• Has not provided all the mandatory information to IOTC Standard on the List of Authorized vessels 24 metres in length overall or more, missing GT, Operating Port and IMO Number, Beneficial owner, Photograph, as required by Resolution 19/04.	• The Philippines is in the process of updating Philippine registry of commercial fishing vessels fishing in both the Philippine waters and high seas.
 No Information provided on actions taken domestically to monitor catches of Blue Shark, as required by Resolution 18/02 	• In a bid to protect our critically endangered marine wildlife, the Philippine House of Representatives unanimously approved the final reading of the Shark Conservation Act (HB 8296) which regulates the catching, selling, purchasing, possessing, transporting, importing and exporting of all sharks, rays, and chimeras (collectively known as sharks) nationwide.
