



Review the possible infractions detected under the implementation of port State measures in 2025

PREPARED BY: IOTC SECRETARIAT¹, 23 JANUARY 2026

PURPOSE

To provide participants at the Working Party on the Implementation of Conservation and Management Measures (WPICMM) with the list of possible infractions, against IOTC Conservation and Management Measures (CMMs), detected under the port State measures (PSM) in 2025 and on the investigation or actions taken by the flag State.

BACKGROUND

The component 5, sub-component 5.1, of the Work Plan of the WPICMM comprise the following activities:

5	Review of potential infractions from the ROP and PSM
5.1	Investigation or actions taken by the flag State under PSM
5.1.1	WPICMM has standing agenda item that includes these cases in the Compliance assessment process to get an update on the investigation or actions taken by the flag State under PSM

Under Resolution 25/11 on port State measures to prevent, deter and eliminate Illegal, Unreported and Unregulated fishing:

PART 2 ENTRY INTO PORT

6. Advance request for port entry

6.1 Each CPC shall require the information requested in Annex I to be provided before granting entry to a vessel to its port. Each CPC shall, as a minimum standard, include the information set out in Annex III in the written report of the results of each inspection.

7. Port entry, authorisation or denial

7.1. After receiving the relevant information required pursuant to section 6, as well as such other information as it may require to determine whether the vessel requesting entry into its port has engaged in IUU fishing or fishing related activities in support of such fishing, each CPC shall decide whether to authorise or deny the entry of the vessel into its port and shall communicate this decision to the vessel or to its representative.

PART 4 - INSPECTIONS AND FOLLOW-UP ACTIONS

12. Results of inspections

Each CPC shall, as a minimum standard, include the information set out in Annex III in the written report of the results of each inspection.

13. Transmittal of inspection results

13.1 The port State CPC shall, within three full working days of the completion of the inspection, transmit by electronic means a copy of the inspection report and, upon request, an original or a certified copy thereof, to the master of the inspected vessel, to the flag State, to the IOTC Secretariat and, as appropriate, to:

- a) the flag State of any vessel that transhipped catch to the inspected vessel;
- b) the relevant CPCs and States, including those States for which there is evidence through inspection that the vessel has engaged in IUU fishing, or fishing related activities in support of such fishing, within waters under their national jurisdiction; and
- c) the State of which the vessel's master is a national.

PART 5 - ROLE OF CPCs FLAG STATES

17.4 Where, following port State inspection, a flag State CPC receives an inspection report indicating that there are clear grounds to believe that a vessel entitled to fly its flag has engaged in IUU fishing or fishing related activities in support of such fishing, it shall immediately and fully investigate the matter and shall, upon sufficient evidence, take enforcement action without delay in accordance with its laws and regulations.

DISCUSSION - SUMMARY OF COMMUNICATIONS AND REPORTS RECEIVED BY THE IOTC SECRETARIAT

In 2025, eleven (11) cases have been reported by port States CPC through the e-PSM application or by e-mail. They are summarised below, and the details for each case can be consulted in the Annex.

We confirmed that two live blue sharks and two live unknown sharks were released alongside the vessel during a fishing training trip for university students and that this was properly transferred to the captain note. This information had not been recorded in the logbook at the time of the port inspection in Hobart. During the port inspection, the vessel master may not have conveyed the situation accurately to the inspector due to the language issue. He also did not provide details of the shark catch as the inspector said “no violation” at the last of the inspection.</p>
Comments by the master: (from PIR)	Action taken
I now understand I need to report sharks that we remove from the longline even though it is not brought onboard.	The FAJ instructed the university and the captain to ensure timely recording in the logbook. The university is requested to report its remedial actions to the FAJ.

<p>The fishing logbook was verified and sharks were recorded to have been caught. However, no mention of sharks was made in the AREP nor in the EEZ entry notification.</p> <p>Upon verification of the fish holds, sharks (HGT with fins attached) were found. A total of 24083 kg of BSH and 632 kg of SMA were recorded in the fishing logbook.</p>

During verification of the above-mentioned documents, the following was observed for each of the vessels:
1. Fishing Vessel JAYA 11:
- Provisional Certificate of Registry issued on 27 January 2025, while the vessel actually left Sri Lanka port before the registry date i.e. on 24 January 2025 according to the Port Clearance.
- The validity of the ATF is from 25.11.2024 to 24.11.2025, with the validity of the vessel Provisional Registry from 27.01.2025 to 27.07.2025. The ATF validity date starts well before the registry date, and goes beyond the expiry of the registry date.
- The vessel left port on 24.01.2025, but the "Apparatus Assignment" document is effective from 24.02.2025 and valid till 27.07.2025.
2. Fishing Vessel JAYA 15:
- Provisional Certificate of Registry issued on 27 January 2025, while the vessel actually left Sri Lanka port before the registry date i.e. on 24 January 2025 according to the Port Clearance.
- The validity of the ATF is from 25.11.2024 to 24.11.2025, with the validity of the vessel Provisional Registry from 27.01.2025 to 27.07.2025. The ATF validity date starts well before the registry date, and goes beyond the expiry of the registry date.
- The vessel left port on 24.01.2025, but the Apparatus Assignment document is effective from 24.02.2025 and valid till 27.07.2025.
3. Fishing Vessel JAYA 16:
- The validity of the ATF is from 25.11.2024 to 24.11.2025, with the validity of the vessel Provisional Registry from 27.01.2025 to 27.07.2025. The ATF validity date starts well before the registry date, and goes beyond the expiry of the registry date.
- The vessel left port on 07.02.2025, but the Apparatus Assignment document is effective from 24.02.2025 and valid till 27.07.2025.

1. 16 vessels of JAYA's (ex-WASANA) belonging to Astana Conglomerate Sdn. Bhd, have been delisted and de-flagged by the Department of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources (DFAR) Sri Lanka since May 2024. This request is done by the owner of WASANA to be sold and registered to Malaysia's entity which is Astana Conglomerate Sdn. Bhd. The 16 vessels have since been in Sri Lanka Port since May 2024.
2. Astana Conglomerate request for a ship inspection by Ship Clarification Malaysia (SCM) to be held at Colombo in August 2024, and in September 2024 a reports have been issued that the vessel was worthy to be sailed and licensed. In November 2024 Astana Conglomerate obtained 16 permits for the process of registration and licensing of JAYA vessels as Malaysia Flag. Since then too, Department of Fisheries Malaysia issued a provisional Authorization to Fish (ATF) dated 25.11.2024 in order for the JAYA vessels to leave Sri Lanka. Without the ATF, the vessels could not depart Sri Lanka and if the vessels do not leave Sri Lanka Port by 1 December 2024, each vessels would need to pay USD1000 fine/per day to the Customs Authority of Sri Lanka.
3. While the vessels is still at Sri Lanka, the company also made an application to register with the Marine Department of Malaysia to obtain Certificate of Registry (COR), which contains the IRCS number for each vessels. Also, the process of issuing license booklet would have to wait for the COR to be issued.
4. The provisional Certificate of Registry were only issued by Marine Department of Malaysia on 27 January 2025, and with the COR, the company could apply for license booklet and Apparatus Assignment Certificate dated 24.02.2025.
5. On 2 April 2025, the company did sent an application to enter into Mauritius. Due to 2 April 2025 is a long Eid Fitri holiday in Malaysia, the letter is late to process until the company reminded us about the application.

- The validity of the ATF is from 25.11.2024 to 24.11.2025, with the validity of the vessel Provisional Registry from 27.01.2025 to 27.07.2025. The ATF validity date starts well before the registry date, and goes beyond the expiry of the registry date.

- The vessel left port on 24.01.2025, but the Apparatus Assignment document is effective from 24.02.2025 and valid till 27.07.2025.

5. Fishing Vessel JAYA 19:

- The validity of the ATF is from 25.11.2024 to 24.11.2025, with the validity of the vessel Provisional Registry from 27.01.2025 to 27.07.2025. The ATF validity date starts well before the registry date, and goes beyond the expiry of the registry date.

In light of the above observations, clarifications and information are being sought on the following:

1. Vessels JAYA 11, JAYA 15 and JAYA 17 left port of Sri Lanka before the effective date of the Registration Certificate
2. Vessels JAYA 11, 15, 16 and 17 left port before the effective date of the Apparatus Assignment document which is 24.02.2025
3. The ATF validity date starts well before the registry date, and goes beyond the expiry of the registry date

Additionally, we are requesting your Authority to authenticate the documents (see attachments to this email) submitted by the local representative (agent) through the AREP and to confirm that these documents have been effectively issued by the relevant Authorities in Malaysia.

We would also be grateful if you could confirm if the above-named vessels are authorised by your Authority to use foreign ports, including Port Louis, for landing/transhipment and other activities.

DOF issued an official letter to the owner of JAYA Fleet vessels, clearly stating that all **vessels under JAYA Fleet** (PPF 1061 (JAYA 11), PPF 1062 (JAYA 12), PPF 1063 (JAYA 15), PPF 1064 (JAYA 16), PPF 1065 (JAYA 17), PPF 1066 (JAYA 18), PPF 1067 (JAYA 19), PPF 1068 (JAYA 21), PPF 1069 (JAYA 22), PPF 1070 (JAYA 23), PPF 1071 (JAYA 24), PPF 1072 (JAYA 25), PPF 1073 (JAYA 26), PPF 1074 (JAYA 27), PPF 1075 (JAYA 28) and PPF 1076 (JAYA 29)) are **strictly prohibited from carrying out any fish landing or transhipment activities at any foreign ports.**

A Fishing License, together with the terms and conditions, issued by Mozambique was found onboard (see attached), with validity dates 01 January to 31 December 2025; 2. The Fishing License specifies that the authorised species include Tuna and related-species. However, the Fishing Logbook found on board was verified and it was found that no tuna had been caught. The catch consisted mainly of sharks (Tiger shark, Hammerhead shark and other sharks). Moreover, the logbook entries indicated that the vessel engaged in fishing inside the Mozambique EEZ only; 3. The fishing gear was inspected and it was found that the terminal tackle of the branch line was made of steel wire; and 4. According to the terms and conditions of the License issued by Mozambique, the vessel shall operate a VMS and AIS at all times during fishing inside the Mozambique EEZ. The conditions also mention that by-catch shall not exceed 10% of the target species. <p>In light of the above findings, we are seeking the following information from your authority:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. To confirm the authenticity and validity of the Fishing License issued by Mozambique, together with the terms and conditions; 2. To confirm whether tuna and related-species also include sharks, and to confirm the by-catch specified in the License; 3. To confirm whether Mozambique allows fisheries that are directed at sharks inside its EEZ; 4. To confirm whether the vessel operated a VMS and AIS at all times while fishing inside the Mozambique EEZ, and if yes, to provide the complete VMS/AIS track map corresponding to this fishing trip; <p>To confirm that, overall, the fishing activities carried out by WIN LONG inside the Mozambique EEZ were in accordance with national laws and international resolutions as applicable.</p>	<p>13 June 2025, Letter from Mozambique is provided in annex 5.</p> <p><input checked="" type="checkbox"/> Additional information provided by Mozambique</p> <p><input type="checkbox"/> Result of investigation</p> <p>1. For your awareness, the inspectors found a potential reporting issue during the inspection:

- Vessel not recording sharks in fishing logs after releasing them.

The master is now aware of the need to record shark releases/discards in the fishing logs. We wish to acknowledge the cooperation and assistance provided by the Master and crew of the *Umitaka Maru*.

A copy of the inspection report is attached and the Secretariat of the FAO and IOTC will receive a copy of this correspondence. The Master of the vessel received a copy of the report on completion of the inspection.

My name is Kimiyoshi Hiwatari from the Fisheries Agency of Japan. I am writing this email about the port inspection by the Australian government to the Japanese-flag fishing training vessel, *Umitaka Maru*.

According to a letter from the Australian government on 13 February (attached), the inspectors found a potential reporting issue for sharks during the inspection.

After receiving the information from the Australian government, the Fisheries Agency of Japan (FAJ) investigated the training vessel operator, the Tokyo University of Marine Science and Technology. We confirmed that two live blue sharks and two live unknown sharks were released alongside the vessel during a fishing training trip for university students and that this was properly transferred to the captain note. This information had not been recorded in the logbook at the time of the port inspection in Hobart. During the port inspection, the vessel master may not have conveyed the situation accurately to the inspector due to the language issue. He also did not provide details of the shark catch as the inspector said “no violation” at the last of the inspection. Nevertheless, the FAJ instructed the university and the captain to ensure timely recording in the logbook. The university is requested to report its remedial actions to the FAJ.

In relation to this case, IOTC Resolution 15/01 on mandatory statistical reporting requirements, ANNEX II, 2.4 REMARKS, paragraph 1 states “Discard of tuna, tuna-like fish and sharks to be recorded by species in weight (kg) or number for all gears should be recorded in the remarks”, while the Resolution is not clear if a live release is classified as discard.

Japan appreciates the information on this case from the Australian government as well as your understanding of this situation. We look forward to continuing our cooperation with Australia to enhance focus and management.

We are contacting you on behalf of The Fisheries Authority of the Ministry of Agro-Industry, Food Security, Blue Economy and Fisheries (Blue Economy and Fisheries Division) of the Republic of Mauritius pursuant to Article 6 of the FAO Agreement on Port State Measures, PSMA, with regards to fishing vessel LU WEI YUAN YU 688 which called at Port Louis Harbour, Mauritius, on 14 October 2025 for the purpose of Landing, Refuelling and Resupplying.

The attached AREP and IOTC Transhipment Declaration have been submitted by the vessel agent.

The vessel was boarded and inspected by a team of fisheries officers on 14 October 2025.

The inspection revealed the following:

- The last port call of the vessel was in December 2024 in Singapore
- During the verification process of the fishing logbook, it was found that Blue Shark and Shortfin Mako Shark were reported to have been caught, but were not declared in the AREP submitted by the agent.
- The fish hold was opened and checked and shark carcasses with fins attached were found inside
- The agent of the vessel was informed that an offence was committed in contravention with Section 46 (1) of the Fisheries Act 2023 and contravention would be established accordingly. A copy of the Fisheries Act 2023 is attached for your reference.
- No Landing Authorisation has been issued in respect of the vessel

In light of the above, we are requesting your authority to provide the following information:

1. a confirmation that the vessel did not call at any other port after leaving Singapore and prior to calling at Port Louis
2. a confirmation on whether the vessel conducted any other transhipment at sea in addition to the one conducted on 27 June 2025
3. a confirmation that the transhipment was authorised by your authority
4. a confirmation that the sharks caught during this trip were duly reported to your authority in accordance with applicable IOTC Resolutions
5. confirmation that the vessel VMS has been operational throughout the trip and to provide a VMS track map in respect of the vessel for the whole duration of this trip, that is, from departure from Singapore till entry into Port Louis

We rely on your cooperation in providing the requested information within the shortest delay possible so that Mauritius can take an appropriate decision as a Port State under the PSMA.

The fishing vessel Jenn Ming Yang No.33, IRCS: BJ4387, flying Chinese flag (Taiwan) called at Port Louis on 21 September 2025, with 34 140.00 Kg of fish onboard (declared weight).

Boarding and Inspection was carried out on 21 November 2025 by officers from the Port State Control Unit. During the inspection, the fishing logbook was verified and it was found that Spearfish was recorded in the logbook, but same was not declared in the Advanced Request for Entry into Port (AREP). The master of the vessel, Mr. Chen Wen Tsun and the local agent of the vessel, were present onboard.

The above was in breach with **Section 46. (2) - Reporting Requirements of the Fisheries Act 2023**.

A contravention was established and a preliminary statement was taken from the local agent representing the vessel.

A case file has been opened for initiation of prosecution procedures.

Landing Authorisation has been issued to the fishing vessel and unloading operations are scheduled to start on 22 November 2025.

Attached is the AREP submitted by the agent and an extract of the logbook, for your reference.

We are contacting you on behalf of The Fisheries Authority of the Ministry of Agro-Industry, Food Security, Blue Economy and Fisheries (Blue Economy and Fisheries Division) of the Republic of Mauritius pursuant to Article 6 of the FAO Agreement on Port State Measures, PSMA, with regards to Malaysian-flagged fishing vessels JAYA 11, JAYA 15, JAYA 16, JAYA 17 and JAYA 19 which are seeking port entry into Port Louis Harbour, Mauritius, for the purpose of Landing, Refuelling and Resupplying.

- The vessel left port on 24.01.2025, but the "Apparatus Assignment" document is effective from 24.02.2025 and valid till 27.07.2025.

2. Fishing Vessel JAYA 15:

6. The ATF validity date starts well before the registry date, and goes beyond the expiry of the registry date

Additionally, we are requesting your Authority to authenticate the documents (see attachments to this email) submitted by the local representative (agent) through the AREP and to confirm that these documents have been effectively issued by the relevant Authorities in Malaysia.

We would also be grateful if you could confirm if the above-named vessels are authorised by your Authority to use foreign ports, including Port Louis, for landing/transhipment and other activities.

According to Section 46 of our Fisheries Act 2023, foreign vessels which fall within requirements by the International Maritime Organization shall continuously operate an automatic identification system (AIS) while in our Maritime Zones. However, since these vessels entered the EEZ of Mauritius, we have not been able to track them as they are not painting AIS positions on our AIS software. Therefore, we would be grateful if you could confirm that these vessels are equipped with AIS equipment, and are also requesting for the full VMS tracking of all the 5 vessels since they left port of Sri Lanka until they reached Port Louis, and their daily catch reports to the Flag State Authority (electronic Fishing Logbook data).

You are hereby informed that Port Access to these vessels will only be granted following satisfactory clarifications and information received from your esteemed Authority.

On behalf of the Department of Fisheries Malaysia, we sincerely appreciate the cooperation and efficient communication between both sides on this matter.

2. In view of the current situation where your office is still receiving AREP applications from vessels under JAYA Fleet to enter ports in Mauritius, please be informed that our Department, as the competent authority for Malaysian fishing vessels, has issued an official letter to the owner of JAYA Fleet vessels, clearly stating that all **vessels under JAYA Fleet** (PPF 1061 (JAYA 11), PPF 1062 (JAYA 12), PPF 1063 (JAYA 15), PPF 1064 (JAYA 16), PPF 1065 (JAYA 17), PPF 1066 (JAYA 18), PPF 1067 (JAYA 19), PPF 1068 (JAYA 21), PPF 1069 (JAYA 22), PPF 1070 (JAYA 23), PPF 1071 (JAYA 24), PPF 1072 (JAYA 25), PPF 1073 (JAYA 26), PPF 1074 (JAYA 27), PPF 1075 (JAYA 28) and PPF 1076 (JAYA 29)) are **strictly prohibited from carrying out any fish landing or transhipment activities at any foreign ports**. They are required to return to Penang Port for such activities, and are only permitted to enter foreign ports for the sole purpose of obtaining supplies necessary for their return voyage to Penang Port. These supplies also include bait, whereby the company has informed us that they had placed their bait orders in advance and need to complete the transaction before departing for Penang Port.

3. However, please be informed that we have received applications from the company for several vessels as detailed below. The Department has granted permission for these vessels to enter foreign ports for the following specific purposes:

- i. Vessels **JAYA 23, JAYA 27, and JAYA 29:** for vessel repair works and obtain supplies (including bait);
- ii. Vessel **JAYA 16:** to assist with towing JAYA 23 and to obtain supplies (including bait);
- iii. Vessel **JAYA 28:** emergency entry for medical assistance for crew member and obtain supplies (including bait);
- iv. Vessels **JAYA 11, JAYA 15, JAYA 17, and JAYA 19:** to obtain supplies (including bait).

4. Although these vessels have been granted permission to enter foreign ports for various specific purposes, any fish landing or transhipment activities remain strictly prohibited. Therefore, we kindly request that any decisions made on any AREP applications from JAYA Fleet will remain consistent with the directive and permission issued by us, as the competent flag State authority for these vessels.

We thank you for your kind cooperation and understanding on this matter.

We are contacting you on behalf of The Fisheries Authority of the Ministry of Agro-Industry, Food Security, Blue Economy and Fisheries (Blue Economy and Fisheries Division) of the Republic of Mauritius pursuant to Article 6 of the FAO Agreement on Port State Measures, PSMA, with regards to Taiwanese-flagged, Mozambique-licensed fishing vessel WIN LONG which has entered our port for the purpose of Landing, Refuelling and Resupplying.

The local agent representing the vessel has submitted an Advance Request for Entry in Port (AREP) through the IOTC e-PSM platform, together with fishing-related documents, including the Distant Water Fisheries Permit.

The vessel was boarded and inspected by Fisheries Officers on Saturday 07 June 2025 and Tuesday 10 June 2025.

The outcome of the inspection revealed the following:

1. A Fishing License, together with the terms and conditions, issued by Mozambique was found onboard (see attached), with validity dates 01 January to 31 December 2025;
2. The Fishing License specifies that the authorised species include Tuna and related-species. However, the Fishing Logbook found on board was verified and it was found that no tuna had been caught. The catch consisted mainly of sharks (Tiger shark, **Hammerhead shark** and other sharks). Moreover, the logbook entries indicated that the vessel engaged in fishing inside the Mozambique EEZ only;
3. The fishing gear was inspected and it was found that the terminal tackle of the branch line was made of steel wire; and
4. According to the terms and conditions of the License issued by Mozambique, the vessel shall operate a VMS and AIS at all times during fishing inside the Mozambique EEZ. The conditions also mention that by-catch shall not exceed 10% of the target species.

In light of the above findings, we are seeking the following information from your authority:

1. To confirm the authenticity and validity of the Fishing License issued by Mozambique, together with the terms and conditions;
2. To confirm whether tuna and related-species also include sharks, and to confirm the by-catch specified in the License;
3. To confirm whether Mozambique allows fisheries that are directed at sharks inside its EEZ;
4. To confirm whether the vessel operated a VMS and AIS at all times while fishing inside the Mozambique EEZ, and if yes, to provide the complete VMS/AIS track map corresponding to this fishing trip;
5. To confirm that, overall, the fishing activities carried out by WIN LONG inside the Mozambique EEZ were in accordance with national laws and international resolutions as applicable.

We acknowledge your email dated June 11, 2025, regarding the subject of the aforementioned vessel, and in this regard, INAMAR, IP - Maritime Authority of Mozambique, hereby clarifies to Your Excellency the following:

1. The Fishing License presented is authentic, was issued by the competent authorities, and delivered to the captain of the vessel at the Port of Maputo, after inspection, in compliance with port state control measures - PSMA.
2. The vessel is authorized to fish for tuna and related species, including sharks whose species are permitted for capture, within the Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ) of Mozambique; The fishing gear that was inspected was in compliance for the fishing activities for which the vessel is licensed.
3. The vessel operates with VMS and AIS, and we will later share the registered geographic positions.
4. Until then, there has been no record of violations of the Mozambican legislation.

Thus, it is the responsibility of the captain of the vessel to provide Your Excellencies with the necessary statements regarding the findings that are considered irregularities in light of the applicable legislation.

Case summary received from Port State MUS – Mauritius, Ministry of Agro-Industry, Food Security, Blue Economy and Fisheries.

Kindly note that on 07 June 2025 at 10.30 am, a boarding and inspection was effected on fishing vessel Win Long (Flag: Taiwan Province of China, IRCS: BH2998) and the following discrepancies were observed:

- Based on the fishing logbook declaration, the vessel fished in the EEZ of Mozambique and there was no mention of Mozambique EEZ license in the AREP (Annex 1). Following query with the Captain, he produced a Mozambican EEZ fishing license which was in Portuguese language (Annex 2). Also, Hammerhead shark fishing was reported in the fishing logbook for many days but was not mentioned in the AREP declaration. Moreover, AREP declaration does mention sharks mixed (SKH) which is supported by an appropriate letter from Chang Fong Marine and Shipping Co. Ltd uploaded in the AREP submission where Chang Fong Marine and Shipping Co. Ltd explained that the sharks mixed declared on first page information are actually bullsharks, spottail sharks and blacknose shark. This resulted in incomplete and misleading information from the fishing vessel.
- Upon interrogation of the Captain about the fishing activities of his vessel, we can conclude that the vessel has been targeting sharks as main catch, which is being confirmed by the catch declaration through the AREP and the fishing logbook, which is supported by the figures below.
- Out of 74,323 kgs declared catch onboard, 72,158 kgs is of shark species and the remaining 2165 kgs is actually tuna bycatch.

The Landing authorization was then denied to Win Long and the fishing logbook was seized for further verification and calculation.

Following further investigation at our office, the following are to be noted:

- Authorization to fish issued by flag state, Taiwan mentions targeted species, “tunas”, billfishes and sharks”. Nevertheless, as per AREP declaration, Win Long targeted mainly sharks species, with few bycatch of IOTC species, whereby the main catch should have been IOTC tuna species instead of shark species, as the vessel operates in the region of competency of IOTC;
- Upon verification and calculation of the fishing logbook, 8,445 kgs of hammerhead shark species was reported in the fishing logbook, but not declared on the AREP.
- The Mozambique EEZ license produced onboard by the Captain, which was initially in Portuguese language, was translated in English (Annex 3) and through which we can understand that the Mozambique Authority did authorize the said vessel to fish “tuna and related species (longline)” except “species whose capture is prohibited: according to annex XIII of Decree no. 89/2020 of October 08-REPMAR”.
- In the said Decree, we can understand that the vessel’s “bycatch shall not exceed 10 % of the target species, except where specifically authorised by the Competent Fisheries Licensing Authority of Mozambique or IOTC Resolutions.” (Annex 4)

On 10 June 2025 at 10.00 am, a second boarding and inspection was carried out. The three main fish holds as well as the blast freezers were opened and checked, where the catch mainly consisted of shark species which were headed and the fins attached to their carcass. Also, fishing gear was checked and it was observed that the terminal tackle of the branch line was made of steel wire, thus giving an indication about the vessel's targeted species.

On 11 June 2025 at 11 28 am, an email was sent to the National Directorate of Operations – Fisheries requesting Mozambique Authority for additional information on the following (Annex 5):

- To confirm the authenticity and validity of the Fishing License issued by Mozambique, together with the terms and conditions;
- To confirm whether tuna and related-species also include sharks, and to confirm the by-catch specified in the License;
- To confirm whether Mozambique allows fisheries that are directed at sharks inside its EEZ;
- To confirm whether the vessel operated a VMS and AIS at all times while fishing inside the Mozambique EEZ, and if yes, to provide the complete VMS/AIS track map corresponding to this fishing trip;
- To confirm that, overall, the fishing activities carried out by WIN LONG inside the Mozambique EEZ were in accordance with national laws and international resolutions as applicable.

On 13 June 2025, Mr. Isaias Elisio Mondlane from the National Institute of the Sea, I.P Board of Directors replied the query and informed the following (Annex 6):

- The fishing license is authentic;

- The vessel is authorized to fish for tuna and related species, including sharks whose species are permitted for capture in the EEZ of Mozambique. The fishing gear was inspected and was in compliance for the fishing activities for which the vessel is licensed
- Until then, there has been no record of violations of Mozambique legislation.
- Mozambique Authority stressed that it is the responsibility of the Captain of the vessel to provide necessary statements regarding the findings that are considered irregularities in light of the applicable legislation.

It is to be noted that the percentage of tuna bycatch (3%) is insignificant compared to the targeted shark species (97%).

In light of the above, the following seems to be irrational:

- The Mozambique EEZ license wordings make no mention of shark species in contrast with the response received from Mozambique Authority through Mr. Isaias Elisio Mondlane, who stated that “The vessel is authorized to fish for tuna and related species, including sharks whose species are permitted for capture in the EEZ of Mozambique”.
- Since the vessel is operating in the IOTC region of competency and the EEZ of Mozambique as well as the Authorisation to fish from flag state mentions that the vessel should be mainly targeting tuna and related species, but still the vessel’s main catch consists of shark species.

An advanced Request for Entry into Port (AREP) was submitted on 24 October 2025, alongside the vessel documents including the vessel registry certificate, fishing licence and estimated weight of fish onboard. However, the Authorisation to Fish (ATF) was not submitted in the set of documents.

Port access was granted to the vessel on 28 October 2025.

The vessel was boarded by the Fisheries Authorities on 29 October 2025 for inspection purposes, in the presence of the local agent representing the vessel, the master of the vessel and the vessel owner.

The fishing logbook, fishing licences and registry certificates were verified. The master of the vessel was requested to submit the Authorisation to Fish to the inspection team for verification and the latter informed that there was no copy of the ATF onboard. The owner of the vessel, then requested for a copy of the ATF from his offices in Spain through the whatsapp application. The document was then submitted to the inspection team.

There were also some minor discrepancies observed in the logbook weight and estimated declared weight in the AREP, which was due to a grouping of species when calculating the total weight, as explained by the master and which was to the satisfaction of the inspection team.

A contravention was established as per **Section 13. Implementation of International Conservation and Management Measures** of the **Fisheries Act 2023**, (and breach of IOTC resolution 19/04) was established.

A case file has been opened for initiation of prosecution procedures.

Landing Authorisation has been issued and unloading operations are scheduled to start on 30 October 2025.
