- Also led the renewal of indigenous fisheries policy and strategy, and the negotiations and implementation of
  frameworks for fisheries chapters of treaties with Canada's Indigenous Peoples. This included renewal of DFO's
  approach and frameworks for managing indigenous fishing rights recognized by section 35 of the Canadian
  Constitution both within treaties and outside of treaties through the renewal of DFO indigenous programs and
  strategies.
- It also included the development of strategies and frameworks and mandates for, and participation in, the negotiation of fisheries access rights, allocation policies involving indigenous and non-indigenous participants, and other fisheries management provisions of indigenous land claim agreements and treaty-like agreements. This included leading the development of mandates and strategy to negotiate the implementation of the Marshall rights of Atlantic Canada's Mi'kmaq and Maliseet First Nations; and the development of a renewed mandate for treaty negotiations in respect of fisheries for all of British Columbia's First Nations.
- Led policy renewal for the management of fisheries to achieve sustainability and economic prosperity in Canadian fisheries. This included the reform of fisheries management decision-making through the development of policies and frameworks for implementing an ecosystem-based approach to achieve sustainable fisheries, and policy reform to enable restructuring and rationalization of fishing fleets, including

enabling improved access to capital by the fishing sector and engaging with Canadian Financial Institutions and the legal community, as well as the fishing sector. The work also included leading the development of a \$50 million two prong program for assisting the Canadian lobster industry across 5 provinces and 4 DFO regions.

# Director, Special Projects, 2005-2007

- Led the reform and provision of national guidance in implementing the Atlantic Fishing Licensing Policy, fleshed
  out a national approach for implementing an ecosystems approach to Canadian fisheries management, and
  developed an Oceans to Plate approach in the management of Canadian fisheries.
- Created the foundation for new Directorate for the reform of national fisheries policies.

# Various positions at the Director level in International Affairs Directorate, 1998-2005

- Led the development and the implementation of Canada's new strategic direction to address global overfishing and reform international fisheries and oceans governance, in particular within Regional Fisheries Management Organisations (RFMOs) an interdepartmental initiative in partnership with the Departments of Foreign Affairs, Justice and National Defense. This strategy was included in Canada's new Foreign Policy. The work focused on two key Prime Ministerial and Ministerial priorities: the reform of international fisheries and oceans governance, and the reform of NAFO and other Regional Fisheries Management Organizations. The 3-prong strategy included: enhanced high seas fisheries enforcement, enhanced bilateral relations and creating conditions to change the governance of high seas fisheries, including science based decisions; open and transparent decision making based on allocation criteria, precaution and ecosystems considerations; strong monitoring, control, surveillance and enforcement regime.
- To launch the governance change agenda, we developed a strategy for governance changes within the regional bodies that manage high seas fisheries, an advocacy campaign, and organized an international conference in May 2005, where more than 45 countries, 22 fisheries ministers, 12 international organizations and the Prime Minister of Canada attended. The Conference delivered a successful Ministerial Declaration, which launched the process for fisheries governance reform of NAFO and other RFMOs. This formed the basis of the new NAFO Treaty, as well as Canada's approach to negotiating treaties for new RFMOs.
- Chaired, led Canadian delegations to, and represented Canada in various international committees and meetings (NAFO, ICCAT, WCPFC, Pacific Halibut Commission, FAO, UN) and contributed to international and national initiatives on international fisheries governance and law of the sea, including through public speaking, participating in roundtable discussions and experts workshops; providing policy and strategic advice to senior management and the Minister on international fisheries issues and international law of the sea, and represent the Division and Department in intra and interdepartmental meetings, provincial and national meetings, before parliamentary committees and participating, leading and chairing international meetings.
- Established processes for and led extensive consultations with stakeholders, including other federal departments, provincial and territorial governments, fishing and processing industry, NGOs, indigenous peoples, representatives of affected communities as well as representatives of other States' Governments and international organizations; and lead bilateral international relations and negotiations, including bilateral relations with the European Union, the U.S., Russia, Japan, Norway, Iceland, Greenland and the Faroe Islands, and France on behalf of Saint-Pierre et Miquelon. Led bilateral talks with Greenland, France and the US on transboundary fish stocks, including allocations.
- Led the work and team for Canada's ratification of the UN Fish Agreement (UNFA), including drafting memoranda to Cabinet, draft legislation and regulations, and appearing before parliamentary committees.

# Terms of Reference: Independent Chairperson to the TCAC

#### **Background**

The Indian Ocean Tuna Commission (IOTC) is an intergovernmental organisation responsible for the management of tuna and tuna-like species in the Indian Ocean.

In 2010 the Commission agreed to hold a technical committee meeting to discuss allocation criteria for the management of the tuna resources of the Indian Ocean, with a view to adopting an allocation quota system for some IOTC species in 2012. Since this time the IOTC Technical Committee on Allocation Criteria (TCAC) has met on five occasions (2011, 2013, 2016, 2018 and 2019) and the Commission is yet to adopt an allocation system for any species.

The Commission is seeking the services of an independent Chairperson to guide the work of the TCAC. In addition to chairing the next meeting of the TCAC, the independent chair is expected to advance the work of the TCAC by promoting commonalities in the current allocation scheme proposals and negotiating compromises on the more contentious elements, and, overall, make progress on the allocation discussions to the extent that an allocation scheme that has potential to be adopted by consensus emerges.

#### Services to be provided

The TCAC will hold its 6th meeting in Thailand on 16-20 March 2020. The independent TCAC Chairperson will:

#### 1. Intersessional work - engagement with CPCs leading up to the TCAC06 in March 2020

- Review all relevant documents and materials from the previous Sessions of the TCAC and prepare accordingly for the TCAC06 discussions.
- In particular, review the latest comparisons of the two proposals and become familiar with elements that have been discussed; identify elements that would benefit from being discussed; and identify possible compromises or options on the elements of the proposals.
- By electronic means, work with the lead proponents of the existing allocation proposals to confirm common
  elements; identify elements of potential compromise; and highlight those elements which may be more
  challenging to find consensus on.

# 2. Chairing the 2020 meeting of the TCAC:

- Chair the 6th Session of the TCAC from 16-20 March 2020 in Bangkok, Thailand.
- Open the meeting, including introducing special attendees and welcoming delegates. ensure the meeting follows the agenda, progresses in a smooth, orderly fashion and runs to schedule.
- Facilitate constructive and robust discussions among delegates.
- As necessary, encourage the use of small working groups to discuss issues that are not progressing or being resolved in plenary.
- Oversee the drafting and adoption of recommendations under relevant agenda items.
   ensure all delegates are treated fairly and equally throughout the meeting.
- Close the meeting.
- The Chair will not serve as a member of, nor advisor to, any delegation to the meeting.

#### 3. Intersessional work - engagement with CPCs prior to the 2020 meeting of the Commission

By electronic means:

- work with the lead proponents of the existing allocation proposals to confirm common elements and identify elements of potential compromise;
- promote commonalities and negotiate compromises such that an allocation scheme that has the potential to be adopted by consensus emerges.

#### **Key Performance Indicators:**

- 1. A review document based on the intersessional analyses undertaken in 1. above due 30 days prior to TCAC06.
- 2. An adopted report of the TCAC06 meeting.
- 3. A Chairpersons report on the TCAC06 meeting and the intersessional work undertaken in 3 above, indicating a way forward to achieve a single allocation scheme to be submitted to the Commission in 2020.
