However, it is clear that the resolution 21/01 refers only to the reduction in the number of Supply Vessel. There is no mention about the characteristics of the Supply vessel in the Resolution. Pls refer to Para 18 of Resolution 21/01 which mentions that CPCs shall gradually reduce supply vessels in purse seine operations targeting tropical tuna, by 31st December 2022 as specified below in (a) and (b). (a) From 1 January 2022 to 31 December 2024: 3 supply vessels in support of not less than 10 purse seiners, all of the same flag State (b) No CPC is allowed to register any new or additional supply vessel on the IOTC Record of Authorized Vessels.-</p> <p>It is also to be noted that the case of "Haizea Hiru" was already discussed with the IOTC and its registration and publication on e-RAV was approved based on the similar case of Tanzania in 2022 [(ref: IOTC-2022-CoC19-14 and IOTC-2022-CoC19-R [E]) ..."<i>The CoC19 NOTED support for Tanzania's position, in view of its status as a developing coastal State and in the condition that the supply vessel was already in the RAV under a different flag.</i>"</p> <p>It is to be recalled that the SP Haizea Hiru was already on e-RAV under Spanish Flag and as such no NEW SP was added on e-RAV.
