Subject: Disclosure of Confidential Transshipment Data

Dear Dr. O'Brien.

I hope this letter finds you well.

Recently we were astonished to find that the IOTC Secretariat had provided an NGO with information on individual cases of transhipments without our consent nor approval. Japan recognizes that information on transhipment publicly available at IOTC website are aggregated ones so that any information on individual transhipments (e.g. date, location, name of fishing vessel, name of carrier vessel, amount of fish transhipped), that are considered commercially sensitive and confidential, cannot be identified. Japan believes that the Secretariat must not disclose such information upon a request from anybody, but rather must consult with the concerned flag CPC about the request considering every possible concern associated with applicable confidentiality requirements of the IOTC.

Japan would strongly request the Secretariat not to repeat similar cases in future.

Please circulate this letter among CPCs.
