I am writing this letter to request Observer status to the IOTC for the Marine Affairs Program (MAP) at Dalhousie University in Halifax, Canada. MAP was established in 1986, and since then, we have been one of the leading training centres for master's degrees in the field of Marine Management.

The vision of the Marine Affairs Program is to be the foremost provider of interdisciplinary education for marine management professionals and to advance sustainable marine environments. Our mission—with its emphasis on education, research, and service—is to create an inquiring learning environment that leads to the training of professionals at the forefront of implementing sustainable management of the oceans and coastal environments. Our strategic goal is to develop outstanding marine management professionals, through promotion of synergies among the humanities, social sciences, natural sciences, and professions. Marine Affairs shares marine management expertise, and related skills, within the Dalhousie community and worldwide, through a network of faculty, graduates, associates, and institutions.

Our faculty and graduate students have undertaken research in the last few years in WCPFC, ICCAT and IOTC to identify practical solutions to ongoing management, governance, and developmental challenges. We have published research on subsidies, the role of private actors in RFMO governance in particular in ICCAT and WCPFC, cooperate social responsibility and its role in RFMO governance, the importance of equitable allocation mechanisms in transboundary tuna governance. We have students currently undertaking research in the area of IUU fishing and RFMO governance issues in the Indian Ocean.

The work of the Marine Affairs Program is highly applied, and thus presence at IOTC meetings better allows our work to be contextually relevant and to support the needs of IOTC Members. I can provide more information about MAP if this is of interest to the Secretariat.
