

(iii) If a marine turtle is entangled in the net, stop net roll as soon as the turtle comes out of the water; disentangle the turtle without injuring it before resuming the net roll; and assist the recovery of the turtle before returning it to the water.

(iv) Carry and employ dip nets to handle turtles.

(b) Encourage vessel to adopt FAD designs which reduce the incidence of entanglement of turtles;

(c) Require vessel to record incidents involving marine turtles in the logbooks and report incidents to authorities of the CPC.

The master of this vessel (purse seiner) shall avoid encirclement of marine turtles, and if a marine turtle encircled or entangled, take practicable measures to safely release the turtle following the handling guidelines in the IOTC Marine Turtle Identification Cards; release all marine turtles observed entangled in fish aggregating devices (FADs) or other fishing gear. If a marine turtle entangled in the net, stop net roll as soon as the turtle comes out of the water; disentangle the turtle without injuring it before resuming the net roll; and to the extent practicable, assist the recovery of the turtle before returning it to the water; Carry and employ dip nets, when appropriate, to handle marine turtles;

f. CPCs to undertake research trials of circle hooks, use of whole finfish for bait, alternative FAD designs, alternative handling techniques, gillnet design and fishing practices and other mitigation methods which may improve the mitigation of adverse effects on turtles.

The use of circle hook for longline is also been encouraged and promoted to the artisanal fishermen. Several join trails and training were conducted between the government and fishermen for the use of C-hook.
