has been taken against the owner of the vessel nor is intended. The vessels has now been released. We note that the Master's/Skipper's licence was cancelled for 12 months. Whilst the VMS was working when the vessel left port reconfiguration of VMS transponders means there are no vessel tracks for the period in question, which we consider to be inadequate. It would be helpful to us when deciding how to request this vessel is to be dealt with by the IOTC if we could understand why this owner has not been prosecuted. Is there a specific reason why this action could not take place in this case compared to others.

At the time of writing, we are NOT satisfied that sanctions of adequate severity have been taken in respect of the owner of this vessel. We consider the action taken in respect of the skipper to be adequate.

As we are unable to conclude on the information currently provided that actions of adequate severity have or shall be taken, we have concluded that the only correct course of action for us to take is to notify this vessel to IOTC Compliance Committee in 2019 with recommendation c) 'Recommended for inclusion on IOTC IUU list'. We note that Sri Lanka has until 15 days before the Compliance Committee Meeting to provide additional information which we will review at that time before deciding whether to pursue IUU listing during the meeting.

- Sri Lanka has not provided sufficient information to enable the conclusion that sanctions of adequate severity have yet or shall be taken in respect of the owner of this vessel.

The Sri Lankan flagged vessels **IMUL-A-0728-KLT**, (IOTC16120 (current record expires 31/12/2018)) **IMUL-A-0207-GLE**, (IOTC11283 (most recent record expired 13/02/2014)) and **IMUL-A-0030-GLE**, (not on the IOTC Record of Authorised Vessels) are currently the subject of a criminal investigation into suspected illegal fishing activity including possession of illegal fishing gear (IMUL-A-0207-GLE and IMUL-A-0030-GLE) and obstruction of a Fisheries Protection Officer (IMUL-A-0728-KLT). The BIOT Administration needs to be clear as to the accurate details of the registered owners before a final decision on any course of action can be taken. At this stage our investigations into the possible activities of these vessels are preliminary, no finding has been made by the Administration of any such activities.

Release of the Sri Lankan vessels IMUL-A-0728-KLT, IMUL-A-0207-GLE and IMUL-A-0030-GLE.

Thank you for your letter dated 31 October 2018 confirming the ownership of each of the above referenced vessels and indicating that DFAR intend to take legal action against the owners of the vessels.

These vessels were boarded and inspected, in accordance with BIOT laws, by the BIOT Fisheries Protection Officer on the 29th October 2018. All three vessels were detained upon suspicion of being involved in illegal fishing activity and escorted to Diego Garcia for further investigation.

All three vessels were investigated for illegal fishing activity and additionally, IMUL-A-0207-GLE and IMUL-A-0030-GLE for possession of illegal fishing gear (wire trace), and IMUL-A-0728-KLT for obstruction of a Fisheries Protection Officer. Please find attached the Fishery Protection Officers Inspection report which details the boarding and inspection of the vessels.

On 31st October, following the letter from DFAR which confirmed the intention of the Sri Lankan authorities to take legal action against the owners of the vessels, the Director of Fisheries took the decision that the vessels should be returned to Sri Lanka. In light of this decision, no criminal proceedings were commenced in BIOT. A preliminary police investigation was commenced and concluded.

Unfortunately, two of the vessels had engine problems and so all three were kept in Diego Garcia until the vessels could be made sea-worthy.

During this period, the ice in the hold of IMUL-A-0207-GLE had started to melt. Following removal of this ice in efforts to make the vessels sea-worthy a total of 34 sharks were discovered, including 1 Scalloped Hammer Head, 7 Silver tips, 13 silky sharks, 12 Blacktip shark and 1 Short-finned Mako. 21 skipjack tuna and 2 dorado were also found.

In accordance with BIOT legislation, an application was made to the Magistrate to destroy the catch. Having heard from the BIOT Police and Master of the vessel, the Magistrate ordered the destruction of the catch.

On 9th November 2018 the Master and crew were served with removal orders, issued by the Principal Immigration Officer in accordance with BIOT Immigration law.

The three vessels were released at approximately 17:00 hours on 9 November 2018 and instructed to leave BIOT waters directly and return to their home ports in Sri Lanka. The estimated date of arrival in Sri Lanka is 19 November.



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We would like to request that as well as taking action against the owners of these vessels, DFAR take such action as they can against the Masters of the vessels so as to discourage them and other Masters from entering BIOT waters and engaging in illegal fishing activity.

We would like to thank Sri Lanka as flag State for the continued bilateral assistance in combatting the threat of IUU fishing in the Indian Ocean and would kindly request notification of any actions taken by DFAR in conducting a regulatory investigation into the activities of these vessels.

Reporting presumed IUU vessels to the IOTC Compliance Committee (CoC)

I refer to an email of 20/01/2019 from Kalyani Hewapathirana to Denise Bradshaw, BIOT Principal Legal Advisor, with attached table: 'Update on the actions taken in respect of Sri Lankan vessels reported on IUU in BIOT waters during 2017 and 2018', copied to me. As you know it is necessary to inform IOTC of presumed IUU by a deadline of 70 days before the Compliance Committee. Ahead of submitting any reports, we have a number of questions on the historic cases previously submitted to IOTC and the new vessels that we will report this year.

We note the actions taken against a number of vessels boarded and inspected in BIOT (in your table, those numbered 1, 2, 3, 5, 7, 8, 9, 10, and 12). We will continue to provide similar inspection reports as you have requested. These vessels will not be separately reported to IOTC although they will be included in any information paper we may produce as in previous years '*Reporting of vessels in transit through BIOT waters for potential breach of IOTC Conservation and Management Measures*'. We further note your letter dated 20/07/2018 on '*Implementation of VMS to the multiday fishing vessels operate within the EEZ of Sri Lanka*'. We welcome the extension of the VMS programme to include all multi day vessels, not just those authorised to fish on the high seas, and note the delays in implementing this. We would be grateful if you can keep us informed of progress.

The remainder of this letter relates to vessels where the inspection by the BIOT Senior Fisheries Protection Officer indicated fishing activity in BIOT waters and presumed IUU, and so may be reported to IOTC. As you are aware Paragraph 14d of IOTC Resolution 17/03 requires the flag State to provide information that demonstrates that:

(1) effective action has been taken in response to the IUU fishing activities in question, including prosecution and imposition of sanctions of adequate severity to be effective in securing compliance and deterring further infringements. And,

(2) Every CPC shall report any actions and measures that it has taken in accordance with Resolution 07/01, in order to promote compliance with IOTC Conservation and Management Measures by vessels that fly its flag.' (i.e. to investigate the engagement of natural or legal persons engaged in IUU)

We note that the table of actions you have provided largely covers the first element (i.e. prosecution and sanctions imposed; other flag State actions such as detention of the vessel, installation of VMS, revised licensing conditions etc.). We further note that these actions largely relate to the vessel owner. However, there is limited information provided that relates to the second element of 14d, the actions taken against those engaged in IUU. Here we particularly refer to the Master (or Skipper) of the vessel rather than the crew,



although for the latter we would be interested if any action was taken e.g. to better educate them about IUU.

<u>As soon as possible, and no later than 21st March</u> (noting BIOT will be making its submission to IOTC on 28th March) we would be grateful to receive additional information, including supporting evidence, from you as set out below.

A. Vessels previously reported to IOTC

At the time of submission to CoC, BIOTs recommendation for the following vessels was: '(b) Notification of illegal activity to IOTC Secretariat. Recommend notification of activity to flag State'. This recommendation is subject to the submission of evidence of the actions taken by Sri Lanka to the Compliance Committee, and we reserve the option of changing our recommendation to '(c) Recommended for inclusion on IOTC IUU list' should this not be forthcoming.' Hence these vessels were not included in the draft IUU vessel list and were for information only.

We would like to close these cases as far as IOTC reporting is concerned, and so would appreciate your response to the following which, we trust, should enable us to do so.

(4) Superfresh 02 - IMUL-A-0128 GLE (presented to IOTC in 2017)

This vessel was prosecuted and fined in the BIOT Court on Diego Garcia, but has not paid the fine. We note the actions taken by Sri Lanka against the <u>owner</u> of the vessel, indicated in the table the provided, and that the vessel is currently anchored in Beruwala harbour and cannot fish due to non-payment of fines.

With respect to the <u>Master/Skipper</u> your letter DFAR/FM/K/IUU/2017 dated 01/03/2017 indicates that the skipper and crew were detained. Your letter with the same reference dated 03/05/2017 to the IOTC Executive Secretary provided an update on the case relating to this vessel, but provided no further information on the actions taken against the Master. No details are provided of the actions taken against the Master/Skipper in the table provided on 20/01/2019.

Please provide details of the actions taken by Sri Lanka in respect of the vessel Master/Skipper

(6) Lakshi Duwa 06 - IMUL-A-0398-KLT (presented to IOTC in 2018)

We note the actions taken by Sri Lanka against the <u>owner</u> of the vessel, indicated in the table provided, and that the vessel is currently anchored in Beruwala harbour and cannot fish due to non-payment of fines.

With respect to the <u>Master/Skipper</u> your letter dated 26/04/2018 to Dr CC Mees includes an annexed letter dated 03/10/2017 to the Assistant Director, Kalutra District Fisheries Office, which gives instructions that an inquiry should be conducted before releasing the skipper and the crew, and that the fishing operation licence of the skipper should be suspended. No details are provided of the actions taken against the Master/Skipper in the table provided on 20/01/2019.

<u>Please provide details of the actions taken by Sri Lanka in respect of the vessel Master/Skipper confirming</u> whether these instructions and any other actions were carried out.

B. Vessels to be reported to IOTC in 2019

(11) Seneka 07 IMUL 0142 PTM

We note the actions taken against the owner, and that due to non-payment of fine the vessel is anchored in Beruwala harbour. We have no details of any actions intended, or taken in respect of the Master/Skipper.

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(13) IMUL A 0030 GLE; (14) IMUL0207 GLE; and (15) IMUL 0293 KLT

Reporting presumed IUU vessel IMUL A 0728 KLT to the IOTC Compliance Committee (CoC)

This letter is a a follow up to the letter of 04/03/2019 'Reporting presumed IUU vessels to the IOTC Compliance Committee (CoC).' At present BIOTA is not satisfied with the actions taken against this vessel and plan to report it to IOTC on the basis of the details received so far. We would recommend (c), for inclusion on the IUU list. The vessel had apparently set its gear, which was not on board, and the engine had not failed when first detected – the vessel evaded arrest and hot pursuit was required. I reattach the inspection report for reference. You can be provided with copies of evidence collected by the BIOT police during their investigation into this vessel. To do this your prosecutor simply needs to contact the BIOT Principal Legal Adviser and ask for copies of that evidence

Evidence collected by the Scene of Crime Officer (SoCO) once the vessel had been detained indicated that the vessel master had obstructed the SFPO by attempting to hide a number of documents in a mattress. Photographs of these were taken in situ which can be shared with DFAR and the Sri Lankan authorities.

Reporting presumed IUU vessels to the IOTC Compliance Committee

This is reference to your letter dated 04th March 2019 on the above. Please find the following clarifications on your queries.

Para (ii) - Implementation of VMS to the multiday fishing vessels operating within EEZ of Sri Lanka.

As you are aware Ministry of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources Development Sri Lanka is not in a position to call another tender for purchasing of VMS for the vessels operating within EEZ until the Fundamental Right case filed by one of the bided Company is finalized. However as the chief Administrative body responsible on Monitoring of fishing vessels of Sri Lanka, Dept. Fisheries and Aquatic Resources (DFAR) highlighted the fact that the importance of installing of Vessel Monitoring Devices (VMDs) on board of all multiday fishing vessels, as Sri Lanka bound by international resolutions on prevent deter and elimination of IUU fishing in the region.

Further recent past incidents of deploying of fishing vessels for non- fishing activities such as human trafficking and drug trafficking by organized groups of people is another menace which further aggravated the requirement of VMDs on board of fishing vessels.

As such DFAR sought legal advice from Attorney General Dept. to find the possibility of settling the court case by conducting several meetings with the participation of relevant parties. The party who files the FR case agreed to withdraw the court case if they have been offered the tender. As a result the Senior State Counselor appearing for the case has instructed DFAR by a letter dated to award the tender to the party who filed the FR case by put forwarding a Cabinet Paper to the Cabinet of Ministers of the Parliament. However due to the prevailed political uncertainty in the country caused a delayed in the process and the MFARD is currently proceed on this matter. As such we see a green light of installation of VMDs within EEZ vessels very soon.

Sri Lanka Vessels inspected by BIOT SFPO

Para (iv) -Sri Lanka still find lack in legal provisions to take legal actions against the vessel operator (skipper) those who engaged in IUU fishing. As such preliminary arrangements have made to bring amendment to the current Fisheries Act to incorporate provisions to take actions against the vessel operator (Skipper).

However, there is a special arrangement in the investigation division to send the skippers those violate High seas regulations, for a compulsory two-day consultation on the obligations of High Seas fishing. Such skippers are not allowed to operate a fishing vessel if they do not attend these sessions. This is an administrative measure implemented until the period of new legal provisions come in to enforce. In addition, the training unit conducts the regular awareness programs in all Districts in a rotation manner.

With regard to your inquiries for vessels previously reported to the IOTC,

- (13) IMUL-A- 0030GLE, IMUL-A- 0207GLE, IMUL-A- 0297KLT As per the provision in the DFAR Act No. 02 of 1996 section 52(1) for the compounding (1st time convicted and admit guilty) approval of the Minister of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources Development is required. As such the file has been forwarded to the Minister.

Due to non-availability of legal provisions to take actions against the skipper, the skippers of the vessels given in above four bullet points were released by making them compulsory to attend the two day consultation on the obligations of High Seas fishing. (16) IMUL- A- 0728 KLT

I draw your attention to your letter dated 15th November 2018. With respect to investigation findings you have reported in the paragraph 3 the skipper of the vessel IMUL- A- 0728 KLT has

been obstructed to the duties of SFPO of BIOT. We take this matter into our serious consideration and decided to cancel the skipper license for one year.

I would say that in the FARA Act No 35 of Sri Lanka also has provisions to take legal actions for obstructing to the authorized officers.

However the wordings in the paragraph (v) of the letter dated 15th November 2018 has misled the investigation officers of Sri Lanka that the entering of this vessel in to BIOT waters is due to an engine failure, which it was tally with the statements given by them after arrival to Sri Lanka.

In the Inspection Report – ARW01, under IOTC CMM violations we noted that the fishing gears are not marked, No VMS, VMS not tampered, No State issued log book and no state issued license is marked. However DFAR can confirm that the vessel had Log book and the Operation licence and operating VMS on board during the departure from the home port. The departure form of the vessel is attached for your information. We noted that the gear marking has not been checked by the harbor officials during the departure.

- The Vessel Monitoring Device showed that it was in good working order during the departure. However re-configuration of VMS transponders is going on under new International Maritime Satellite (INMARSAT) C service due to the change of the previous INMARSAT C service provider. Therefore DFAR is experiencing failure of Vessel monitoring system in some of the vessels the above vessel also one of such and therefore VMS record is not available.
- The vessel is permitted for H.S. Fishing
- The owner has not persecuted.
- With the information provided by you on 15th of March there is a potential DFAR to take further action in respect of the skipper. We hope to execute the legal provisions available in the prevailing Act with the assistance of the evidence provided by BIOT in future.

I would say that DFAR is hardly managing to take some legal actions against the fishers due to some economic and social hardships faced by them. However we are not retrograde to take legal actions against the IUU fishing activities keeping our commitment to prevent IUU fishing in the region.

Your understanding on this matter is highly appreciated.

Reporting presumed IUU vessels to the IOTC Compliance Committee (CoC)

Thank you for your letter dated 21 March 2019 which has helpfully answered some of the questions raised in our earlier correspondence of 4 March and 15 March 2019.

1. VMS on multiday fishing vessels operating within the EEZ of Sri Lanka

We note the updated details regarding installation of VMS on multiday fishing vessels operating within the EEZ of Sri Lanka and are encouraged that this will occur 'very soon'. <u>We would be grateful for an update on the status of installation in due course</u>.

2. Action taken against fishing skippers

We note and support the plans to amend the Fisheries Act in order to enable legal action to be taken against the vessel operator (skipper) and nationals engaged in IUU Fishing which will enable Sri Lanka to apply the provisions of IOTC Resolution 07/01. <u>We would be grateful for an update on the timeline for change in due course</u>.

We appreciate that you have used such administrative powers that you have available to deal with the skippers of these vessels.

The skipper of IMUL 0728 KLT had his licence cancelled for one year, whereas the skippers of IMUL-A-0128 GLE; IMUL-A-0398-KLT; IMUL 0142 PTM; IMUL A 0030 GLE; IMUL0207 GLE; and IMUL 0293 KLT each attended a 2 day consultation <u>It would be useful to understand if there is any further information</u> that BIOTA or the Principal Legal Advisor can provide which would allow you to suspend the licences of skippers suspected of IUU fishing ahead of the proposed changes to legislation?

3. IOTC IUU vessel listing

A. Vessels previously reported to IOTC

Superfresh 02 – IMUL-A-0128 GLE (presented to IOTC in 2017) and Lakshi Duwa 06 – IMUL-A-0398-KLT (presented to IOTC in 2018)

We are satisfied that sanctions of adequate severity have been taken in respect of the owners of these vessels. We consider the actions taken in respect of the skippers to be inadequate but note the current limitations of the

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Fisheries Act and that this will be updated. We will therefore not be re-notifying these vessels to IOTC Compliance Committee in 2019.

B. Vessels to be reported to IOTC in 2019

Seneka 07 IMUL 0142 PTM

We are satisfied that sanctions of adequate severity have been taken in respect of the owner of this vessel. We consider the actions taken in respect of the skipper to be inadequate but note the current limitations of the Fisheries Act and that this will be updated. We will notify this vessel to IOTC Compliance Committee in 2019 with recommendation b) 'Notification of illegal activity to IOTC Secretariat. Recommend notification of activity to flag State'.

IMUL A 0030 GLE; IMUL0207 GLE; and IMUL 0293 KLT

Thank you for indicating that these cases have been referred to the Minister. It is still not clear to us why this is the case. <u>Could you please provide a more detailed explanation of what that means?</u> We also note that the dates for court cases for these vessels have passed (25 March; 20 February; and 5 February respectively). <u>Is</u> <u>DFAR intending that any of the owners of these vessels is to be prosecuted?</u>

At the time of writing, we are NOT satisfied that sanctions of adequate severity have been taken in respect of the owners of these vessels. We consider the actions taken in respect of the skippers to be inadequate but note the current limitations of the Fisheries Act and that this will be updated.

As we are unable to conclude on the information currently provided that actions of adequate severity have or shall be taken, we have concluded that the only correct course of action for us to take is to notify these vessels to IOTC Compliance Committee in 2019 with recommendation c) 'Recommended for inclusion on IOTC IUU list'. We note that Sri Lanka has until 15 days before the Compliance Committee Meeting to provide additional information which we will review at that time before deciding whether to pursue IUU listing during the meeting.

IMUL 0728 KLT.

This vessel is on the IOTC Authorised fishing vessel list. We understand that no action has been taken against the owner of the vessel nor is intended. The vessels has now been released. We note that the Master's/Skipper's licence was cancelled for 12 months. Whilst the VMS was working when the vessel left port reconfiguration of VMS transponders means there are no vessel tracks for the period in question, which we consider to be inadequate. It would be helpful to us when deciding how to request this vessel is to be dealt with by the IOTC if we could understand why this owner has not been prosecuted. Is there a specific reason why this action could not take place in this case compared to others.

At the time of writing, we are NOT satisfied that sanctions of adequate severity have been taken in respect of the owner of this vessel. We consider the action taken in respect of the skipper to be adequate.

As we are unable to conclude on the information currently provided that actions of adequate severity have or shall be taken, we have concluded that the only correct course of action for us to take is to notify this vessel to IOTC Compliance Committee in 2019 with recommendation c) 'Recommended for inclusion on IOTC IUU list'. We note that Sri Lanka has until 15 days before the Compliance Committee Meeting to provide additional information which we will review at that time before deciding whether to pursue IUU listing during the meeting.

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We would like to thank Sri Lanka as flag State for the continued bilateral assistance in combatting the threat of IUU fishing in the Indian Ocean. We look forward to receiving your responses to the above.

Under the bilateral arrangement established between UKOT and Sri Lanka in order to combat IUU, this vessel was reported to the Sri Lankan Authorities who have taken action against the owner/master under the provisions of national fisheries legislation (FARA 1996/2016).

The attached evidence shows that

- The vessel was not on the current IOTC Record of Authorised Vessels
- The vessel had no stern markings
- No VMS was installed
- The vessel was equipped with gill nets and longlines; There were no gear markings
- Wire trace (illegal in BIOT) were not stowed and were set for fishing
- The vessel had tuna and tuna like species on board Skipjack; several shark species
- The vessel was presumed IUU fishing within the waters of the British Indian Ocean Territory without a license;
- Sri Lanka has not provided sufficient information to enable the conclusion that sanctions of adequate severity have yet or shall be taken in respect of the owner of this vessel.
- The actions taken in respect of the skipper are inadequate but we note that such administrative powers that are currently available to deal with the skippers of IUU vessels have been applied.

We submit this vessel to IOTC Compliance Committee with recommendation c) 'Recommended for inclusion on IOTC IUU list'. We will review this recommendation before the meeting in light of any additional information provided by Sri Lanka pursuant to paragraphs 10 and 12 of Resolution 18/03.

The Sri Lankan flagged vessels **IMUL-A-0728-KLT**, (IOTC16120 (current record expires 31/12/2018)) **IMUL-A-0207-GLE**, (IOTC11283 (most recent record expired 13/02/2014)) and **IMUL-A-0030-GLE**, (not on the IOTC Record of Authorised Vessels) are currently the subject of a criminal investigation into suspected illegal fishing activity including possession of illegal fishing gear (IMUL-A-0207-GLE and IMUL-A-0030-GLE) and obstruction of a Fisheries Protection Officer (IMUL-A-0728-KLT). The BIOT Administration needs to be clear as to the accurate details of the registered owners before a final decision on any course of action can be taken. At this stage our investigations into the possible activities of these vessels are preliminary, no finding has been made by the Administration of any such activities.

Release of the Sri Lankan vessels IMUL-A-0728-KLT, IMUL-A-0207-GLE and IMUL-A-0030-GLE.

Thank you for your letter dated 31 October 2018 confirming the ownership of each of the above referenced vessels and indicating that DFAR intend to take legal action against the owners of the vessels.

These vessels were boarded and inspected, in accordance with BIOT laws, by the BIOT Fisheries Protection Officer on the 29th October 2018. All three vessels were detained upon suspicion of being involved in illegal fishing activity and escorted to Diego Garcia for further investigation.

All three vessels were investigated for illegal fishing activity and additionally, IMUL-A-0207-GLE and IMUL-A-0030-GLE for possession of illegal fishing gear (wire trace), and IMUL-A-0728-KLT for obstruction of a Fisheries Protection Officer. Please find attached the Fishery Protection Officers Inspection report which details the boarding and inspection of the vessels.

On 31st October, following the letter from DFAR which confirmed the intention of the Sri Lankan authorities to take legal action against the owners of the vessels, the Director of Fisheries took the decision that the vessels should be returned to Sri Lanka. In light of this decision, no criminal proceedings were commenced in BIOT. A preliminary police investigation was commenced and concluded.

Unfortunately, two of the vessels had engine problems and so all three were kept in Diego Garcia until the vessels could be made sea-worthy.

During this period, the ice in the hold of IMUL-A-0207-GLE had started to melt. Following removal of this ice in efforts to make the vessels sea-worthy a total of 34 sharks were discovered, including 1 Scalloped Hammer Head, 7 Silver tips, 13 silky sharks, 12 Blacktip shark and 1 Short-finned Mako. 21 skipjack tuna and 2 dorado were also found.

In accordance with BIOT legislation, an application was made to the Magistrate to destroy the catch. Having heard from the BIOT Police and Master of the vessel, the Magistrate ordered the destruction of the catch.

On 9th November 2018 the Master and crew were served with removal orders, issued by the Principal Immigration Officer in accordance with BIOT Immigration law.

The three vessels were released at approximately 17:00 hours on 9 November 2018 and instructed to leave BIOT waters directly and return to their home ports in Sri Lanka. The estimated date of arrival in Sri Lanka is 19 November.



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We would like to request that as well as taking action against the owners of these vessels, DFAR take such action as they can against the Masters of the vessels so as to discourage them and other Masters from entering BIOT waters and engaging in illegal fishing activity.

We would like to thank Sri Lanka as flag State for the continued bilateral assistance in combatting the threat of IUU fishing in the Indian Ocean and would kindly request notification of any actions taken by DFAR in conducting a regulatory investigation into the activities of these vessels.

Reporting presumed IUU vessels to the IOTC Compliance Committee (CoC)

I refer to an email of 20/01/2019 from Kalyani Hewapathirana to Denise Bradshaw, BIOT Principal Legal Advisor, with attached table: 'Update on the actions taken in respect of Sri Lankan vessels reported on IUU in BIOT waters during 2017 and 2018', copied to me. As you know it is necessary to inform IOTC of presumed IUU by a deadline of 70 days before the Compliance Committee. Ahead of submitting any reports, we have a number of questions on the historic cases previously submitted to IOTC and the new vessels that we will report this year.

We note the actions taken against a number of vessels boarded and inspected in BIOT (in your table, those numbered 1, 2, 3, 5, 7, 8, 9, 10, and 12). We will continue to provide similar inspection reports as you have requested. These vessels will not be separately reported to IOTC although they will be included in any information paper we may produce as in previous years '*Reporting of vessels in transit through BIOT waters for potential breach of IOTC Conservation and Management Measures*'. We further note your letter dated 20/07/2018 on '*Implementation of VMS to the multiday fishing vessels operate within the EEZ of Sri Lanka*'. We welcome the extension of the VMS programme to include all multi day vessels, not just those authorised to fish on the high seas, and note the delays in implementing this. We would be grateful if you can keep us informed of progress.

The remainder of this letter relates to vessels where the inspection by the BIOT Senior Fisheries Protection Officer indicated fishing activity in BIOT waters and presumed IUU, and so may be reported to IOTC. As you are aware Paragraph 14d of IOTC Resolution 17/03 requires the flag State to provide information that demonstrates that:

(1) effective action has been taken in response to the IUU fishing activities in question, including prosecution and imposition of sanctions of adequate severity to be effective in securing compliance and deterring further infringements. And,

(2) Every CPC shall report any actions and measures that it has taken in accordance with Resolution 07/01, in order to promote compliance with IOTC Conservation and Management Measures by vessels that fly its flag.' (i.e. to investigate the engagement of natural or legal persons engaged in IUU)

We note that the table of actions you have provided largely covers the first element (i.e. prosecution and sanctions imposed; other flag State actions such as detention of the vessel, installation of VMS, revised licensing conditions etc.). We further note that these actions largely relate to the vessel owner. However, there is limited information provided that relates to the second element of 14d, the actions taken against those engaged in IUU. Here we particularly refer to the Master (or Skipper) of the vessel rather than the crew,



although for the latter we would be interested if any action was taken e.g. to better educate them about IUU.

<u>As soon as possible, and no later than 21st March</u> (noting BIOT will be making its submission to IOTC on 28th March) we would be grateful to receive additional information, including supporting evidence, from you as set out below.

A. Vessels previously reported to IOTC

At the time of submission to CoC, BIOTs recommendation for the following vessels was: '(b) Notification of illegal activity to IOTC Secretariat. Recommend notification of activity to flag State'. This recommendation is subject to the submission of evidence of the actions taken by Sri Lanka to the Compliance Committee, and we reserve the option of changing our recommendation to '(c) Recommended for inclusion on IOTC IUU list' should this not be forthcoming.' Hence these vessels were not included in the draft IUU vessel list and were for information only.

We would like to close these cases as far as IOTC reporting is concerned, and so would appreciate your response to the following which, we trust, should enable us to do so.

(4) Superfresh 02 - IMUL-A-0128 GLE (presented to IOTC in 2017)

This vessel was prosecuted and fined in the BIOT Court on Diego Garcia, but has not paid the fine. We note the actions taken by Sri Lanka against the <u>owner</u> of the vessel, indicated in the table the provided, and that the vessel is currently anchored in Beruwala harbour and cannot fish due to non-payment of fines.

With respect to the <u>Master/Skipper</u> your letter DFAR/FM/K/IUU/2017 dated 01/03/2017 indicates that the skipper and crew were detained. Your letter with the same reference dated 03/05/2017 to the IOTC Executive Secretary provided an update on the case relating to this vessel, but provided no further information on the actions taken against the Master. No details are provided of the actions taken against the Master/Skipper in the table provided on 20/01/2019.

Please provide details of the actions taken by Sri Lanka in respect of the vessel Master/Skipper

(6) Lakshi Duwa 06 - IMUL-A-0398-KLT (presented to IOTC in 2018)

We note the actions taken by Sri Lanka against the <u>owner</u> of the vessel, indicated in the table provided, and that the vessel is currently anchored in Beruwala harbour and cannot fish due to non-payment of fines.

With respect to the <u>Master/Skipper</u> your letter dated 26/04/2018 to Dr CC Mees includes an annexed letter dated 03/10/2017 to the Assistant Director, Kalutra District Fisheries Office, which gives instructions that an inquiry should be conducted before releasing the skipper and the crew, and that the fishing operation licence of the skipper should be suspended. No details are provided of the actions taken against the Master/Skipper in the table provided on 20/01/2019.

<u>Please provide details of the actions taken by Sri Lanka in respect of the vessel Master/Skipper confirming</u> whether these instructions and any other actions were carried out.

B. Vessels to be reported to IOTC in 2019

(11) Seneka 07 IMUL 0142 PTM

We note the actions taken against the owner, and that due to non-payment of fine the vessel is anchored in Beruwala harbour. We have no details of any actions intended, or taken in respect of the Master/Skipper.

Please provide details of the actions taken by Sri Lanka in respect of the vessel Master/Skipper



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(13) IMUL A 0030 GLE; (14) IMUL0207 GLE; and (15) IMUL 0293 KLT

All three vessels have recent or pending court cases 25 March; 20 February; and 5 February respectively (we assume 2019, the Table indicates 2018). The BIOT Director of Fisheries has asked for clarification of what approval from the Minister has been sought.

For all three vessels, <u>please provide details of the actions taken by Sri Lanka in respect of the vessel</u> <u>Master/Skipper</u>. Please provide details of the outcome of the court cases against the owners, and also any <u>settlements made by the owner</u>.

(16) IMUL 0728 KLT.

We note that no action has been taken against the owner of the vessel to date. It is not clear if the vessel has been released to continue fishing, or is still detained in port. We note that the Master's/Skipper's licence was cancelled for 12 months. This vessel was on the IOTC Authorised fishing vessel list and equipped with VMS. We refer to our letter dated 30 October 2018 in which we request VMS records for this vessel in order to provide information on its movements.

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Reporting presumed IUU vessels to the IOTC Compliance Committee

This is reference to your letter dated 04th March 2019 on the above. Please find the following clarifications on your queries.

Para (ii) - Implementation of VMS to the multiday fishing vessels operating within EEZ of Sri Lanka.

As you are aware Ministry of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources Development Sri Lanka is not in a position to call another tender for purchasing of VMS for the vessels operating within EEZ until the Fundamental Right case filed by one of the bided Company is finalized. However as the chief Administrative body responsible on Monitoring of fishing vessels of Sri Lanka, Dept. Fisheries and Aquatic Resources (DFAR) highlighted the fact that the importance of installing of Vessel Monitoring Devices (VMDs) on board of all multiday fishing vessels, as Sri Lanka bound by international resolutions on prevent deter and elimination of IUU fishing in the region.

Further recent past incidents of deploying of fishing vessels for non- fishing activities such as human trafficking and drug trafficking by organized groups of people is another menace which further aggravated the requirement of VMDs on board of fishing vessels.

As such DFAR sought legal advice from Attorney General Dept. to find the possibility of settling the court case by conducting several meetings with the participation of relevant parties. The party who files the FR case agreed to withdraw the court case if they have been offered the tender. As a result the Senior State Counselor appearing for the case has instructed DFAR by a letter dated to award the tender to the party who filed the FR case by put forwarding a Cabinet Paper to the Cabinet of Ministers of the Parliament. However due to the prevailed political uncertainty in the country caused a delayed in the process and the MFARD is currently proceed on this matter. As such we see a green light of installation of VMDs within EEZ vessels very soon.

Sri Lanka Vessels inspected by BIOT SFPO

Para (iv) -Sri Lanka still find lack in legal provisions to take legal actions against the vessel operator (skipper) those who engaged in IUU fishing. As such preliminary arrangements have made to bring amendment to the current Fisheries Act to incorporate provisions to take actions against the vessel operator (Skipper).

However, there is a special arrangement in the investigation division to send the skippers those violate High seas regulations, for a compulsory two-day consultation on the obligations of High Seas fishing. Such skippers are not allowed to operate a fishing vessel if they do not attend these sessions. This is an administrative measure implemented until the period of new legal provisions come in to enforce. In addition, the training unit conducts the regular awareness programs in all Districts in a rotation manner.

With regard to your inquiries for vessels previously reported to the IOTC,

- (5) Lakshiduwa -IMUL-A- 0398 KLT (2018)
- (11) Senaka 07 IMUL 0142 PTM (2019)
- (13) IMUL-A- 0030GLE, IMUL-A- 0207GLE, IMUL-A- 0297KLT As per the provision in the DFAR Act No. 02 of 1996 section 52(1) for the compounding (1st time convicted and admit guilty) approval of the Minister of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources Development is required. As such the file has been forwarded to the Minister.

Due to non-availability of legal provisions to take actions against the skipper, the skippers of the vessels given in above four bullet points were released by making them compulsory to attend the two day consultation on the obligations of High Seas fishing. (16) IMUL- A- 0728 KLT

I draw your attention to your letter dated 15th November 2018. With respect to investigation findings you have reported in the paragraph 3 the skipper of the vessel IMUL- A- 0728 KLT has

been obstructed to the duties of SFPO of BIOT. We take this matter into our serious consideration and decided to cancel the skipper license for one year.

I would say that in the FARA Act No 35 of Sri Lanka also has provisions to take legal actions for obstructing to the authorized officers.

However the wordings in the paragraph (v) of the letter dated 15th November 2018 has misled the investigation officers of Sri Lanka that the entering of this vessel in to BIOT waters is due to an engine failure, which it was tally with the statements given by them after arrival to Sri Lanka.

In the Inspection Report – ARW01, under IOTC CMM violations we noted that the fishing gears are not marked, No VMS, VMS not tampered, No State issued log book and no state issued license is marked. However DFAR can confirm that the vessel had Log book and the Operation licence and operating VMS on board during the departure from the home port. The departure form of the vessel is attached for your information. We noted that the gear marking has not been checked by the harbor officials during the departure.

- The Vessel Monitoring Device showed that it was in good working order during the departure. However re-configuration of VMS transponders is going on under new International Maritime Satellite (INMARSAT) C service due to the change of the previous INMARSAT C service provider. Therefore DFAR is experiencing failure of Vessel monitoring system in some of the vessels the above vessel also one of such and therefore VMS record is not available.
- The vessel is permitted for H.S. Fishing
- The owner has not persecuted.
- With the information provided by you on 15th of March there is a potential DFAR to take further action in respect of the skipper. We hope to execute the legal provisions available in the prevailing Act with the assistance of the evidence provided by BIOT in future.

I would say that DFAR is hardly managing to take some legal actions against the fishers due to some economic and social hardships faced by them. However we are not retrograde to take legal actions against the IUU fishing activities keeping our commitment to prevent IUU fishing in the region.

Your understanding on this matter is highly appreciated.

Thank you for your letter dated 21 March 2019 which has helpfully answered some of the questions raised in our earlier correspondence of 4 March and 15 March 2019.

1. VMS on multiday fishing vessels operating within the EEZ of Sri Lanka

We note the updated details regarding installation of VMS on multiday fishing vessels operating within the EEZ of Sri Lanka and are encouraged that this will occur 'very soon'. <u>We would be grateful for an update on the status of installation in due course</u>.

2. Action taken against fishing skippers

We note and support the plans to amend the Fisheries Act in order to enable legal action to be taken against the vessel operator (skipper) and nationals engaged in IUU Fishing which will enable Sri Lanka to apply the provisions of IOTC Resolution 07/01. <u>We would be grateful for an update on the timeline for change in due course</u>.

We appreciate that you have used such administrative powers that you have available to deal with the skippers of these vessels.

The skipper of IMUL 0728 KLT had his licence cancelled for one year, whereas the skippers of IMUL-A-0128 GLE; IMUL-A-0398-KLT; IMUL 0142 PTM; IMUL A 0030 GLE; IMUL0207 GLE; and IMUL 0293 KLT each attended a 2 day consultation <u>It would be useful to understand if there is any further information</u> that BIOTA or the Principal Legal Advisor can provide which would allow you to suspend the licences of skippers suspected of IUU fishing ahead of the proposed changes to legislation?

3. IOTC IUU vessel listing

A. Vessels previously reported to IOTC

Superfresh 02 – IMUL-A-0128 GLE (presented to IOTC in 2017) and Lakshi Duwa 06 – IMUL-A-0398-KLT (presented to IOTC in 2018)

We are satisfied that sanctions of adequate severity have been taken in respect of the owners of these vessels. We consider the actions taken in respect of the skippers to be inadequate but note the current limitations of the

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Fisheries Act and that this will be updated. We will therefore not be re-notifying these vessels to IOTC Compliance Committee in 2019.

B. Vessels to be reported to IOTC in 2019

Seneka 07 IMUL 0142 PTM

We are satisfied that sanctions of adequate severity have been taken in respect of the owner of this vessel. We consider the actions taken in respect of the skipper to be inadequate but note the current limitations of the Fisheries Act and that this will be updated. We will notify this vessel to IOTC Compliance Committee in 2019 with recommendation b) 'Notification of illegal activity to IOTC Secretariat. Recommend notification of activity to flag State'.

IMUL A 0030 GLE; IMUL0207 GLE; and IMUL 0293 KLT

Thank you for indicating that these cases have been referred to the Minister. It is still not clear to us why this is the case. <u>Could you please provide a more detailed explanation of what that means?</u> We also note that the dates for court cases for these vessels have passed (25 March; 20 February; and 5 February respectively). <u>Is</u> <u>DFAR intending that any of the owners of these vessels is to be prosecuted?</u>

At the time of writing, we are NOT satisfied that sanctions of adequate severity have been taken in respect of the owners of these vessels. We consider the actions taken in respect of the skippers to be inadequate but note the current limitations of the Fisheries Act and that this will be updated.

As we are unable to conclude on the information currently provided that actions of adequate severity have or shall be taken, we have concluded that the only correct course of action for us to take is to notify these vessels to IOTC Compliance Committee in 2019 with recommendation c) 'Recommended for inclusion on IOTC IUU list'. We note that Sri Lanka has until 15 days before the Compliance Committee Meeting to provide additional information which we will review at that time before deciding whether to pursue IUU listing during the meeting.

IMUL 0728 KLT.

This vessel is on the IOTC Authorised fishing vessel list. We understand that no action has been taken against the owner of the vessel nor is intended. The vessels has now been released. We note that the Master's/Skipper's licence was cancelled for 12 months. Whilst the VMS was working when the vessel left port reconfiguration of VMS transponders means there are no vessel tracks for the period in question, which we consider to be inadequate. It would be helpful to us when deciding how to request this vessel is to be dealt with by the IOTC if we could understand why this owner has not been prosecuted. Is there a specific reason why this action could not take place in this case compared to others.

At the time of writing, we are NOT satisfied that sanctions of adequate severity have been taken in respect of the owner of this vessel. We consider the action taken in respect of the skipper to be adequate.

As we are unable to conclude on the information currently provided that actions of adequate severity have or shall be taken, we have concluded that the only correct course of action for us to take is to notify this vessel to IOTC Compliance Committee in 2019 with recommendation c) 'Recommended for inclusion on IOTC IUU list'. We note that Sri Lanka has until 15 days before the Compliance Committee Meeting to provide additional information which we will review at that time before deciding whether to pursue IUU listing during the meeting.

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We would like to thank Sri Lanka as flag State for the continued bilateral assistance in combatting the threat of IUU fishing in the Indian Ocean. We look forward to receiving your responses to the above.
